The Name Jesus BHCQN*

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The subject of this Quick Note is "the English word Jesus," not beliefs linked that word.

"Jesus" is a name that became well-known and popular through "English translations of the New Testament."

Facts

- 1. The English letter "J" did not become part of the English alphabet until the late 16th century CE.
- 2. The English word "<u>Jesus</u>" first appeared in English translations of the Bible in the 17th century.
- 3. Before the appearance of the word "Jesus," an earlier English translator chose to use the word "*Ihesus*" (14th century).
- 4. Bible translators translated the Greek word " $I\eta\sigma\sigma\dot{\nu}\varsigma$ " and the Latin word "lēsūs" "Jesus" in their English translations.
- 5. The English language did not exist in early first century CE when the person referred to by the name "Jesus" lived and taught in Galilee and Judea.

Yeshua

- 1. The name of the person called "Jesus" was actually ผู้เพิ่ว (Yeshua).
- 2. "Yeshua" is a Hebrew word and was the third most popular name of males in Galilee and Judea during the time he lived and taught.
- 3. He was named "Yeshua" on the eighth day of his life by Joseph, the person that was considered to be his father in his hometown of Nazareth.
- 4. Yeshua spoke Hebrew, taught in Hebrew and had the skills and education to read Hebrew Scriptures (called the *Tankh* and *Old Testament* today) from scrolls (not books).

Things to Consider

- 1. For many Christians, "Jesus" is the <u>unique</u> name of only person.
- 2. For some Christians, "Jesus" is the name that must be used when they pray.
- 3. A Christian doctrine of some institutions is that "one can only be saved in the name of Jesus."

How to Use this Information

- 1. Update your personal belief system (beliefscape) by making the English word "Jesus" a red flag and reminder to *think*, *speak* and *write* "Yeshua."
- 2. Use the Hebrew word "Yeshua" to reconnect him to the Jewish culture in which he lived, thought and taught.
- 3. Use the word "Yeshua" to <u>spread accurate information</u> instead of <u>misinformation</u> or <u>disinformation</u>. "<u>Misinformation</u>" is information that the <u>user does not know</u> is inaccurate. "<u>Disinformation</u>" is information that the <u>user knows is inaccurate</u> and still spreads it.
- 4. Use the word "Yeshua" to <u>raise awareness</u> of the <u>importance and value of accurate information</u>. We suggest using phrases like this to accomplish that goal -- "You know that's what I used to call him before I learned"
- 5. Please do not use *BHC Quick Notes* as "linguistic clubs" to create polarization, cause arguments or to embarrass people.
