

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

Parish Council: Meets on the Monday evening after the third Sunday of the month.

The Poison of Doubt

Merriam-Webster dictionary defines "doubt" in these phrases: to call into question the truth of ...; to lack confidence in; to consider unlikely. It gives an example: I have always doubted the existence of life on other planets.

The first two verses in today's first reading, from Exodus 17:3-7, struck me right away.

I scratched my head as I wondered why the Israelites should doubt God at all now. I went on to trace the immediate past deeds of the Lord in their lives.

In Exodus 2:23 we're told that the Israelites groaned and cried out because of slavery, and that as their cry went up to God, he heard their groaning and was mindful of his covenant with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. When God called Moses, he told him "I have witnessed the affliction of my people ... I have come down to rescue them and lead them into a land flowing with milk and honey ..." God commanded Moses to relay this good news to the elders of the Israelites.

True to his word and promise, God set out to deliver the Israelites from slavery. Exodus chapters 7 to 11 cover the plagues. In chapter 12, after the death of the firstborns, Pharaoh finally gave permission for them to leave. Tension and desperation rose in Chapter 14 as they stood between the Red Sea and Pharaoh and his army. Again, the Lord showed his might and love. In Chapter 15, He turned bitter water into drinking water for them. In Chapter 16, He fed them Manner from heaven, dousing their complaints. And that brings us to today's reading – another round of bitter complaints and doubts.

You would think that after God had shown them His love, care, power, ability to provide and protect, etc, that they'd be filled with gratitude and trust in this awesome God. Instead, they were still brimming with doubts and ingratitude.

Now, that's about the Israelites. What about you and me? We know the result of the Israelites' perennial doubt – they ended up wandering through the desert for 40 years, and most of the doubters died without setting foot on Canaan. I invite us to use this Lenten season to recall God's goodness to us and to allow those memories to boost our confidence and trust in God, so that no matter what, when and where, we will know that our God is abundantly able.

Do you call into question the truth of God's love and care for you? Do you lack confidence in God (or in yourself)? Do you consider unlikely the fact that God does love and care for you just as the Israelites did, in spite of solid evidences? If so, know that your doubts can be turned into trust. Begin by recognizing God's presence in your life, no matter how small each incident might be. Focus more on such experiences and let them, like building blocks, help to build up or strengthen your trust and confidence in our Almighty God. Amen.
