Some Thoughts from the Inland West Mission Center President John VanDerWalker

2022 has been yet another year of unusual events. The year began with the pure aggression of Russia against its neighbor Ukraine. As a community we have joined with others around the world in prayer and righteous indignation for the pain, suffering and death caused by this unprovoked aggression and violence. This war reminds us, as should all wars, of the unending need for a people in the world who proclaim peace and follow that proclamation with acts of peace.

There is a lot for us to be concerned about, but there is a lot to be encouraged with as well. This year we had a good camping season with two well attended reunions (Utah, Washington) and a congregational retreat in Montana. Mission center conference was well attended and those present were treated to a rich outpouring of the Holy Spirit through fellowship, worship, food and Apostolic ministry.

I think our gathering ministry this year helped those who attended to reconnect not only with friends that were separated due to the pandemic, but also with the passion of being in community in Christ. The planning for the Samish Reunion (the one I was a little involved with) was eased by the willingness of folks to serve and stretch themselves for the wellbeing of all. Claude Duty gets the silver star for valor for his tenacious and unfailing dedication to the pots and pans in the kitchen at Samish. Lisa Stecher too, gets a silver star for the traveling she did to congregations during the winter and spring so that she could personally invite



congregations to participate and volunteer for service responsibilities and, when she was no longer able to lead the effort, handed the MC staff a nearly filled roster of workers and volunteers along with a great deal of details that made the reunion special.

The Utah reunion was "Huge!" by today's standards with half of attendees being youth and children. Leadership by Carla and her crew was outstanding and the highlight of the week was a choral rendition of Bohemian Rhapsody during the Variety show, (for some reason people were very careful not to call it a talent show). It was my pleasure to spend the week with teenagers who were seeking a closer walk with each other. One of the special times of the week for me was when the youth in my class took me on a hike through the campground and shared with me their history with the place. They shared secret places where they would hide from the grown-ups to play in their younger years. I was very touched to be invited into that sacred part of their stories.

In September 2017, President Veazey's address, "A Time to Act!" he invited the church to active participation in the Bridge of Hope project, which would also incorporate the retirement responsibility. It was a challenge and call to respond.

At the 2019 World Conference the Presiding Bishopric charted the course for the church to raise \$120 Million by Dec. 31, 2023. The Council of Twelve worked with the Presiding Bishopric to match capacity with need and each Field took a portion of the goal. The goal for the North Central Field, which includes Inland West Mission Center is \$7 Million dollars. Robin and I carefully reviewed the context and capacity of each mission center in our field to match capacity with need. Each mission center in our field shares a portion of our field's BOH goal.

At this point Denise asked the conference participants to stand

Cairns Along the Way By Carla Long

At a recent church service, John VanDerWalker spoke of spiritual cairns that we meet along our way. Cairns are piles of rocks that people have built along paths or by water to symbolize burial, monuments, navigational aids, or just to say, "Hey! I was here!"

I have made a lot of spiritual cairns in my lifetime and the church has been a huge part of that. When I was growing up, my biggest spiritual cairn came from church camps. They shaped me and molded me and moved me into the person that I am today. Those spiritual cairns pointed me to Graceland University and then into World Service Corps, where I volunteered for the church in the Philippines and in Australia for a year and half. The spiritual cairns that I built there were even bigger and more solid than they were before, as they pointed me toward realizing that I wanted to work for the church for the rest of my life. After coming home and starting my work for the church, I realized that there were times when those carins were hard to see and hard to recognize, and there were times when I felt like I had traveled a long way without seeing one. There were lonely and difficult times on the journey, and even though I knew that God was traveling with me, God was sometimes hard to find. But then, another cairn would pop up and I would know my path once again.

After living and working in California, and then Europe, my cairn pointed me again out west, to the Inland West Mission Center. Even though Utah was a new and unknown world to me (in a lot of ways!), I felt at home in the greater Inland West Mission Center. I felt like people here understood my Kansas roots (which didn't happen so much in the Philippines, Australia, California or Europe!), and when I would let my "country" (i.e. when I talked about going deer hunting as a teen or how I have actually driven a tractor to school before) out, no one batted an eye. I appreciated this more than you know!

It was here that I was allowed to be a minister and nothing else. In California and Europe, I had many administrative duties, as

well, and they took up most of my time, but here, the administrative duties (while still around, of course!) were less, so I was able to slow down and take my time with people. I was able to sit down and talk and listen and be enveloped by the spirit that comes when you take the time to recognize and know it. I could sit with the tears, the stories, and the laughter and not feel rushed to move forward. I could be with the sometimes slow pace of the spirit and be grateful for the time. I was grateful for the time. That is what I learned by being here in the Inland West.

I learned to slow down. I learned that the cairns will come, even if I'm not moving fast and looking for them, they still come. I learned that God is with me in the times that move so quickly, I'm not even sure what I'm doing, but even more so in the more quiet and gentle times.

And I have learned so much more from the wonderful people of the Inland West Mission Center, and those lessons will continue to carry me forward into my new role in the Presiding Bishopric. I am deeply appreciative of the love and support and care that you have shown me during my six years in the Inland West, for welcoming my family (which DOUBLED while we were here!) with open arms in every place we found ourselves, and finally for helping me move slowly through those cairns that God continues to put in my path, ever so gently guiding and pointing me in the direction where I'm called to go.

Your lessons will not soon be forgotten. I am grateful for you all.

The balance in the YES Fund is as of November 30, 2022 is \$5,747.23.


Mission Center Fundraising Goal for 2023 is to increase the fund to \$10,000.00.








Spectacular 2022
