Their witness to the world can inspire us in our own ministry and encourage us to "run the race set before us," as they once did. The apology of the Augsburg Confession states that the remembrance of saints serves three purposes: thanksgiving to God for the example of his mercy and salvation; strengthening of faith by their example; and imitation of their faith and virtue.

For this purpose, the Lutheran church keeps an extensive calendar of days of commemoration throughout the year for this purpose. You can find this calendar at the start of the ELW on page 15 under the title "Lesser Festivals and Commemorations." Next time you have a hymnal in your hand, check it out! St. Paul's Preschool & PMO has been a member of the ELEA for over 10 years. There are 1400 Lutheran schools, including full and part-time preschools, and many of them are members of the ELEA. The ELEA provides connections between schools throughout the country.



The ELEA provides Lutheran education leaders with a community through communication, professional development, faith formation and professional resources. This association was a huge support during the early part of the pandemic as schools were figuring out how to reopen safely and shift our learning to outside. We met weekly on Zoom to support each other. brainstorm challenges and share success stories. After some time, the weekly meeting shifted into professional development online

workshops for directors and principals to learn more about areas such as outdoor education, faith formation, race and culture, operations, and other health and safety guidelines.

The ELEA listserve has been invaluable over the years to share best practices, tuition and salary information, staff recruitment, grant opportunities just to name a few. Updates from February's Social Ministry Committee meeting:

- We celebrated the recent coming together of the 1) Continuing Conversation Group (CCG) and Social Ministry. The CCG has been closely affiliated with the Social Ministry committee since CCG's formation in 2016. The Social Ministry committee commends and honors the work achieved by the CCG, particularly in their efforts re: education and raising awareness about matters of racial justice and social inequity. In addition to more fully incorporating CCG's work into ongoing and future Social Ministry activities, we also commit to planning events on an on-going basis which continue in the tradition of celebrating ethnic and cultural diversity and continued dialogue as established by the CCG.
- 2) We reaffirmed that our committee's primary emphasis will continue to be addressing food insecurity issues, both locally and globally. After reviewing lists of potential ministries, we also added voter education and registration as a secondary focus for this year.
- 3) We developed a tentative calendar of activities for the remainder of 2024. In addition to the events already scheduled (Rise Against Hunger, CROP Walk Durham, and Camp Destiny), we hope to organize activities for:
 - Earth Day (April 22)
 - Juneteenth Celebration (June 19th)
 - Voter Registration and Education, possible training (August)
 - Ministry Fair (September)
 - Gleaning event (October)
 - Celebration of "African Americans in the Arts" (October/November)
 - Fair Trade Fair (November)

Since we are in the very beginning stages of planning for these events, we need & welcome your input and expertise! Please contact Joan Pepper (irisdragonfly@yahoo.com) if you are interested in helping plan any of these events and/or have previous experience organizing an event on the list and are willing to point us towards resources. As per our regular practice, we will be creating leadership teams to do the organizing for each event ... you will not be left on your own!

CROP Walk Leadership Team – We are seeking 2-3 volunteers to serve on an expanded leadership team for CROP Walk Durham, an annual event held each year on Palm Sunday which allows individuals to take direct action to fight hunger both locally and around the world. Refugee Field Trip

It was a field trip like none other. On February 4, the good souls of St. Paul's who are helping to resettle two Afghan families took them to Durham's Museum of Life and Sciences and glory be, none of the 15 children who participated got mislaid.

The trip was organized by new member Shelly McGee who recruited Tim Hoke to drive the church bus, while Kim Hoke, Deb Tabert, and the Harts, Phil and Sally, drove the mothers along with the smallest, non-walking children in separate cars.





The children were a sight to behold in their shimmering Sunday best clothes. One of the mothers had been sewing for

a month to make outfits for her five daughters. The other mother had been hard at work as well. Both mothers are highly skilled seamstresses and it shows.

The two Safi families are related (cousins, they say), but St. Paul's is officially helping with only the Gul Wali Safi family, which is under the aegis of Lutheran Services of the Carolinas. This family has 9 children. The second family has 8 children.

Several members of St. Paul's have been helping with the minutiae of resettlement, which has included organizing and driving to doctor's appointments, getting the children enrolled in their respective schools, and arranging school bus transportation. With so many children in the two families, this has required an enormous chunk of time. In addition, members have been taking the families shopping and generally helping them to get oriented to their new surroundings in multiple ways. Shelly McGee and Carolyn Ulrich have been visiting the families once a week to teach the mothers some English. The members of St. Paul's refugee resettlement committee are Morris Casper, Phil and Sally Hart, Jayce Getz, Kevin and Ellen Lavery, Nan Treul, Bill Gresham, Shelly McGee, and Carolyn Ulrich. Our book fits into several genres – best seller, historical fiction, mystery, crime, and African American literature, to name a few. It has garnered numerous "book of the year" awards from newspapers, booksellers, broadcasters, and other notables. It has been described as a boisterous hymn to community, mercy, and karmic justice. The story starts in June 1972, with the Pennsylvania State Police investigating a skeleton found at the bottom of an old well in an area marked for redevelopment. McBride then flashes back to the past, to the '20s and '30s, to explore the remains' connections to Pottstown's Black, Jewish, and immigrant history. But rather than a straightforward whodunit, McBride weaves an intimate tale of community.

Books for the following two months are *Death Be Not Proud* by Jon Bunther (memoir) in April and *The Madness of Crowds* by Louise Penny (mystery) in May.

Our meetings are held in Trinity Hall on the third Thursday of most months at 3 pm. It is an informal gathering to talk about our book for the month, led by a facilitator. We try to select books from different genres to stretch our horizons, as well as to appeal to a wide range of people.
