A PERSONAL EXPERIENCE WITH CHRIST



In the book of Genesis, God sought out our ancestors in the faith – Abraham (Chapters 12, 15, OLUMN 17); Isaac (Chapters 25 & 26); and Jacob (especially chapter 28). Moses encountered God in

Exodus chapter 3. God allowed each to experience Him, the One True God. These experiences helped them develop a personal relationship with God that lasted all through their lives and into eternity.

Today, many believers yearn for a personal experience of God. Christians yearn for a personal experience of, and relationship with Christ. Many go beyond merely yearning for it and actively search and work hard for it. This has led many to the right place and also led many to wrong places.

For us Catholics, especially those who truly yearn to experience God in their lives and desire that experience to change them, we have an answer or a reminder in today's Gospel - John 6:51-58. Jesus tells us that whoever eats His Flesh and drinks His Blood remains in Him and He in that person (v. 56).

Now let's look at, or think of this in a 3-D sort of way. I often imagine the journey of the Consecrated Body and Blood of Christ through my system and what happens and what it does in there. I think of the medications we take, liquid or tablet, orally or intravenously. I imagine how they permeate, seep through, fill or infuse our system. I imagine how some of them would start working almost immediately and some would delay a bit. I think of how some of them last longer than others in the system.

I invite us to spend some time and think of how the Eucharist we receive is somehow like that, but way more than that. I imagine how it permeates my body, my mind, my spirit, my soul, my entire life. I imagine how it becomes part of me - Christ becomes part of me! And miraculously I become part of Him. What a great mystery! Greater yet are the actions of Christ once in me. Like medication, yet much more, this Sacrament begins to heal my sick, wounded, hurting, aching, compromised system - spirit, soul, mind, body - my life! I wish each of us could understand this a little bit deeper. We could begin by trying a little bit harder. Nothing is beyond God.

Back to our search for a personal experience of God: now what closer experience of God could we Catholics possibly want? Sadly, many, after years of being Catholics and Communicants still don't get it or just don't believe it. Too good to be true? But whether we believe it or not, it is indeed truly Christ in flesh and blood. When truly received, we do become one with Him, one with God. That's as close and as personal as it gets; as life changing as it gets. The ball is in our court!

Lord, help us to understand and appreciate more fully the Sacrament of Your Body and Blood and its effects in our lives. Amen.

Queenship of Mary

August 22nd Memorial



Pius XII established this feast in 1954. But Mary's queenship has roots in Scripture. At the Annunication Gabriel announced that Mary's Son would receive the throne of David and rule forever. At the Visitation, Elizabeth calls Mary "mother of my Lord." As in all the mysteries of Mary's life, Mary is closely associated with Jesus: Her queenship is a share in Jesus' kingship. We can also recall that in the Old

Testament the mother of the king has great influence in court.

In the fourth century Saint Ephrem called Mary "Lady" and "Queen" and Church Fathers and Doctors continued to use the title. Hymns of the eleventh to thirteenth centuries address Mary as queen: "Hail, Holy Queen," "Hail, Queen of Heaven," "Queen of Heaven." The Dominican rosary and the Franciscan crown as well as numerous invocations in Mary's litany celebrate her queenship.

The feast is a logical follow-up to the Assumption and is now celebrated on the octave day of that feast. In his encyclical *To the Queen of Heaven*, Pius XII points out that Mary deserves the title because she is Mother of God, because she is closely associated as the New Eve with Jesus' redemptive work, because of her preeminent perfection and because of her intercessory power.

COMMENT: As Saint Paul suggests in Romans 8:28-30, God has predestined human beings from all eternity to share the image of His Son. All the more was Mary predestined to be the mother of Jesus. As Jesus was to be king of all creation, Mary, in dependence on Jesus, was to be queen. All other titles to queenship derive from this eternal intention of God. As Jesus exercised His kingship on earth by serving His Father and His fellow human being, so did Mary exercise her queenship. As the glorified Jesus remains with us as our king till the end of time (Matthew 28:20), so does Mary, who was assumed into heaven and crowned queen of heaven and earth.

QUOTE: "Let the entire body of the faithful pour forth persevering prayer to the Mother of God and Mother of men. Let them implore that she who aided the beginnings of the Church by her prayers may now, exalted as she is in heaven above all the saints and angels, intercede with her Son in the fellowship of all the saints. May she do so until all the peoples of the human family, whether they are honored with the name of Christian or whether they still do not know their Savior, are happily gathered together in peace and harmony into the one People of God, for the glory of the Most Holy and Undivided Trinity" (*Dogmatic Constitution on the Church*,69).
