Fear is a basic human emotion; it is both natural and immensely powerful. Fear alerts us to the presence of danger, whether that threat is real or imagined.

FEAR IS COMMON

e all have our fears. It may be that we are afraid of something specific (such as needles or spiders); however, there are deep-seated fears that many of us experience throughout our lives. Fear of the unknown; of the future; of death; of failure; of pain; of getting old; fear of what others think of me; of not being needed; of rejection. The list goes on... If we are honest about it, however, most of our fears really point towards an inner condition of our heart.

What do I mean by this? Well, when we find ourselves afraid, we can take the opportunity to really examine our fear and ask ourselves: "Why am I so afraid? What is it, exactly, that I am afraid of?" When we take the time to do this, we often find that fear can reveal the things that deeply matter to us.

TRUST

ot only can fear reveal to us the things we love, it can also reveal to us what it is we trust. President Franklin D Rossevelt coined the well-known saying: "The only thing we have to fear is fear itself." While it's true that irrational fear is something we might try to overcome; it's not true that fear itself is wrong or bad. I believe fear can be a powerful tool in revealing our trust in God.

THE ANSWER

here must be a reason that God repeatedly tells us "do not fear". For me, I believe it is one way God has of reminding us that the

GOD'S WORD TODAY

We read the Passion story in its entirety twice during Holy Week. On Good Friday, we read the majestic account of John. Today on the Sunday of Holy Week, we read the account in the gospel of the year. This year, it is Mark's account we read. Although Mark is the shortest of the gospels, his gospel has a special charm. This is particularly true of his Passion story which is a detailed account of the last day of Jesus' earthly life. Mark leads us from the supper room where Jesus eats his last meal with his followers. This week, let us try to read the story with faith as we follow Jesus, a man of sorrows and familiar with grief.

answer to fear is found in placing our trust - our complete trust - in God himself.

The psalms tell us that "God is our refuge and strength," our "rock and fortress" (Ps 46 and 31). It is God to whom we can turn with confidence in times of trouble or turmoil. Scripture is not telling us that there is nothing scary in life - it is telling us that in approaching the various highs and lows of life, we are to remember we are not alone, and that God 'has our back' (so to speak).

GOD IS WITH YOU

hen you feel full of fear, no matter what that fear is, remember the words of Scripture: "Do not fear...for it is the Lord your God who goes with you. He will not leave you or forsake you" (Deuteronomy 31:6). If you sense you are being weighed down or controlled by fear, turn to God and let him lift your burden from you. Remember that God has called you by name, he knows you personally and he cares about you. He will not leave you to face your fears alone, but will carry you through all the trials of life.

LET US PRAY

hat fear is trying to take hold of you right now? What are you facing in life that you are having trouble dealing with? Take a moment now to pray with the psalmist: "When I am afraid, I will put my trust in you... In God I trust; I will not be afraid" (Psalm 56:3-4).

> "To o not fear" is one of the most frequent assurances delivered in Scripture. You will find these three words 🗾 in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke (Mt 5:36, 10:28; Lk 8:50), but similar words like "fear not", "have no fear" and "do not be afraid" occur again and again throughout the Old and New Testament. I've often read that the Bible instructs us not to fear exactly 365 times - once for every day of the year. Why is that? Even if the statistic isn't 100 per cent accurate, it still brings home to us one of the most repeated commandments in the Bible.
