Keeping Your Pets Safe

Owning pets brings immeasurable joy and companionship to our lives. The unconditional love and loyalty they provide contribute to a sense of well-being and happiness. As we embrace the joy of having pets, it's essential to be mindful of our City ordinance regarding their care, ensuring their safety and the harmony of our community. Responsible pet ownership not only enhances our lives but also fosters a welcoming and secure environment in Hillsboro for all residents.

Sec. 4-36. - Required.

No person owning, controlling or having care or custody of a dog or cat over the age of three months shall permit the same to be and remain within the city unless such person shall obtain a license therefor in accordance with the provisions of this article and unless such person shall obtain and maintain a currently effective rabies vaccination thereof. Any person who violates this article shall, upon conviction therefor, be fined. (Code 1967, § 4-5; Ord. No. 19-80, § 1, 12-1-80; Ord. No. 8-82, § 1, 10-4-82; Ord. No. 15-94, § 1, 6-6-94)

Sec. 4-40. - Same—Fee.

A license fee of \$4.00 for each animal license applied for shall accompany the application, which fee shall be applicable whether the license is for a full year or for the unexpired part of a year.



Water Tower Project Update



If you have additional items for pickup (i.e. couch, stove, water heater), please call City Hall at (636) 797-3334 ext. 2 for pickup day and cost


Keep a 3 foot clearance around cart

 Containers/ Bags must not weigh more than 30 pounds.



 Paint Containers must be empty or solidified prior to being picked up. (Use kitty litter or sand to solidify left over paint.)



· Glass (window panes, storm doors, etc.. must be broken up and placed in a taped box marked glass.



· Liquids (i.e. thinners, oil, acids) and Medical waste (i.e. oxygen tanks, needles are not acceptable materials for pick up



 ALL boxes need to be broken down, and places INSIDE the trash bin for pickup



Our Commitment to the Community

2023 ANNUAL REPORT - Chief Steven Meinberg

As we make our way into 2024, here's a look back at some of the activities of our department in 2023.

50 Years of Service

2023 marked the 50th year of organized police service in the City of Hillsboro. We celebrated this in a number of ways. First, officers were issued a 50-Year Commemorative badge, which took design inspiration from one of the first badges the City of Hillsboro issued in 1976. We also presented a 50-Year Commemorative Chief's badge to the family of James Madonna, Hillsboro's first police chief. We received proclamations from both the City and the State of Missouri recognizing the anniversary, and County Executive Dennis Gannon declared May 20, 2023 as "Hillsboro Police Department Day" in Jefferson County.

Crime Summary

Hillsboro Police officers recorded 3.802 events in 2023, including 2,401 dispatched calls for service and 1,016 traffic stops. Officers took 550 reports and investigated 154 traffic crashes. For the past three years, calls for service have increased. 2019 currently holds the record for calls with 2,696. There was a sharp decrease in 2020 due to COVID-19, and calls have increased steadily again since 2021. We are almost back to pre-COVID numbers. Traffic accidents were almost identical to the previous year; 2023 = 154 compared to 2022 = 155. As usual, the traffic hot spots were on Business 21 at A and B. Enforcement was down with 1,344 citations/warnings written compared to 1,969 written in 2022.

Our ratio balance of 52% citations to 48% warnings still holds true as in past years. Overall, crime had slight variations within categories but generally were low altogether. It was a little harder to track this year, because the Federal guidelines have changed and they have implemented new procedures through a program called NIBRS. Next years' format will be better integrated.

Growth and Change

In 2023, we saw a number of new investments in our department. We were able to retire two antiquated patrol cars (a 2012 and 2013 Dodge Charger) and replace them with two 2023 Chevrolet Tahoes. These vehicles have the latest in safety-conscious design and are equipped with a number of features that allow our officers to do their jobs effectively. We were able to secure grant funding to equip all of our patrol vehicles with automated external defibrillators (AEDs), and have also outfitted each vehicle with in-car video systems.

In October, Hillsboro Police partnered with ASPEN, Inc., as they work to extend their mental health services to first responders. For too long, we have ignored the mental health toll that a career as a first responder takes on a person. We are excited to move toward a more holistic approach to the health and well-being of our employees who give so much of themselves to their jobs.



Hillsboro Police Invests In New Technology

The Hillsboro Police Department recently completed the launch of a new body-worn and in-car camera system. The system has been in development for approximately two years, and began with a review of established best practices and the creation of a policy to govern their use.

"We knew the day was coming when these would become a required part of police work," said Police Chief Steve Meinberg. "Sure enough, there is a federal mandate that all police departments deploy body-worn cameras by January of 2025. We elected to launch this year, to give us a year to get some of the technical kinks worked out. Motorola was selected after meeting with several vendors." Captain Darrick Curtis, the Assistant Chief of Police, created the policy and serves as the administrator of both camera systems.

"The policy was developed after reviewing the policies of several St. Louis-area police departments, all of which are internationally accredited," Curtis said. "Ours meets the rigorous standards for privacy, transparency, and retention."

In addition to body-worn cameras, all marked patrol vehicles have also been equipped with video and audio recording equipment.

"One of the neat things about the car cameras is they sync with the officer's body camera to provide multiple views of the same incident. On review, we can switch between the car and the body camera and see the same moment from different perspectives," said Capt. Curtis. In the world of policing, in-car camera systems have been in use for decades. Body-worn cameras, however, are a little newer. It ended up costing less to launch both systems at the same time, rather than individually. Videos taken by officers will be used to aid in the prosecution of criminal offenses,

investigate complaints against officers, and for in-house training and review with officers.
