Members who join in November or December are considered paid up as members for the following year.

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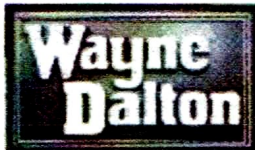
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## MINUTES OF HBPOA MEETING, COAST GUARD BUILDING APRIL 05, 2018

The monthly meeting of the HBPOA was called to order at 7:05 PM by Kathy Frase, Pres., who proceeded to lead those present in the Pledge of Allegiance. All officers and directors were present. One new resident was present, Dennis Hodges, and was given a warm welcome. He joined the POA tonight.

To clarify the position of HBPOA regarding potential plans for The Preserve, Kathy stated that we are currently not taking a position since any plans by BOCC in this regard are far from crystallized; furthermore we will not be discussing this issue tonight because it has been dissected from every angle on Hernando Beach Nextdoor. This will be brought up at the BOCC meeting on April 10th where any Hernando County resident has the right and is encouraged to show up to get information and to express opinions.

Kathy explained that due to the untimely death of

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Laine Wightman, the board felt that it would be most appropriate to ask her husband, Toby, to fill her vacated position of director. Wayne Dukes moved to have Toby Wightman assume the director's position, motion was seconded by Fran Baird and was carried. Kathy asked Toby to come forward and installed him as our new director.

Due to audio/visual issues the introduction of our evening's speaker was put on hold for the moment and the business meeting portion ensued. Cal Holland moved, seconded by Fran Baird, that the minutes of the March meeting be approved as posted in the Beachcomber and the motion carried.

Though Margo McConnell discovered that she had left home without her treasurer's report, she was able to give a general report, letting us know that the month had been very quiet relative to deposits/expenditures and the balance on hand had changed very little from the balance on hand at the end of last month. She is still exploring plans to divert some of our money to an interest bearing account. Next month she will give her formal

report for the months of March as well as April.

## REPORTS:

Port Authority.....Chuck Morton gave a very interesting and informative report on the Oyster Reef Project, including how important the end result of this project will be for the ecology of our waterways, how it will be accomplished and how we as a community can help to make it happen. It was very interesting to learn that one oyster can filter 50 gallons of water a day and thus establishing these reefs will go a long way towards filtering out algae before it can become blue. By the end of April, the tons of oyster shells which have been unloaded at our water tower will have been bagged and then loaded onto boats to take them out and strategically deposit them in the shallow waters of Centipede Bay, just north of Hernando Beach. Kudos to all involved with this very important project!

Landscaping.....Gladys Moore reported that, thank goodness, it has been a quiet month at both sites without any accidents and normal utility bills since there are currently no leaks! She and

Crime Watch.....Carolyn Manno, VP, reminded us that their monthly meeting occurs on the second Wednesday of each month at 7 PM at the VFW and any resident is welcome to come. This month's luncheon will be held at the Waterfront at 12 Noon on 4/26. Donation boxes for crime watch remain at most of our local restaurants and provide good opportunities for residents to support this very important volunteer service.

GAC.....Chuck made us aware of the date of the next Planning and Zoning Commission's meeting, April 9<sup>th</sup>, and that the next BOCC meeting would be April 10<sup>th</sup>.

### OLD BUSINESS:

- 1) Kathy encouraged any folks who have not renewed their POA membership to do so as soon as possible.
- 2) Mike Prescott of the Hernando Beach Rotary Club reminded us of their annual pancake breakfast fundraiser will be held on 4/28/18 at Applebees on County Line. He also reiterated all the ways that the funds raised at such events go right back into our local community to help those in need.

At this point, Ben Martinez, VP, was finally able to introduce our patient speaker for the evening, Richard Kirby, Hernando County Engineering Di-

vision Manager, who began by giving some of his professional background which led to his coming to his current position here in Hernando County about a year ago. He was quite enthusiastic about this opportunity and feels it was a great move for him!

Rick acknowledged that the influx of water during Irma, mainly due to the heavy rain, overwhelmed the Hermosa Sewage Pumping Station which led to sewage being dumped into our waters. He wanted us to know that his department continues to diligently pursue ways to prevent this in the future, at least as much as is humanly possible including the use of pumps that are more powerful to move the sewage as efficiently as possible from the Hermosa Station to the Osowaw Station. As part of this effort also and in an attempt to minimize disruption to our community, he described several techniques they are utilizing to repair sewer pipes without having to dig them up, specifically a technique called, "Slip Lining." They have also created ways to deal with aging and leaking manholes by rehabbing them in place with "Trench-less" technology.

Rick emphasized two ways that we homeowners can assist their efforts:

- 1) Be aware of where your sewer cleanout pipes are located and insure that they are intact without leaks that might provide a conduit for storm water to get into the sewers since this is a huge problem.

- 2) There have been instances of homeowners connecting lines from gutter downspouts into the cleanout pipes, though he hasn't seen it here in Hernando Beach. For the same reason in #1, this should never be done.

Finally he wanted to alert us that beginning this coming week his department will start in the northern section of HB with inflow and infiltration studies employing a method known as "Smoke Testing." He wanted us to be aware so that no one panics and thinks his/her house is on fire!

Rick then opened the floor for questions and there were many. He answered all that he was qualified to answer and made suggestions for possible contacts when the subject wasn't under his jurisdiction. His patience in fielding questions was admirable and everyone seemed to appreciate the time and knowledge he shared with us. 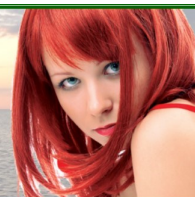
#### ANNOUNCEMENTS:

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Per participant request, we have made two changes this year:

- 1) The race route has been extended to 3.5 miles
- 2) We are offering the option to rent your kayak and equipment at the race

Participants will begin course at Linda Pedersen Park and paddle a 3.5 mile loop along the Bayport Linda Pedersen Paddling Trail. Participants will be released by corrals to prevent overcrowding of trail and must finish race within three hours of start.

Medals will be awarded to the top three finishers for the following divisions: male (single occupant vessel), female (single occupant vessel), and team (double occupant vessel). T-shirts are limited to the first 50 registrants.

Participants who choose to provide their own equipment for the race must bring a life vest and whistle. All participants are required to sign a waiver for the event. Waiver must be signed by participant and/or guardian (if under 18 years of age) during packet pick-up.

### **WHAT CAUSES ANGLING MORTALITY IN FISH?**

Fish may die after release for a variety of reasons. The most common causes of post-release mortality are physiological stress on the fish resulting from struggle during capture, injuries caused by the hook, and mishandling of the fish by the angler.

Unfortunately, some fish may die after release even though they appear unharmed and despite efforts by the angler to revive the fish.

Fish that struggle intensely during capture are usually exhausted and stressed from the accumulation of excessive amounts of lactic acid in their muscles and blood. The stress of capture may be more severe for larger fish such as tarpon, therefore, using the proper weight-class tackle, landing your catch quickly, and releasing the fish as quickly as possible increases the fish's chance of survival. Bringing an exhausted fish out of the water is like asking a triathlon winner to jump back in the water and hold their breath---they both need oxygen to recover!

Fish that are reeled to the surface from deep water may face additional challenges that could decrease their chance of survival.

If you have caught a fish that you do not intend to keep or that cannot be harvested, follow the steps below to increase the chances the fish you release will survive.

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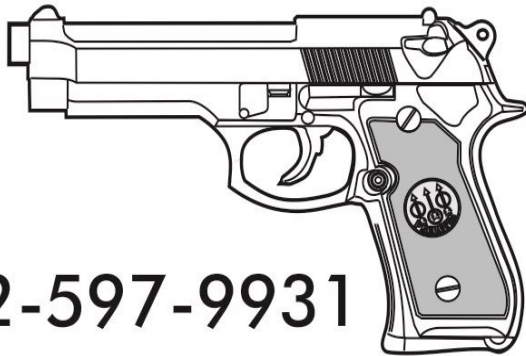

### Know Before You Go

Knowing before you go is an important step in increasing the survivability of fish you release.

- Decide beforehand which fish are to be kept and immediately release all others.
- Do not engage in a prolonged debate over whether or not to release a fish after it has been landed.

Make sure you can identify the fish in your area, specifically the fish you are targeting. Have a resource to help you identify fish you are not familiar with such as the [Fishing Lines guide](#) or a salt-water fish field guide.

Always know (or have access to) the [current regulations](#) for the fish you target. Knowing how to measure fish, the size limits, bag limits and seasons minimizes handling time when determining whether or not you can keep the fish you caught.

- Use tackle heavy enough to bring the fish in quickly, and avoid using multi-hook rigs or lures.
- If you have a treble hook, you can remove some of the hooks and flatten the barbs. This makes it easier to remove the hooks from the fish and causes less damage.
- Finally, make sure you have all the proper tools and gear on your vessel before heading out for the day.

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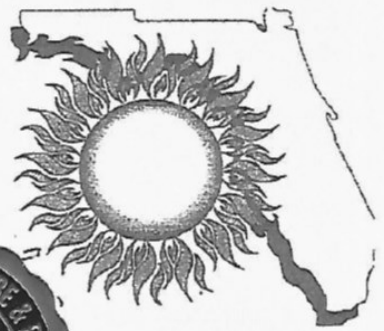

### Handling Fish

You can increase the survival rate of fish you release by using proper handling techniques.

**Handle fish as little as possible and only with wet hands.**

- Match tackle to the targeted fish to land it quickly and minimize stress on the fish. Large species such as sharks, billfish and tarpon should be brought alongside the boat within 20 minutes of being hooked. If you are consistently landing exhausted fish that require extensive efforts to resuscitate, consider using heavier tackle.
- If a fish needs to be handled, wet your hands. This reduces the amount of fish slime removed from the fish. Fish slime protects the fish from infection and aids in swimming.
- A knotless, rubber-coated landing net is ideal when handling a fish since it supports the fish's body weight.
- Remember, fish swim horizontally! Never hold a fish by its jaw, gills or eyes.
- Large fish, such as tarpon, should not be boat-ed or dragged over the gunwale of the boat because this could injure the internal organs of the fish.
- When holding a fish that has teeth, use a gripping tool to support the front of the fish, and use the other hand under the belly to evenly support the fish's weight.
- Sometimes it's better to carefully remove the hook so it can be released, and other times it's best to cut the line as close to the hook as possible while the fish is in the water – especially if it's large or agitated.
- Never hold on to or tow a fish not allowed to be harvested to a different location to weigh or measure it.

Know and follow current fishing regulations and how to accurately measure fish.

Reduce handling by using a dehooking tool.

Dehooking tools allow anglers to quickly release their catch while minimizing injuries and handling time.

- Never "toss" a fish back! Always release your fish head first into the water. This allows water to be forced through the mouth and over the gills, essentially giving it a "breath of fresh air."

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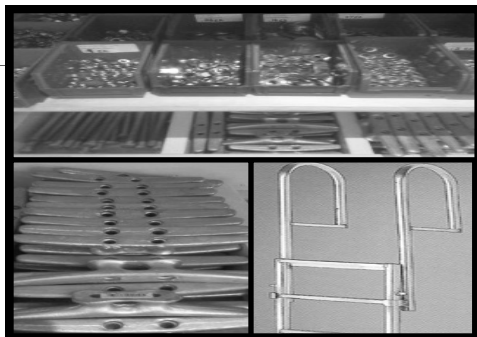


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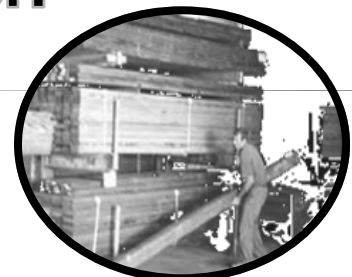


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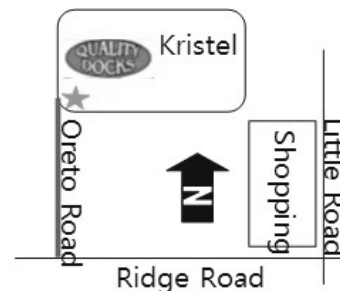
