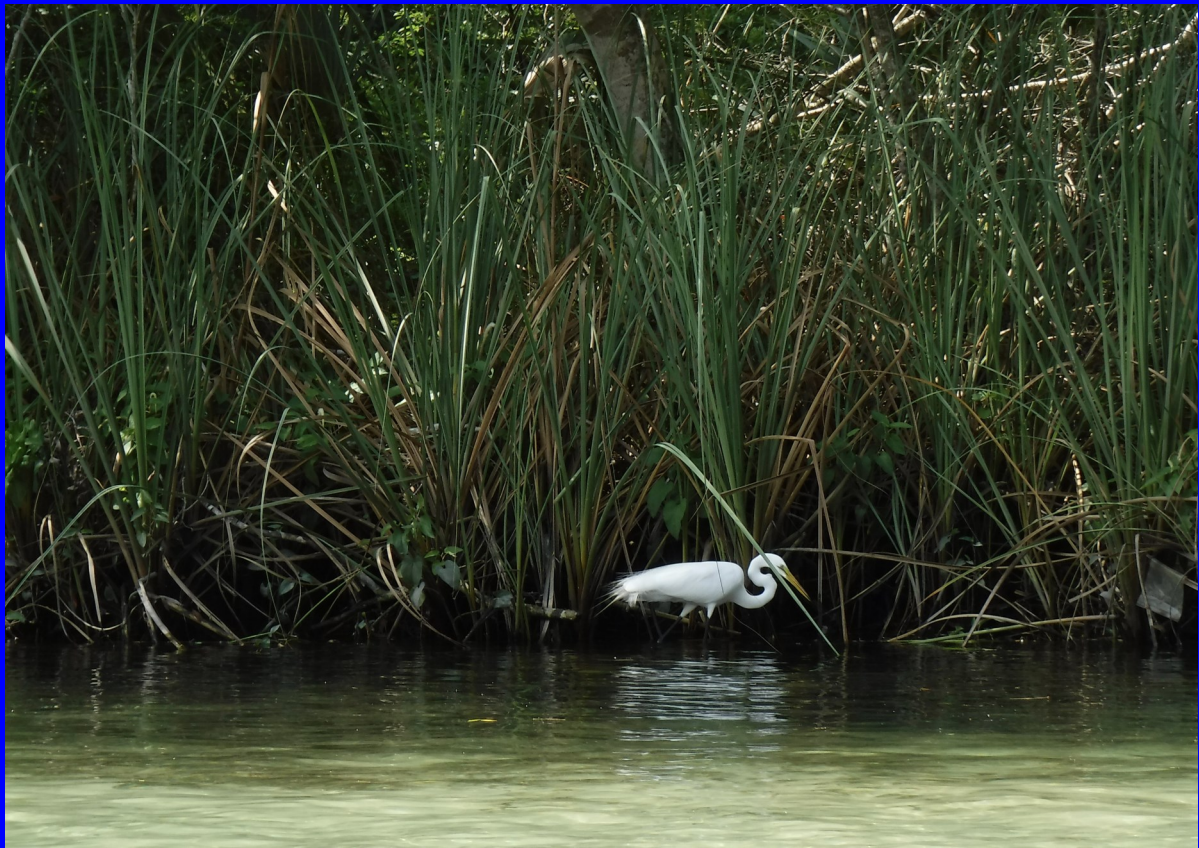

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## MINUTES OF HBPOA, COAST GUARD BUILDING May 3, 2018 @ 7:00 PM

Kathy Frase, Pres., called the meeting to order at 7:05 PM and led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance. She then extended a warm welcome to all in attendance.

Our guest speaker, Lea Knezevich, was introduced by Ben Martinez, V-Pres. She is the CRI (Cities Readiness Initiative) Coordinator for the Health Department of Hernando County. Her responsibility is to go out into the community and speak to groups, making them aware of the Strategic National Stockpile which came about after 9/11 and the Oklahoma City bombing to protect citizens of the U.S. in the event of a biological terror attack or any other medical emer-

gency. This agency has about 12,000 tons of medical equipment and supplies which are spread among 12 centers in the United States. Hernando County's proximity to major cities makes us eligible every year for a grant which gives us ready access to possibly life saving drugs or equipment should we need either. The most easily treated biological attack would be Anthrax which can absolutely be treated with specific antibiotics (Cipro or Doxycycline) if started within the first 48 hours of exposure. Lea's challenge is to go out into the community and educate people, encouraging local groups of individuals to form closed Points of Dispensing (PODs) which include residential communities, churches, businesses and some community groups (such as our own HBPOA). Open PODs would be places like fairgrounds where medica-

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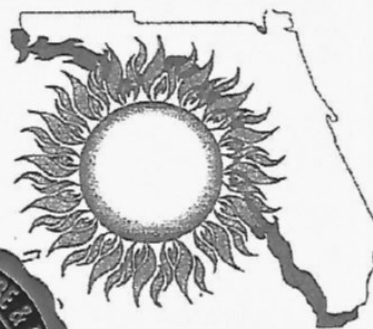

tion could be dispensed to large groups of people whereas the closed PODs would be able to take care of their people in a much faster and manageable way, thus ensuring meeting the 48-hour window of opportunity. Lea answered many questions from the group and explained how an organization such as ours would go about forming such a POD and also how it would function in the case of such an emergency. There seemed to be a lot of local interest and Kathy Frase promised to do some research as to how we might proceed. Following Lea's very important and informative presentation, the business portion of our meeting ensued with Kathy's calling for a motion to accept the minutes of the April meeting as posted in the Beachcomber. Jessie Manno so moved and Diane Greenwell seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Margo McConnell then gave the treasurer's report which included April's as well: Balance on Hand as of Feb. 28, 2018 was \$22,619.67 while the closing Balance on Hand as of April 30, 2018 was \$22,117.54. Again Margo reminded us that she and several other board members are looking into putting some of the money into an interest bearing account and they will report back to us when they have a possible plan. The report will be filed for audit.

**REPORTS:**

Landscaping.....Gladys Moore expressed pleasure in how both sites are faring at the moment, thanks in large part to a good group of people who came out this past month to assist in weeding and general cleanup of the Triangle. She thanked those who volunteered and informed us that another such event will need to happen this month prior to the advent of hot summer weather. Gladys also stressed the need for someone to step up and take over the responsibility of the site at Hwy 19 which she and Cal have taken care of for years now. Any help would be so appreciated.

Hospitality.....Kathy Frase began by emphasizing how much we need volunteers to come forward for each of our committees. She reported

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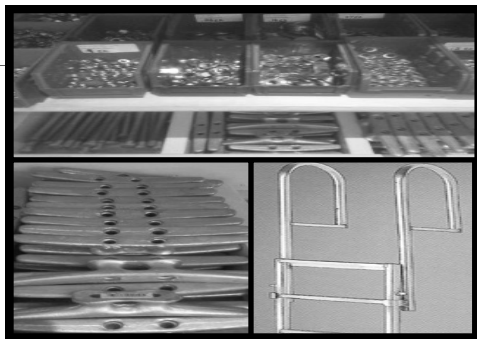


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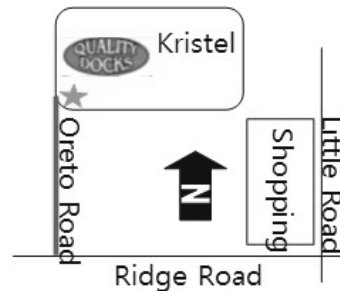

that we continue with the idea of giving out the new resident gift bags at our POA meetings since distributing them to various homes has become too energy intensive.

Publicity.....Kathy Frase reminded us on behalf of Jen Brown that the deadline for the June issue will be the 10<sup>th</sup> of May and also that the deadline for submission for the annual photo contest will be 8/18. Once again the theme is Hernando Beach Life.

Crime Watch.....Toby Wightman expressed the need for more volunteers, reminding us that all volunteers are under the auspices of the sheriff's department. Our community has had incidences in the recent past that perhaps could have been prevented by a greater presence of Crime Watch. He reminded us that their monthly meeting is on the second Wed. of each month at the VFW and also that the monthly luncheon will be May 30<sup>th</sup> this month at Zig Zags. This organization is dependent upon the generosity of individuals to continue to operate. To that end, Jesse Manno moved that Crime Watch receive a do-

nation of \$500 from HBPOA. Carolyn Manno seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Port Authority.....Benny Martinez began by making us aware that there has been some vandalism (batteries taken from channel markers, eg) as well as reckless boating (kayaks damaging sea grass, eg) and that we shouldn't hesitate to report such activity should we witness it. He also, with input from Steve Barton (Vice Chairman of PA) gave an enthusiastic recounting of all the wonderful and meaningful projects that have been and will continue happening to take care of the vital resource of our waterways. Some examples are the reef ball project and the recent oyster reef project, repair of some of the boat ramps, and the Hunter Lake project. He also mentioned the Strategic Plan and the Marine Plan which are being pursued. Margo McConnell pointed out that Hernando Beach has the second largest seagrass bed in the US and that we are an incredibly important part of coastal restoration; in fact, the various projects that have been accomplished through efforts like those of the Port Authority have made Hernando Beach the "poster child" of coastal restoration! It is hoped that Keith

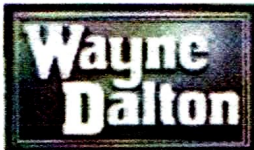

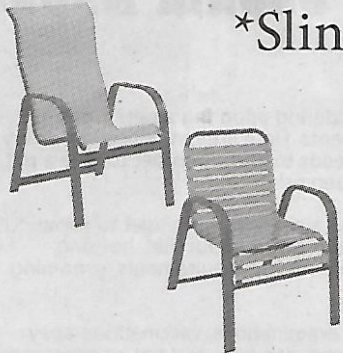
OLD BUSINESS:

Re: Hernando County Experiencing Increase in  
Sick Raccoons

Date: April 13, 2018

Hernando County is currently experiencing an in-  
crease in cases of sick raccoons.

In one of the first sick wildlife cases this year, the  
raccoon (remains) was collected and tested by the  
Hernando County Health Department. It was deter-  
mined that the raccoon did not have rabies, but did  
have distemper.

Raccoons are highly susceptible to both Canine  
and Feline Distemper. It is the second leading  
cause of death for raccoons and is nearly always  
fatal for the animal. There is no treatment for either  
form of distemper.

Raccoons that contract distemper initially show  
signs of upper respiratory infection (runny nose and  
watery eyes). In the final stages, raccoons may  
begin to wander aimlessly, walk in circles, and/or  
appear disoriented. The animal may experience  
paralysis or exhibit bizarre behavior as a result of  
brain damage from the infection.

If you see a raccoon that is showing these signs,  
stay away from the animal (also keep pets away)  
and contact a wildlife trapper or the Sheriff's Office.

Distemper is highly contagious. For this reason,  
HCSO deputies must euthanize any raccoon that  
we find that is displaying signs of distemper – then  
bury the animal at least two feet deep, on site. This  
is to prevent the spread of the virus to humans or  
other animals.

Please ensure that your pets are vaccinated and  
kept under control. Unvaccinated pets that are per-  
mitted to wander are at a higher risk to contract dis-  
temper and other harmful diseases. It is also a vio-  
lation of Hernando County Ordinances to allow pets  
to wander and/or to not be properly vaccinated and  
licensed.

With some simple, precautionary steps, we as a  
community can help prevent the spread of the dis-  
temper virus and keep our families and pets safe.

The Office of Sheriff:

The Office of the Sheriff is established by the Flori-  
da Constitution. As a constitutional officer, the  
Sheriff has the exclusive authority to administer his  
or her agency and is responsible for preserving the  
peace throughout the entire county, carrying out  
the laws of the state, the orders of Florida courts,  
and the ordinances of the Board of County Com-  
missioners. The Sheriff is the chief law enforcement  
and correctional officer of the county.

Sheriff Al Nienhuis was initially appointed as the  
Sheriff of Hernando County by the Governor in Jan-  
uary of 2011. He was then elected by the people of  
Hernando County in 2012, and remains accounta-  
ble to them.
