POPE PIUS XII 5 POINTS

At the 1942 Men's Communion Breakfast, Bishop James H. Ryan of Omaha urged the men to read and study Pope Pius XII's five points of peace "in the light of past recent history and to see for themselves how necessary they are to the human race, since the breaking down of these principles has been responsible for the wars of the past."

Pope Pius XII five points were: 1) recognition of the independence of each nation, 2) each nation stops the arms race, 3) all nations create an equal justice system in their countries, 4) all nations meet the needs of their national and racial minorities and 5) all nations and men develop a sense of justice based on the Sermon of the Mount to guide men. He stated that this plan was not American, European or national plan but rather universal, "because it stems from the eternal principles which lie at the basis of all Christian thought and living."

**EUCCHARISTIC PRAYER IS THE MOST
IMPORTANT AND LEAST UNDERSTOOD
PRAYER IN MASS**

The eucharistic prayer is the most important and least understood prayer in the Catholic Mass. Most Catholics see it as the priest's prayer that is centered on the consecration of the bread and wine into the body and blood of Christ.

This is what we do in the eucharistic prayer. The word *Eucharist* comes from the Greek word for *thanksgiving*. The prayer begins with the exhortation: "Lift up your hearts. ... Let us give thanks to the Lord our God." The "Lord" in the eucharistic prayer is the Father.

The eucharistic prayer is addressed to the Father, not to Jesus. This is why the current acclamations addressed to Jesus after the consecration ("We proclaim your Death, Oh Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again.") are out of place. They are a hangover from seeing the Eucharist as a place to worship Jesus.

If the eucharistic prayer is about Jesus, it is one that gives thanks and praise to the Father for all His actions in the world, but especially for sending His Son as our savior.

Remembering, thanking and praising goes from the beginning of the prayer all the way through the narrative drawn from the Last Supper and the recalling of the death, resurrection and enthronement of Jesus at the right hand of the Father.

Seen in this way, the institutional narrative (consecration) is not something dropped in the middle of some extraneous prayers, but is part of the history of God's action in the world for which we give thanks.

**BISHOP CONDEMNS FBI MEMO THAT SOUGHT
TO LINK LATIN MASS TO VIOLENT EXTREMISM**

Bishop Barry Knestout of the Diocese of Richmond on Feb. 13 called on members of Congress from Virginia to publicly condemn a leaked FBI memorandum that sought to link Catholics to violent extremists.

According to the leaked FBI memo, "radical-traditional" Catholics who are interested in the Traditional Latin Mass are likely to have ties to "the far-right white nationalist movement."

The internal memorandum, titled "Interest of Racially or Ethnically Motivated Violent Extremists in Radical-Traditionalist Catholic Ideology Almost Certainly Presents New Mitigation Opportunities," was produced by the FBI's Richmond field office and published Feb. 8 by the website UncoverDC.

Calling the memo a "threat to religious liberty," Knestout called on lawmakers to "ensure that such offenses against the constitutionally protected free exercise of religion do not occur again."

"Racism, religious bigotry, violence, and discrimination have no place in our Church or teachings," Knestout said.
