The Rev's Ruminations

As I write this month's installment of my "Ruminations," we are still over three weeks from what many hope will be the end of the state's extended *Stay Home MN* order, but as with all things COVID-19 related, we will have to wait and see! Restrictions on group gatherings and our use of social distancing seem to be helping stem the tide of new infections in our state, so I applaud each of you for doing your part to keep both yourselves and your neighbors healthy by staying at home as much as possible. Online worship services and *Zoom* council / board meetings have in some strange way become a "new normal" for all of us!?! I know that some may feel things have been overly restricted, but the truth of the matter is that IF we want any chance of enjoying our Minnesota spring/summer together, then we all need to continue to abide under these restrictions until it is safe to loosen them.

In preparation for the April Church Council meeting (held over *Zoom*), I opened a popular daily devotional book that I've had for quite some time entitled *Jesus Calling*, by Sarah Young. As the title implies, each day's brief meditation is written in first-person voice as if the Savior himself is writing. The entry for April 15th was so timely amid our world situation that I chuckled out loud in my office:

"TRUST ME, and don't be afraid. Many things feel out of control. Your routines are not running smoothly. You tend to feel more secure when your life is predictable. Let Me lead you to the rock that is higher than you and your circumstances. Take refuge in the shelter of My wings, where you are absolutely secure.

When you are shaken out of your comfortable routines, grip My hand tightly and look for growth opportunities. Instead of bemoaning the loss of your comfort, accept the challenge of something new. *I lead you on from glory to glory*, making you fit for My kingdom. Say *yes* to the ways I work in your life. Trust Me, and don't be afraid."


On Good Friday, our epistle reading from Hebrews affirmed that Jesus has "been through the wringer" too, and therefore is precisely the one we need to guide us as he is imagined to be offering in Jesus Calling. Hebrews 4:15-16 says, "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need." (NRSV)

Did Jesus have to live under a "stay at home" executive order, keep his gatherings under ten, or stay six feet away from others when he went to the marketplace? Not exactly, but these are very different times—and I don't think living under Roman occupation while also challenging the deeply-entrenched religious leaders of his day was any picnic!?! We need only recall the gospel narrative from that same Good Friday service (see John's 18–19th chapters) to understand that our great high priest has been through more than we can even imagine. But the glory of Jesus' Easter resurrection reminds us that even death is not the final word. Through God all things are possible! We will get through this temporary challenge as well.

Like I did last month, I want to encourage you to keep in touch with one another. I have heard several positive reports from our volunteers as they have been checking in with the congregation, so don't be surprised to get another phone call if you haven't already. Human interaction is one of the healthiest things you can do for your mental well-being, just do so safely by employing one of the new video technologies or just a good ol' fashioned phone call. Though we haven't been able to gather in person, I continue to hold each of you in my prayers. We are working our way through this together, and I am confident that we will emerge as an even stronger congregation than when we began!

Once logged in to your *FREE* account on **rightnow** MEDIA, you can either scroll down the left side library list OR click on the LIBRARIES icon in the upper left corner of the screen and select "First Congregational UCC" to access the "Fairmont Worship Services" channel or any of the great Christian shows, Bible studies, conferences, and study resources on the site. The "Pastor Cory's Picks" channel is where you'll find videos I've recommended here, as well as others that interest me. ~ Pastor Cory

First up this month, I've selected a timely study called **Overcoming Anxiety During COVID-19**, narrated by Jonathan Pokluda. All our extra time at home, away from many of the "normal" activities that define our lives, can be a source of anxiety to many who are used to a life on the go. Here is the synopsis of Johathan's helpful study, each part of which is ten minutes or less:

Anxiety can feel like a constricting snake slowly tightening around us until it is difficult to breathe. In recent weeks, the anxiety surrounding the rapid spread of the COVID-19 virus has a hold on the whole world as people die, economies decline, and our lives change right before our eyes. In this four-part series, Jonathan Pokluda speaks words of comfort and wisdom, to help Christians navigate the areas of life COVID-19 is affecting. During this series you'll be encouraged in how to overcome anxiety in these troubling days and explore ways you can remain faithful to God and to others.

I'm also recommending a slightly longer study called **Hope**, led by Louis & Hettie Brittz. "Hope" can feel like an elusive emotion during these uncertain days, but it is essential to our continued mental resiliency. The four videos in this study are each around 30 minutes, but no longer than the average sit-com you may have been watching! Additional resources are offered to go along with this study but are not necessary to enjoy it. Here's the synopsis:

Hope can be hard to find and easy to lose. Living the Christian life without it is unthinkable, and yet, it isn't a fruit or a gift of the Holy Spirit. Nobody just 'gets' it. There is a road mapped out to Hope. It is one in which our perseverance and character can be stretched to a near breaking point...Through this four-part series, Louis and Hettie Brittz want to take every Christian on a journey to find personal Hope in the person of Christ. Through their powerful testimony, teaching and music, the South African born author/speaker and songwriter cut through the barriers to hope - our lack of identity in Christ, legalism, unforgiveness, and fear. Their approach is vulnerable, unique and practical with each of the sessions ending in a reflection and music ministry time.

During these days of local and global concern, the editors at **rightnow** MEDIA have also curated several channels that you might find helpful as you seek to keep your heart and mind resilient amid sensationalized news reports and misleading social media influences. There are broader libraries organized to help you find appropriate programming for kids, youth, college & young adults, women, men, couples, or even small groups, but feel free to browse whatever peaks piques your interest! Maybe you'd even like to gather a group of friends—over the phone or social media—to discuss a **rightnow** MEDIA series similar to a book club?

HyVee and Fareway Receipts Report as of 11 April 2020

During the last four weeks, tion, can't estimate how many more \$3,275.75 (2.18%) worth of Hy-Vee weeks it will take to reach the goal. slips were turned in. After only 20 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$53,233.64 (35.49%) toward the 12th \$150,000 goal.

During the same four weeks, \$460.53 (0.31%) worth of Fareway slips were received.

After 84 weeks, Fareway is at \$85,740.24 (57.16) toward our 3rd \$1,000 from Fareway store. Because of the current situa-

During the last four weeks, the number and value of slips was about only one week for Hy-Vee and one-half of a week for

Fareway about one-half of the average of what has been turned in per week the prior year. Thanks for bringing in all those slips and keep those slips coming. I am looking for a large quantity when we are allowed us to get-to-gather again.
