- Wildlife education for students so they learn about the mammals, birds and fish who live in and around Lake Winnebago.

- Bird watching and identification
- Spot the bug!
- What tree is that? (identify tree by buds)
- Star gazing night (evening activity TBD)
- Learn all about canoes!
