Slayings rock Furlow

Deputies following up 911 call find family dead

FURLOW - A Lonoke County couple and their daughter were found dead after an apparent break-in at their home Friday night, police said.

A sheriff's deputy found the bodies of 46-year-old Joe Stocks, his wife, Barbara, 43, and their 18year-old daughter, Heather, after a 911 caller from their home hung up at 10:40 p.m. Police tried to return the call, but no one answered, prompting a deputy to go to the home to investigate.

Neighbors said the Stockses were pillars of the rural community and their deaths have left them shaken. Police called the deaths a triple murder but released few details Saturday.

"We don't exclude anything as a possibility," Arkansas State Police Lt. John Morrow said at an afternoon news conference at the Lonoke County Courthouse. "It's being investigated as a triple homicide at this time."

State police joined Lonoke

County sheriff's deputies in the investigation Saturday.

Morrow said police finished in-

pecting the crime scene Saturday but still have many people to in-

Morrow declined to say how the family was killed but said robbery is a possible motive. Police found that the garage door had been forced open.

Morrow said authorities have no suspects.

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the Stockses' 21-year-old son Heath, when they discovered his car was not in the driveway.

But police found him, and he is not a suspect, Morrow said.

The Stockses' small brick home at 771 Johnson Road is adjacent to a wheat field and a short drive from the Concord United Methodist Church, which the family attended.

Lonoke County Charles Martin and several of his deputies searched alongside Johnson Road on Saturday after-noon, looking for anything that might have been taken from the home.

Joe Stocks was a self-em-ployed trucker; his wife worked in the computer laboratory of Lonoke High School and for the Lonoke County 4-H Club.

Heather Stocks was captain of Lonoke High School 'Jackrabbits" cheerleading squad and was president of the Future Business Leaders of America regional chapter. She was known for her beauty and friends said she was outgoing and popular.

Mother and daughter had recently celebrated birthdays, Barbara Stocks on Jan. 4 and her daughter on

people visited the small Concord United Methodist Church where Rev. Robert Marble, Lonoke High School Principal George Davis and other officials tried to help Heather Stocks' classmates cope with their grief. Three Lonoke High School

cheerleaders, wearing their purple cheerleader vests, stepped outside the church and wept.

"They were super people—salt of the earth. You couldn't find any better folks," said a woman outside the church who knew the couple.

"They tried to do everything they could with their kids," said Jim DePriest, 43, a Furlow farmer who said he has known Stocks since elementary school.

"Everybody out here knew them," he said.

Heather Stocks' close friends were gathered at one cheer-leader's house Saturday afternoon

Daniel Nellums, a friend of Heather Stocks and a junior at Lonoke High School, attended the basketball game Friday night.

"Heather was a real bright, smart person who had a promising future," he said.

Nellums said he talked to her almost every day at school. Elwood Harris, Ba

Barbara Stocks' father, was awakened at 2 a.m. Saturday by a sheriff's deputy delivering the tragic

Harris had only one comment. "Why did it happen?" he asked. "That's all. We just can't imagine anything like this hap-pening."

A crowd gathered outside Furlow Grocery at 5 a.m. Sat-urday, waiting for the store to open. Owner Joe Bailey said people came in all day to buy food for the bereaved families.



"Everybody here in this comnunity is either related to each ther or friends with each oth-r," Bailey said. "You don't even hink something like this can appen out here. It's a wonderul place. Everybody is so close ut here. Everybody's conerned."

"They were wonderful, wonerful people and everybody iked them," Bailey said. "They ere in here all the time."

Neil Anderson, who said he ttended high school with Joe tocks, owns a fish farm in onoke, and said Stocks somemes hauled fish for him.

"They were just great people," nderson said. "It's about the lost horrible thing that's ever



happened here. I just hope they catch them. Everybody in this community is going to be afraid

until they do."

A man who visited Joe Stocks' parents' house, who asked not to be named, said he's known the family his entire life.

"It's just senseless," he said. "Everybody is in shock. Nobody knows what's going on."

Bailey said many of the people who passed through Furlow Grocery on Saturday shared the feeling of helplessness.

"About every person that comes in here asks about it," he said. "Everybody in the community, it's like one big family. And so everybody wants to help. They want to know what they can do to help. There's really nothing that you can do. Just pray for them.

Late Saturday afternoon Jackie Moore Jr., a member o the Concord United Methodis Church in Furlow who identi fied himself as a family spokesman, issued this state ment: "The family would like to thank the press for their patience during the time of this unfortunate happening. We are putting this investigation into God's hands and into the hands of the Police Depart ment. Any other information will be released by the Police Department as they see necessary."
