

Devotion for Thursday, April 30, 2020:

Romans 5:1-7

Therefore, since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us.

I am starting to hear that folks are getting "quarantine fatigue". Something I can relate to. I am sure many of us are tired of seeing the same faces and being in the same places. It is a sad day when a quick trip to the grocery store is the highlight of the week or when your kids beg to ride to pick up some food, even though you made it clear they can't get out of the car. Strange and surprisingly exhausting times indeed.

Gracious God, you persevere through our doubts and fears. You reach out to us in the midst of our hardship and fear, loving us despite our faults. Give us that same perseverance so we might overcome our situation and learn once again that you are faithful. Amen.
