- 16:03 The I-VI-II-V pattern played with dominant 9 and 13 chords.
- 17:35 Dominant 9 and dominant 13 are interchangeable.
- 19:10 The I-VI-II-V progressions are also called "rhythm changes."

Basic skeleton form

Jazz blues progression with walkdown at bars 7 and 8.

29:10 Use the *walkdown* sometimes or every time. It's your creative choice.
