

Such exciting news to report! Due to the amazing work of board members Gwen Easterday and Maureen Riley, we now have a slate of nominees for the **2020 IAS Board of Directors**! And here they are:

We will vote on these nominees during a (very short) business meeting at our Christmas Party on December 15. We will also ask if there are any additional nominees at that time. And, as a reminder, at our last general membership meeting on November 8, we voted to accept the revised by-laws, which include this limitation on board terms: "Board officers may not seek re-election for officer positions for more than one additional <u>consecutive</u> term, <u>with the exception of the Treasurer</u>, <u>which may be held until that officer resigns</u>, <u>decides not to run, or is removed from office</u>. Non-officer board members (directors-at-large) may seek election for an officer position after serving one or two years on the Board." So this will be my last year as IAS president (although I will stay on for one last year as Past President). So great to have new folks and new viewpoints!

In other news, if you look at the last page of this newsletter (p. 12), you will see a revised version of our membership application form. Since some of our IAS members also enjoy participating in the events held by the German-American Club (and also like visiting the GAC bar), we have entered into an agreement with the GAC that individual IAS members can, if they so wish, choose to become associate members of the GAC by adding a \$5 fee to their IAS membership. You can do this both by mail (using the application form on p. 12) or online at our website (by clicking the GAC button). So if, say, my husband and I pay for an IAS family membership, as we do each year, if we also want to be associate GAC members, we would pay \$25 for the IAS and then add \$10 (2 x \$5) for a total of \$35. The IAS will then send us two GAC associate member cards, which we would bring with us anytime we visit the GAC. (Per State of NM Alcohol Commission rules, anyone visiting the GAC MUST have a valid membership card on their person.) It's your choice to join the GAC, but it's also our way of supporting the GAC, where we have been welcomed for so many years.

As I type this, it's coming close on Thanksgiving. Hope you and yours have a wonderful holiday season this year! Hope to see you at the Christmas Party on December 15!

IAS General Meeting Minutes November 8th, 2019

CALL TO ORDER AND WELCOME

Meeting was called to order a bit after 7:00 PM by Ellen Dowling, President. Visitors were welcomed and introduced: Jeanne Marie Bridge and Cyndi Cooper-Jones, Shelley and Gary Carter, Diane Gray and Patrick Phelan, Lloyd and Terri Kreitzer, Lisa Harrow and Manny Wright, and Dave Hesse. Introduction of Board Members who were present: President Ellen Dowling, Secretary Tracee Edwards, Treasurer Kathy Wimmer, and Members-at-Large: Maureen Riley, Laura Banks, and Gwen Easterday.

BUSINESS

Ellen presented the proposed changes for the IAS By-Laws that had been sent out earlier and the two new proposals that were discussed during previous evening's board meeting regarding Article I – first paragraph – (hereinafter referred to in these by-laws as "The Society" or abbreviated as "IAS") and Article V – in reference to the Treasurer being a permanent member of the Board (until his or her resignation). Ellen advised that hard copies of the by-laws with proposed changes were available at each table for review. Ellen asked if members were ready to vote and a few concerns were brought up by Jay Vandersloot. Ellen asked that members stay after the musical performance to go over new by-law concerns/questions.

REFRESHMENTS AND ENTERTAINMENT

Meeting was temporarily adjourned for delicious refreshments and the beautiful music of the Canterbury Harp Ensemble, who entertained us with some wonderful arrangements of Irish Christmas music and other tunes!

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Ellen asked for members to stay and discuss by-law concerns and questions. Jay Vandersloot presented his concerns which were:

Article III Section 5 –use of "Membership Chair" and then in Article IV Section 1 "Membership Director" is used and may cause confusion.

Article IV Section 1 (bottom of 1st page and top of 2nd page) – Potential issue of no one running for officer positions.

Article V Section 1 – concern regarding being bound by Roberts Rules of Order.

Article V – Sections 4 and 5 – Section 4 states outlines a 2/3 majority for disciplinary or impeachment measures and a simple majority for voting. Section 5 states there must be at least 15 members present to conduct business at a general membership meeting which Jay states may create issues when 15 people do not show.

Discussion ensued about changing the wording of "Membership Chair" to "Membership Director" in Article III Section 5. Take out Roberts Rules of Order. Take out Section 5 of Article V completely and re-number the sections. Ellen called for a motion to adopt the by-laws as amended. Ken Callahan moved to adopt by-laws as amended; seconded by Larry Compton. By-laws adopted as amended by majority vote. Ellen thanked Laura Banks, Gwen Easterday and Maureen Riley for all their hard work!

Donkeys, Guinness and the Hundred Thousand Welcomes

One October morning in Cork, Ireland several weeks ago, I woke up with the Full Irish Hangover, a result of the Full Irish Dinner and the Full Irish *Céad Míle Fáilte* (Hundred Thousand Welcomes). I was on my first trip to Ireland, a whole 17 days that took me in a circle from Dublin, down the east coast to Wexford, up to Kilkenny, down to Cork, then across to Dingle, up the west coast's Wild Atlantic Way to Doolin and on to Galway, and then, finally, back across the country to the lovely sea-side town of Malahide, which is right above Dublin and conveniently near the airport.

Like many Americans of European descent, I knew I had some Irish ancestry and had long hoped to experience the country's million shades of green, lively trad music, and the best butter you'll ever have. Breaking in my brand new passport in Ireland was truly a dream come true. When you're a tourist, doing touristy things is expected and indeed, I did many touristy things, ranging from drinking my first Guinness in Ireland (which really IS better than Guinness anywhere else!) at the Temple Bar in Dublin to visiting Cobh (where the Titanic set sail for her doomed maiden voyage), to marveling at the Cliffs of Moher near Doolin. I also had a "falconry experience" in Dingle, bought a gorgeous D whistle in a magical music shop in Killarney, petted donkeys in a field outside Wexford at sunrise, wrestled unsuccessfully with my long hair on the extremely windy Inch Beach, and had a drink in Sean's Bar in Athlone, oldest pub in Ireland (according to the Cuinness Pack of World Becords, anyway). And of source heing a layer of



to the Guinness Book of World Records, anyway). And of course, being a lover of traditional Irish music, I listened to as much of it as I could, ranging from lackluster wannabe buskers to spectacular true musicians.

But I also enjoy making more personal connections on trips when possible, and having experiences that aren't about going on a museum tour or photographing a historic building or being waited on in a pub. I've made long-distance friends with people in other countries since I was a kid, first as pen-pals, sending red- and blue-striped international airmail envelopes full of missives written with actual pen and paper; and then later as an adult, via chatting over the Internet. Over the years, I've met quite a few of these far-flung friends. So it felt completely natural to get in touch with an Internet friend I'd made who lives in Cork, to say maybe we could have coffee or lunch or something. Michelle jumped right over coffee or lunch or something, and went straight to, "You must come stay at my house!" I demurred at staying with her, as the B&B had already been booked and paid for, so she offered to make dinner instead, which I happily and gratefully accepted.



What an honor to be invited into an actual Irish person's home and offered a home-cooked meal! It's one of the best ways to really experience a country and the people who live there. On the way from the B&B in Cork to her village, which was about half an hour outside the city, she asked if it would be ok to make a quick detour to meet her parents. Amused, I said yes, of course. Her somewhat startled Mum answered the door and reflexively offered us in for a cuppa, "But we can't stay," said Michelle. "I've got the roast in the oven—I just wanted to show you that I'm not about to have dinner with an axe murderer or anything like that!"

Being an Irish native, Michelle hurtled her car nonchalantly down uneven and narrow two-lane roads to her house at what felt like breakneck speed and in apparent unconcern with the closeness of the hedges, and I tried

to act equally nonchalant, and not to shriek like a banshee when it seemed like the car was going to launch off the side of the road and into the trees. Driving in this country on the wrong side of the road on the wrong side of

the car on lanes that were not so generous as the ones here in America was starting to feel ever so slightly more normal, but there's no way I would've been comfortable driving that fast myself.



At Michelle's house ("just a standard semi-D", she said cheerfully as she pulled into the driveway), she quickly got back to work on dinner, which would also be attended by her husband and three sons, and four of her friends and neighbors, making it into a real party. Being a caterer, she was a great cook. Appetizers were a mountain of battered deep-fried Brie wedges, which she placed on rocket salad. I watched, fascinated, as she quickly cut up fat triangles from wheel after wheel of cheese, mixed up an eggy batter and a dry mixture, and then dipped the coated wedges into a deep fryer waiting on the counter. The main dish was a roulade of pork stuffed with black pudding and wrapped in spinach and bacon. On the side were perfectly fried potatoes, crispy on the

outside and creamy on the inside, and button mushrooms in gravy. I hadn't tried black pudding yet; as with haggis in Scotland, I was simultaneously intrigued and repulsed by the concept. But I did try haggis in Scotland a few years ago—at my very last breakfast. It was good, though I probably won't ever want it again, and I felt like I'd checked that off my life-experience-list. So, I'd wanted to check black pudding off that list, too. And here was this lovely meal this lovely lady had prepared lovingly from scratch in her own home, so of course I was going to try it. Except that the black pudding itself hadn't been lovingly prepared by her. "Did you make this yourself?" I asked, and she laughed: "Ain't nobody got time for that!" On the side, there were two kinds of bread, brown and white, and an enormous crock of that great Irish butter. To drink, plenty of beer and wine.

After such a meal I didn't know if I could handle dessert, but how could I turn away the enormous cheese plate full of a variety of delicious Irish, French, and English cheeses, and two cakes: Michelle's Irish-style caramel cheesecake with Maltesers (the British version of Whoppers) ringing around on top, and a juicy Moroccan orange cake her neighbor made. It was all delicious, the entire meal was incredibly delicious. Set on her best china, she said, taken out only for special occasions.

I'd brought a little gift from NM for her, and she had one for me too, one which echoed her meal with its abundant generosity. Getting to enjoy an evening with people who live here, in their home, laughing over wine and conversations and a meal—it was so special. Not sure how I got this lucky. It took many tries before I was finally allowed to leave: "It's an Irish tradition, I'll refuse you the first three times but keep trying!" she said with a smile, and oh she meant it—I had to keep trying and trying, more than three times worth. And despite my protests, she also packed up a takeaway of an entire second and third meals worth of leftover cheeses and cakes and slices of bread, complete with a tub of that delicious butter.




P.S. I never did have the Full Irish Breakfast. This means, of course, that I will need to return to Ireland to remedy this shortcoming. And I hope that I do. It wasn't just Michelle that gave me such an incredible welcome, it was the entire beautiful country, and I can't wait to go back. I'll need to fast for at least a month first, though. I think I'm still hungover from that Full Irish Dinner.

The Irish Book Club



What the Wind Knows, by Amy Harmon

OK, all you *Outlander* lovers, listen up: If you are a fan of Diana Gabaldon's series about a British woman in 1946 who is magically transported back to Scotland in 1743, you will be equally delighted by Amy Harmon's (much shorter) tale about a woman (a New Yorker) in 2000 who is magically transported back to Ireland in 1921, arriving just in time to experience the Irish Civil War up close and personal. Irish Book Club readers loved this book, both for the suspense as well as the historical details (including an up-close depiction of Michael "Mick" Collins). No spoiler alerts here; in case you want to read this very entertaining book, we won't reveal the (very surprising, we thought) ending. Here's a short assessment from Irish Book Club member (and author herself), Heidi Daniele: "I really enjoyed this book for so many reasons. When I realized it was time travel, I thought for sure it would lose me. But I stayed with it and felt Amy Harmon did a beautiful job of weaving time. The historical pieces really



drew me in—I feel like I have a better understanding of the difficult time and decisions my ancestors were faced with during the rising and revolution."


