I learned so much about the total operations of Sons of Norway at this biennial gathering which was hosted by our District Six Board. #### SPRÅKRÅDET SURVEY SHEDS LIGHT ON LANGUAGE SHIFTS

Norway's language council, Språkrådet, recently highlighted a number of interesting shifts in Norway's language trends in their 2012 status report.

For starters, a growing number of Norwegians are dissatisfied with the prevalence of English in Norwegian advertising. Two thirds of survey respondents said they would prefer all of the country's advertising and marketing be in Norwegian. The survey also indicated that fewer members of the business community believe that the use of English supports increased sales. At the same time, the council's 2012 status report indicates that Norwegian is under "continual pressure from English in many areas of society." For example, businesses as well as many state-owned companies with an international presence typically avoid publishing their annual reports in Norwegian to accommodate the needs of a global marketplace. The report also points out that social media is a likely catalyst for language trends, causing a ripple effect in language usage beyond an online environment. Study results also indicate a similar push toward English use in higher education and research sectors. Council chief Arnfinn Muruvik Voen stresses the possible implications of this shift saying, "Many of us are not as good at English as we think. In any case, we are a lot worse at English than we are at Norwegian. Consequently, we risk making more mistakes and doing our jobs less well in many ways if English is the language used." Språkrådet also reported both losses and gains for Norway's second language, Nynorsk. Despite being used less in schools, Nynorsk is gaining ground online. Wikipedia's Nynorsk version grew at twice the rate of the Bokmål version last year.

#### HALLOWEEN IN NORWAY

Trolls and vikings are frightening enough in Norwegian folktales and history books. Add some witches and ghosts to the mix and you have a very hair-raising combination. Slowly but surely the American traditions of Halloween are becoming more common in Norway. Stores are seeing spikes in Halloween sales and with the widespread presence of American influence, Halloween is tricking or possibly treating its way into the hearts of children, families, and businesses around Norway.

Halloween has essentially been a new phenomenon in Norway having been celebrated for only the past 15 years. As Americans began traveling, living, and moving to Norway they brought over their holiday traditions. Stores started carrying and selling Halloween decorations and candy, and the ripple effect caught on. Just like in the U.S. it is obvious when some people refuse to participate by keeping their house lights off, while others go all out with homemade haunted houses and spooky decorations in the front yard.

Because children play a significant role in Norway's society, this is an appealing tradition for both kids and adults is a great addition to the fall season. There are those that are bothered by the spread of "Americanized" holiday hoopla and others who can't wait to dress up in costumes, decorate their houses, and eat too much candy. Kids are going door to door, mainly in the bigger cities, saying "Knask eller Knep" or "Digg eller deng" in order to get candy. Sound familiar?

Time will tell if this tradition will grow, but it seems like it can only get more popular from here. Let's just hope the trolls don't get mad at the witches, ghosts, and goblins making their way into Norway.





#### INTERNATIONAL IN BRIEF

The following is a report/my thoughts\* on convention events which occurred in Fargo at International

Marit Kristianson, D-2 was elected President, via a white ballot;

There were contests in the other executive races. My experiences with each of them confirmed the realization that all were qualified and worthy.

VP - Ernst Granby, D-8 did not qualify for the 2nd ballot - he does remain as the International Director from Norway for 2 more years;

Auden Gythfeldt was International Secretary, Ralph Peterson was Chair of the Dist. Pres. Council & elected to International in his District - A close race with Ralph the new VP. Both from D-3. Sec. - Karl Hella, D-1 Sec. for many years did not qualify for the 2nd ballot.

Barbara Berntsen, D-3 and Jon Tehven, D-1 had each served for four years as their International Director. Jon won in a close race.

Treas. - Another close race; however Bill Fosmoe, D-2, did win over our Roger Espeland, D-6. Note: Roger of course remains as Alternate to D-6 Director Janie Kelly; Janie was elected as the 5th member of Executive Board on Sun, morning,

A neat race for Hosting the 2014 International Lodge Meeting. It will be in Jacksonville, FL, Aug. 21-25. Eidsvold, Norway was the other possibility. Dean Stiller provided details so as to make the financial details more closely provide figures as "apples to apples". Projected costs for International to send supplies and approx. 25 people were \$126. for FL and \$186 to \$193 for Norway, depending on Kroner/US split. Note: we also received prior averages at today's rate, with Fargo = \$135; Idaho = 154; San Diego = \$189; Vancouver = \$182; DC = \$150; Madison, WI = \$140; Stavanger = \$172; Anaheim = \$152.

\*subject to more detailed and possible more clearly defined follow-ups.

Resolutions regarding Charter & Constitution updates and changes will be forthcoming to further clarify. This was the 3rd convention responding to this.

Bylaw and Resolutions presented:

Bylaw change 4.10.2-revised to "when approved by the Chief Executive Officer and Legal Counsel'

Appeal process 1.8.1.4 - approved more detailed information and shorter response time during the process

Nominations at International - clarified speeches given, with the requirement to give one from the nominee, etc

International Director Term of Office - Beginning in 2014, a limit to one consecutive four-year term for Directors; currently there was a two-term (8 year) limit.

Cultural Programs - D-1 will pilot the study of offering programs to also offer multimedia alternatives .... to enhance the broad range of heritage and culture ...

Viking for Kids - a form of steady communication be developed for regular basis distribution. Also that "Be it further resolved that when such decisions about key aspects of our Order are made, each lodge be individually provided with notification beyond printing it in the International Board Minutes or not in the Viking.

Dues Increase Notification - Regarding the raising of dues, which is no longer handled at International conventions, provided that when a change is made -- there be widespread notice via email to local lodge officers and members.

Name of Organization - The Resolution was passed as printed with the request that each District President shall appoint a member to a committee who will review a name change, draw conclusions and submit a written report to International Lodge in 2014. Note: there was what could be termed as a 'sidebar' to this wherein all District Presidents agreed that we 8 would be the named committee as this can easily be incorporated into our DPC meetings each fall and spring at Headquarters.

District Six "New Lodge Development" It was defeated in its present format.

(It was a negative but I saw many paddles not responding. I believe the majority of our members definitely favor pursuing this effort and I shall continue to pursue this under the new 'regime' when we are in Minneapolis for our semi-annual meetings).

Members Services - a request from Norway on clarifying. Defeated as this can be handled within our current system.

Affiliate Membership, 4.6.2.1 - Affiliate members shall "at the discretion of the affiliate lodge", have all rights.

New Member sign-up - a defeat for possibility of new members being assigned to Spirit of New Century (999) if they have made a request to join a local lodge who still votes on new and transferred in members

A poem was stated at the conclusion of sessions - this was good. However, a Ray Fosse ending for sessions is the absolute best.

There was of course a lot happening otherwise. The Innovative Leadership conference was positive & informative with 15 of our 18 delegates attending it, plus Marne Olson, Carl Peter I., Carolyn Dahl, Nancy West, 6-61, and Tania Oldervik, 6-107, a sister of Teresa Broadhead, our District Tubfrim Coordinator. Sissel Disbrow, 6-107, also attended sessions as a visitor.

The committees were composed of four each and so there was a neat time for interactions among all during the Monday and Tuesday meetings.

Kringen Lodge did an outstanding job; the Ramada staff was efficient, but we had definitely been spoiled by the Holiday Inn staff in Mesa.

I was on the Finance Committee, Mary Beth was on the Law Committee, Nancy Madson was one of the busy Tellers.

Awards were presented during the final banquet, including the top awards for Tier 1 (large) and Tier 2 (small) Lodges of the Year for 2010 and 2011. I was pleased to accept the Tier 2, 2010, on behalf of Hvite Fjell, Reno. I then presented this International LOY to their leaders during the Northern CA Kretsstevne on Sept. 2nd.

In addition to myself, the other delegates attending from Zone 8 were Crystal Sundet and Linda Ault.
