#### **CLERGY COLUMN**

### Happy Lord's Day!

We welcome this Sunday Fr. Tom Niehaus, who is normally assigned to St. Philip's in Bemidji. He has graciously agreed to come and offer Masses in these parishes this weekend while I am at the spirituality course Bishop Cozzens asked me to attend. I'm confident all will have an opportunity to grow in holiness and love through Fr. Tom's ministry today.

I didn't mention this last week, but the Solemnity of the Epiphany is not limited to only the visit of the magi that we heard about last week. It is traditionally associated with three separate events in the life of Jesus: the visit of the magi, the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River, and the wedding feast at Cana. As it turns out, the Church always celebrates the Baptism of the Lord after Epiphany Sunday. If Epiphany lands on either January 7th or 8th, then the Baptism of the Lord misses out on a Sunday Mass and ends up being celebrated on the Monday after Epiphany Sunday. This year, we have the feast day on a Sunday. Next Sunday, we'll begin our Ordinary Time Sunday readings by hearing about...the wedding at Cana! The connection is preserved, at least for this year. Interestingly enough, the wedding at Cana is not always the Gospel passage on the Sunday after the Baptism of the Lord.

I mentioned that the word epiphany means "manifestation; revelation; shining upon" and that the primary thing that is revealed is the identity of Jesus. With the visit of the magi, Jesus is revealed to be much more than an ordinary baby. He is truly extraordinary and this is revealed by visit of these men from far away lands and by the treasures that they present to Jesus. Gold, frankincense, and myrrh reveal Jesus to be a divine king who has come to offer himself as a sacrifice to God. Today, at the Baptism of the Lord, the heavens open and we hear the voice of God who reveals that Jesus is His Beloved Son! Finally, the miracle at Cana, which is only the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, reveals that Jesus can do things that only God can do. It just keeps getting better and better as the story moves along!

What's more, we also see at Cana that Mary has a certain sway over Jesus. It makes sense: being a faithful Jew, Jesus would have kept the Fourth Commandment: Honor your father and mother. There's also a deeper role that Mary holds, however. In ancient Judah, the mother of the king held the prominent position of the Queen Mother. If you read the Old Testament, whenever they mention the King of Judah, they don't mention his wife in relation to him, but instead his mother. The Queen Mother had a role in the kingdom to rule beside her son the King. With the magi, Jesus is revealed to be the divine king, born in Bethlehem of Judah, which would make Mary the queen mother. Beautiful! Maybe I'll talk more about that next week, but in the meantime we can turn to Mary and seek her prayers for us as she sits beside her Son, the King of the Universe.

## New Year resolutions, or maybe a 'theme' for the new year instead?

We all know about new year's resolutions. We've all made them and didn't even keep them through the end of January, let alone the whole year! The resolution to lose weight, walk more, get organized etc. Once we blow it we just quietly give up. As Catholics, we are fortunate that the Church calendar gifts us another opportunity to make resolutions later in the year after this cutoff point—namely, the start of Lent, when we can resolve to increase our devotion for a few weeks in some form or another. But Lent doesn't start until March 5th this year!

Maybe it would be better to adopt a 'theme' for the year instead. Let's make our theme, "Does this bring me closer to God?"

Whether you are faced with difficult decisions or the little nagging habits that you barely think about, pause and consider what you are doing and ask, "Does this really bring me closer to God? Does this really serve the goal of holiness?" In other words, will gossiping about others bring me closer to God? Will complaining about everyone or everything bring me closer to God? Will avoiding to stay after church and have coffee and getting to know fellow church members better bring me closer to God? Will coming up with an excuse to not help out bring me closer to God? Will having an excuse as to why you don't go visit others or invite others to your home or out to coffee bring you closer to God? Will not volunteering in Church bring me closer to God, what about community service? Will this bring me closer to God? Some people are very judgmental and unkind to family members that no longer go to church, does this bring you closer to God or them closer to God? Would helping neighbors with errands, yard work, or home repairs, especially those who may struggle to do so themselves bring you closer to God? Does avoiding people bring you closer to God? Does refusing to forgive someone bring you closer to God? What about those grudges you've been harboring for years, does that bring you closer to God? Does mindless scrolling on your phone for hours bring you closer to God? What about too much TV watching? Does that bring you closer to God?

Again, pause and consider what you are doing, thinking, or saying and ask, "Does this really get me closer to God? Does this really serve the goal of holiness?

No matter where we find ourselves, by increasing our awareness of God, by striving for a year of being closer to God, regardless of what happens, we will have His peace.
