In addition to her husband and the children already named, Mrs. Schneider is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Kate Bridges, of Ft. Worth, and a sister in Virginia. Her only brother, William Utley, died in Ft. Worth about two months ago.

The body will be brought here for burial. It will arrive on the Houston train tomorrow afternoon at 1:45 o'clock and the funeral will take place directly after its arrival from the Methodist Church, Rev. J. E. Lovett, assisted by Rev. A. L. Scarborough, of Cuero, to officiate. The interment will be made in the Evergreen Cemetery. Dr. W. L. Ward, Dr. E. G. Gray, W. E. Wilson, I. A. Heath, R. L. Groce and C. L. Hewitt will serve as pall bearers.

## CHAUTAUQUA OPENS AT EIGHT TONIGHT

Tonight at 8 o'clock is the grand opening of a glorious week of Chautauqua entertainments.
