


Tour the Hospital Ship USNS COMFORT in the morning and the Nuclear Carrier USS GERALD R FORD in the afternoon

USNS COMFORT (T-AH-20) is a Mercy-Class Hospital Ship with 1,000 bed, 12 operating rooms & 1,000 medical personnel. In 2013 COMFORT was assigned to Norfolk Naval Station to be close to Portsmouth Naval Hospital where some of its medical staff are based. In 2019 COMFORT was deployed to assist in South America and Caribbean humanitarian efforts.

USS GERALD R FORD (CVN-78) is the nation's first of a new class of nuclear aircraft carrier. One of the new features of the ship is an electromagnetic launch system that replaces traditional steam catapults. Built in Newport News, she was commissioned in Norfolk in 2017. The tour may include the ceremonial quarterdeck, hangar deck, flight deck, flight control, and pilot house.

KUDOS TO COUNCIL FROM NATIONAL NAVY LEAGUE PRESIDENT

"Many of our councils have the experience of supporting a certain group of servicemen and women, through ship or unit adoptions. But few had the experience that our Richmond Council recently did with a group of active-duty and Reserve joint service members they support. This council decided to start sending care packages to service members in eastern Africa, where many face threats from terror organizations. In early January, their worst fears were realized when a Somali terrorist group affiliated with al-Qaida attacked a military base in Kenya, killing a service member and two

American contractors. The council quickly realized that these first care packages were going directly to the service members at the center of the attacks.

Empowered with the knowledge that these service members needed them now more than ever, the Richmond Council has continued to step up their care packages, including items like fishing supplies and anything that might help them improve their morale and get their minds off the horrific attack they experienced. This is what it means to be a Navy Leaguer!!"

WHAT IS THE UNITED STATES NAVY MEMORIAL?

The United States Navy Memorial is on a mission: To honor, recognize and celebrate the men and women of the United States Sea Services (Navy, Marine, Coast Guard and Merchant Marine) past, present and future and to inform the public about their service.

The concept of a Navy Memorial was first envisioned by architect Pierre L'Enfant when he presented his city plan for the new Nation's Capital city in 1791. It took nearly 200 years for his vision to be realized.

In 1977 Admiral Arleigh Burke started to recruit a group to form the private non-profit U.S. Navy Memorial Foundation. Congress authorized the memorial in 1980 to be built with private funds. By December 1985, the foundation had raised sufficient funds to get the "go-ahead" with construction. The Memorial, located on Pennsylvania Ave between 17th and 19th Streets, was dedicated October 13, 1987, providing an extensive library of printed and audio historical documents on the Navy.

The Visitor's Center opened in June 1991, featuring daily screenings of the films "At Sea" and "A Day in the Life of the Blue Angels". A Media Resource Center provides a library of printed audio and videos on historical documents on the Navy. The Navy Log Room has a touch screen kiosk to register and search for Sea Service members and veterans.

For most of the month, we were tasked with conducting maritime security operations, culminating in a large scale seizure of weaponry in the Arabian Sea. That operation, which received significant national and international media coverage, is a testament to the professionalism and excellence of **NORMANDY's** Sailors. In CENT-COM's official release, they noted the weapons "were determined to be of Iranian origin and assessed to be destined for the Houthis in Yemen".

NORMANDY continued to show that she is the "Vanguard of Victory" by responding to a call from a distressed merchant vessel in the Gulf of Aden. It is our obligation to assist mariners in need of help. Our team assisted by USS FARRAGUT (DDG-99) and an allied warship were able to professionally and expeditiously render aid.

We finished the month by conducting a port visit to Duqm, Oman. The crew got an opportunity to recharge their batteries and prepare for the final stretch of this historic deployment. Our crew has continued to demonstrate the values of Honor, Courage and Commitment, displaying extreme professionalism throughout! I am extremely proud of our crew and what we as a team have accomplished.

COAST GUARD HISTORY IN ALASKA

In 1897, whaling ships were stranded in the ice on the north coast of Alaska. President McKinley ordered a risky 1,500-mile rescue on foot in the dead of winter. The Overland Relief Expedition commander was 1st LT David Jarvis of the BEAR, a ship of the U.S. Revenue Cutter Service. That service eventually became the Coast Guard. The USCGC JARVIS (WHEC-725) was commissioned in 1972.
