What is DACA?

Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) is an American immigration policy founded by the Obama administration in June 2012. DACA allows certain illegal immigrants who entered the country as minors, to receive a renewable two-year period of deferred action from deportation and eligibility for a work permit.

What is MN Dream Act?

The MN Dream Act will provide certain benefits to undocumented students who meet the following criteria:

- Attended a Minnesota high school for at least 3 years;
- and Graduated from a Minnesota high school or earned a GED in Minnesota;
- and Complied with Selective Service registration requirements;
- and Provide documentation to show they have applied for lawful immigration status but only if a federal process exists for a student to do so.
