Editorial ... Praise God, Anyhow!!

That's a strange command. Did you ever try to praise God even though everything around you seemed to be going wrong? It isn't easy at first but it gets easier as you practice it. I believe that's part of what the Lord is telling us in I Thess. 5:18 "In everything give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." Everything includes the bad as well as the good. The Bible teaches us to live in an attitude of thanksgiving. But somehow the majority seem to only manage it about one time a year-Thanksgiving Day. That leaves us 364 days behind in our spiritual maturity. But thank God for that one day if for a few hours it turns some of the complaining we hear continually and some of the ungratefulness in our own hearts to genuine thankfulness. Although we all are acquainted with some truly appreciative people, the vast majority of those around us are continually complaining about little inconveniences and petty annoyances. Listen real close for one day to the voices around you and even to your own voice, keep count, it will surprise you at all the complaints you will hear. These are the things that rob us of the peace of a truly grateful heart and attitude.

Our daughter, Jene is an avid reader and recently she brought home Corrie ten Booms' book of her life "The Hiding Place", with the comment "Read this mother, It really works, I've been trying it!" Corrie and her sister, Betsy, learned to live in this kind of "thankful for everything" atmosphere even in prison camp with the worst possible conditions all around them. When Betsy thanked God for the fleas that were practically eating them up in their cell, Corrie thought surely she had gone too far this time. But it later was made known to them that the reason they were left alone so much and free to read their Bibles and pray and talk about God was because the guards couldn't stand to be around the fleas. Thank God for fleas they may be the curse God will make to be the greatest blessing to you. It's so hard to understand the trial at the time but later on we are able to see God's "blessings in disguise". All things do work TOGETHER for GOOD to them that love God and are the called according to HIS PURPOSE. Rom. 8:28. Different things that come our way may not seem good in themselves but they work together with the other things that God sends to us to bring good into our lives. I like to think of it in comparison with baking a cake. Of all the ingredients in a good chocolate cake there is only one that I like to taste by itself, the sugar, and that only in moderation. Did you ever try to eat a cup of sugar? The flour, soda, sour milk, shortening, chocolate, raw eggs, even the small amount of salt I can't tolerate alone, but when they are all mixed to. gether according to the proper instructions, put into a hot oven and baked, out comes a delicious chocolate cake that I can thoroughly enjoy and eat more than my share of. We shrink from the hot oven too, but how necessary it is. A "done to perfection" cake is so much more palatable than raw dough and better for us too. God looks on the finished product He's working on and we only at the moment at hand. Maybe it will be a little easier to thank God for the next trial if we think of it as the lifting power in our lives (the soda or baking powder). Oh, what a biting bitter taste they have, but only those of us who have forgotten at sometime to add that necessary ingredient know how heavy and completely ruined a cake can be without it. Think of the heat of the next battle as necessary to change us from raw undeveloped material to the welldone finished perfected "Child of the King" that God seeks to make of us.

It really does work! Try being thankful for even the most unpleasant next time instead of fretting, complaining, and getting in a stew. We can be thankful for bad weather; it may give us a chance to study, read, and do some important things at home that we have been too busy to attend to. We can be thankful for unscheduled delays in travel, even for minor repairs that have to be stopped for; it may prevent us from being in a place of extreme danger that we would have encountered had we have been on time; or it may be God's means of having us at the right place at the right time to be a blessing to someone in need. We can thank God even when we are denied something we thought we couldn't live without; the future may prove those things to have been burdens too heavy to carry under the different circumstances then encountered. Sudden changes in our plans due to circumstances beyond our control may be God's way of getting through to us with His more important plans for our lives. He will reveal to us in His good time and way what He had in mind. He's waiting for us to have that child-like faith to trust Him although we don't understand, the how's and whys. He is working out something good in our lives and we should be grateful, oh, so grateful, that we don't have to trust our own strength or abilities, but can leave it to Him, who made all things, and is able to put all the pieces together and make it come out good. In everything give thanks !! Praise God Anyhow !!

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

Prov. 26:23: "The heart of the wise instructeth his mouth."

When you are in any city or big town and are just dropping off to sleep at night, something startles you so that you sit up in bed. At first you are so bewildered that you do not realize what has aroused you, but as you become fully conscious you recognize the clang-clang and the shrieking siren of the fire-truck which is rushing by with its load of fire-fighters.

Perhaps you have thought quite a bit concerning fires and fire-fighters. Why couldn't that truck just as well have waited until morning, instead of clanging through the streets at night and disturbing the sleep of the many tired people? Oh, fires have to be fought when they start, do they, no matter if it is inconvenient?

What are some of the common causes of fire? (Carelessness, revenge, short circuits, ignorances.) I have observed that, after a fire is once well started, the way it starts makes but little difference in the heat of the blaze or the damage done.

There is a certain dangerous fire which I have seen started many times. It does not burn wood, coal or oil, but it burns success and character, if no fire-fighter extinguishes it. Some people call this blaze lying; some people laugh at it and call it only cleverness, because they do not realize its destructive power if it continues to spread. Just why do people tell lies? (To boast, get even, escape punishment, make money.) These are not reasons to be proud of, are they?

I have noticed that after things have been burned by fire they generally turn black. If lies could in some way blacken the lips of those who tell them, so many lies would not be told. No, indeed. Though the lips are not blackened by lies, we soon learn to look past what the lips say and discover that the character of those who lie is black and discolored. They may have gained some things by telling a lie, but we soon learn to pass them by as damaged goods.

Truth-telling seems to be too old-fashioned for some people. Certain lies may be considered "small," but it makes very little difference how they are considered; if they continue till they flame high, they will endanger someone.

Fire-fighters are needed to rescue tongues from starting little fires of deceit. You are either this kind of fire-lighter or fire-fighter. Which?



G ossip is fast becoming the biggest weapon Satan has against God's chosen people. Rumors are flying around, everywhere. Filthy gossip is ruining the reputations, ministries and marriages of many of God's choicest servants.

If I believed all the gossip I overhear daily—I would lose all faith in mankind. And the gossip does not originate in a bar room. It is not passed on by reprobates and prostitutes. Most of the gossip circulated today pours out of the hearts and lips of Christians who sit in a church pew every Sunday morning singing about the love of Jesus.

Ministers often complain about how certain members of their congregation "talk about them behind their backs." It's a well known fact that some parishioners go home every Sunday afternoon and "chew up the pastor." They gossip about his new car—his hair—his wife's shoes —his sermon—his "dictatorial methods." And shamefully, many Christian members seem to gloat over a minister who gets caught with another woman—or who gets into some kind of moral, financial or spiritual trouble.

Satan is out to destroy every man and woman of God —and he will stop at nothing to discredit an effective ministry. Tragically, some ministers are just as guilty of nasty gossip as the members they accuse. They sit around at conventions and in little "after meeting" sessions trading stories of pastors and evangelists who have "messed up." Most of the gossip is vicious—but seldom true.

Recently I was suddenly overwhelmed by all the reports I'd heard of ministers having problems—of marriages breaking up—of evangelists who were reported to be living double lives. It was so depressing—it sounded like almost everybody was having problems. The world was going berserk.

A well known young single evangelist had rumors circulated about him suggesting he was a homosexual. Thousands were attending his six-week long revival meetings and unusual evidence of God's power was demonstrated. Yet—every time his name was mentioned—some minister would pipe up—"Isn't it a shame he's a homo? How can God use him when he's so sweet and effeminate?"

A minister friend of mine resigned his church suddenly. The following week I received three phone calls from "saints" who warned me to have nothing to do with the man "because he had been having an affair with five women in the church." They each insisted he had been forced to resign and that everybody in the country knew why.

A well respected minister approached me, enlisted my help "to combat the false doctrine being promoted by a certain youth group involved in missions." I was asked to use my influence to expose them and straighten out their thinking. They were reportedly "ruining" young people all over the state of California. I heard the same rumor in every state I visited for the next four weeks. The leader of their missionary youth group was supposed to have indoctrinated other youth leaders and they had "all gone bananas."

While in prayer one night my heart began to cry out —"Oh God! What is happening? Everything seems to be falling apart. False doctrine—immorality—compromise. What shall I do?" And it didn't take God very long to get the answer through to me.

First of all, God began to deal with me about my own gossiping tongue! No one thinks of himself as being guilty of gossip. But I was one of those who always prefaced my gossiping remarks with—"Now I'm only telling you this so you can pray about it. Mind you—I love this person, but did you hear about . . ."

We use all kinds of excuses to spread our gossip garbage—and seldom do we stop to think of the far reaching effect, of the horrible damage, of the ruin we can cause. I suddenly recalled the many times I had passed on rumors. I had joined in the ministerial gossip circles and passed on things I'd heard without a single thread of evidence. Unwittingly, I'd become a tool in Satan's hand to destroy another man's ministry.

God not only forgave me—He put within me a fighting spirit. A desire to stand up and combat a lying devil! A desire to defend God's servants—no matter how vicious the gossip against them. God made me somehow sense what it would be like to be the victim of gossip—rather than the purveyor of it. I wanted to go out and shut up the lying, gossiping lips of every parishioner and minister who attempted to ply me full of filth—rumors—stories innuendoes—or hearsay.

I did a little investigating, too. The evangelist who was rumored to be a latent homosexual confided in a friend of mine, "Being single, I've tried so hard to stay away from all women so as not to bring reproach on my ministry. Now they accuse me of homosexuality. It's simply not true." I believe him! And now, every time I hear anybody spread that rumor I call them on it. I ask them to prove it—or shut up!

I called the minister who had resigned his church. I asked him bluntly, "Did you know about the vicious rumor your church is spreading about you? You are supposed to be a ladies' man!"

He answered clearly and quickly, "David—it's simply not true. The people who started that rumor have tried to destroy every pastor before me. God as my judge—it's all a lie." His wife verified the statement. I gave him the names of the people who started the story and offered to help him put them at the mercy of the law. While he prefers to take it quietly—I grieve that a man's ministry is nearly destroyed by Satanic gossip.

I met with the leader of that youth organization supposedly preaching "false doctrine." We met in Lausanne, Switzerland. He was gracious and kind as I placed before him all the stories, the rumors and gossip about his organization. I did so only to find out for myself if any of it was true. I found not a single trace of false doctrine. Rather—I found a dedicated young man who was doing more for God than all of the jealous men who had spread the rumors. We prayed together—hugged one another and I left him with a pledge to stop every word of gossip about him I came across. Since that meeting I've straightened out a number of ministers who had been trapped into believing the gossip.

How many great men and women of God lay prostrate each night—lost in a stream of tears—as they try to understand how and why they are victims of lies and gossip. They give their very life blood to the work of Christ and they have learned to expect satanic attacks when they storm the gates of hell. But there is no hurt like the deep

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cutting of cruel gossip that is passed on by the very ones who should be encouraging and praying for them. You can fight and resist the devil—but how can you respond and defend against weapons formed against you in the hands of God's own servants who indulge in gossip?

You expect gossip from liars, cheats, and low street people. You expect it in politics and public life. But no gossip is as vicious, as damaging and as hurtful as that which comes from God's own people—out of God's own house. How Satan must laugh with glee when he witnesses "Spirit-filled people passing on lies and filthy stories that originated in hell itself.

Satan won't need an army of demons to accomplish his work of deceiving. All he needs is an unwitting army of Christians who give him an ear and a tongue who go about "tattling his tales." Passing on a single bit of gossip can wreck a marriage—shipwreck a ministrry—turn loving children against parents—and break the hearts, destroy the dreams, smash the hopes of completely innocent people.

Saints of God—hear me! We can no longer afford the indulgence of gossip. We can no longer allow ourselves to give our lips and voices to the service of Satan to malign —to destroy—to assassinate—with gossip. It matters not whether the gossip is true or not—Let God take care of that! It is our part to defend our brothers and sisters in Christ. And even if the most vicious gossip were true we should be spending all our time and talk in restoring, healing and lifting up the fallen.

I am absolutely convinced Satan has taken physical control of all rumor mills and gossip mongering. He is out to destroy and discredit all that is of the Holy Ghost. He is out to destroy—with gossip—every Christian who seeks the fullness of God.

Let us not allow it. May God raise up an army of saints whose hearts and lips are baptized and dripping with the honey of God's true love. In honor preferring one another. In Christian charity let us grieve over those who have failed—let us never gloat! We can send the devil into the pits to lick his wounds if we will join together to "stop the gossip." If you can't prove it—don't tell it! If you can prove it—keep it to yourself and pray about it. It will—it must—it can—stop with you.

We were happy to have Bro. Mark Adair drive the bus loaned by the Faith Student Center, in Canyon, to Guymon for us. Bro. and Sis. Jim Fox drove this on to Canyon. After lunch in Stinnett, we went on to Canyon where we had service that evening. Again we had a wonderful meal fixed by these people.

About 5:00 a.m. the Bible College bus left with 42 passengers and headed for South Texas. We arrived in Katy, Texas, about 9:00 p.m. and left some there to spend the night and took the rest on to Alvin, Texas, where the young people greeted us with home-made ice cream.

On Saturday morning, I took the Girls' Sextet; Girls' Trio; Male Quartet; and the Mixed Ensemble to Houston, Texas, where they cut one side of a long-play stereo album at the Ludwig Studios. That evening we were joined by the rest of the choir and cut the other side of the record live and in concert. God blessed us with a good meeting that evening. We also had a wonderful meal for us there.

Sunday morning the students went into six different

churches in the South Texas area for services. Sunday night, we had service in Alvin with a packed house. After service the church had prepared a good meal for us. At Midnight, the two buses loaded bound for Pine Hill, Alabama. Bro. Jack Cornell and Bro. Doug Hibbs drove the Canyon bus and Bro. Buddy Stanberry helped drive the Bible School bus. We thank these men from the bottom of our hearts for this.

We arrived in Pine Hill about 5:00 p.m. and had service at the Kathryn Academy Gymnasium with a splendid crowd. They too had fixed a wonderful meal for us. Early Tuesday morning we left for home and arrived in Baxter Springs at 2:00 a.m. Wednesday.

There were 62 Bible School people who made the tour. We traveled nearly 3500 miles and conducted seven services. We traveled in nine different states. It was certainly a rich experience for the Student Body.

We give our sincere thanks to everyone who helped make this trip a success.

I want to give a few words about the bus purchased for the use of the school. A Committee of five men: Jim Fox, Chairman; Olen Bachler; Raymond Barker; Paul Williamson; Gene Hibbs (along with the board met in Oklahoma City and decided to purchase a 1957 Continental Trailways Golden Eagle bus. It is rest-room equipped and has a snack bar. It was purchased at the price of \$13,000. The first $3\frac{1}{2}$ weeks the school owned it more than 4,000 miles were traveled in the bus by the Bible School personnel. We feel it was a necessity if the choir continues to visit your community. We are now looking for some people and churches who would like to help pay for the bus.

If you would like to become involved in this operation, please contact Ted Barker, Box 110, Baxter Springs, Kansas, 66713, and you can secure some information about payments and etc. We have already seen its usefulness and do thank God for providing us with this transportation. It is scheduled for about 2500 miles more this school term that we already know of.


I can't possibly find words to describe what Bible School means to me. This is my second year here, and I feel like I have learned so much more, and grown more spiritually than during the whole term last year.

SOWING THE SEED

by Carl Jelsovsky, Kingman, Kansas

On a particular day (Matt. 13), Jesus did a great deal of teaching and much of what He said concerned one subject - the kingdom of heaven. Now the examples that Christ gave were in parables, but as often as not He defined beyond any shadow of a doubt what He meant. For example: the kingdom of heaven is like a man seeking goodly pearls (vs 45, 46) and when he finds one pearl of great price he sells all that he has to buy that one pearl. Simple enough: the kingdom of heaven ought to have no comparable value to us who have found it. And what is the kingdom of heaven? A friend of mine once gave me this definition which I have cherished since: The Kingdom of Heaven is the manifestation (revealing) of God, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit in the act of Salvation. Thus we should never be persuaded that the things of material value which we now possess nor the wealth we hope to have is more valuable than the Grace of God which is His Gift (Eph. 2:8-9).

Now we shall look at one more of these parables, the parable of the sower (vs 3-8; 18-23). Because Jesus said. "when anyone heareth the WORD OF THE KING-DOM . . ." (the seed that was sown by the sower), we know that we are still dealing with the kingdom of heaven. This seed, the word of God, was scattered in a variety of places. "Some fell by the wayside." The tragedy of our time is that the message of Jesus Christ and His Saving Grace is being heralded from more places and in greater measure than at any other time in the history of man; yet seemingly with less fruit coming forth. So much of the seed of the word is being scattered by the wayside because 'they will not understand it' (v 19). Then "some of the seed fell upon stoney places ." How sad to see people who have come into a real contact with the 'powers of heaven', have experienced for themselves the touch of the Master's hand, and then at the first sign of "tribulation or persecution because of the word are offended". Many a potential lion for God is lost because the seed just did not have enough room in the heart to become rooted with a grasp that could withstand 'the heat of the sun' (v 6). Of course, there is always some of the seed that gets planted where the weeds love to grow. The briars of life arise and choke out the fruit bearing plant. Jesus said "the care of this world, and the deceitfulness of riches choke the word and HE (the Christian individual) becomes unfruitful. I remember once after having suffered a very discouraging period of time how marvelous the blessings of God were when I prayed through and let God again occupy the PRIME place in my life. My testimony after that experience was that 'I became entangled on one of the thorns on the rosebush of life'. The thorns and the weeds are there, but the power of God is able to make the seed grow above the briars and bear fruit. And last of all, some of the seed fell into the rich soil of the believers heart and it brought forth fruit. Every individual who ever has any of the seed of the word sown into his life has the opportunity to let God provide an increase from his life. (I Cor. 3:6-7).

Issues To Be Considered

(excerpts from a letter from our Board of Trustees)

Roland Busch, Bill Hollis and Doyle Wiles

Over a year ago your Board of Trustees of the Apostolic Faith Bible School felt there was a definite need to try to improve the functions of our Bible School, and also the relationship of the School to all our people. Therefore, we appointed a committee (Brothers Harrol Waterbury, Jim Fox, Gene Hibbs, Wallace Ditto, Paul Clanton, Jim Morris and Roy Wooster) to research and then advise us of their findinis. Our deepest thanks to these for their efforts. We specifically asked them to consider the following five points, and and other studies that they felt would be an asset to the School and the Movement. They were urged to use a freehand to discuss and advise as they saw fit.

I-Trustee Elections

- (a) The value of a minister's vote. (Should an older minister's vote account for as much or more than a young inactive minister's vote?)
- (b) A minister's vote in comparison to a church board's vote?

The committee definitely felt there should be a change made.

They suggested:

- (1) A nominating committee be appointed.
- (2) A method of screening. Perhaps by writing to the Bible School Board for official ballot.
- (3) A vote by each individual church board member.
- (4) If more than 2 are nominated, then a runoff election.

(The Board then suggests only two names appear on the nominating ballot, thus simplifying the procedure and making run-off elections unnecessary.)

II—Ordination of Ministers and Gospel Workers at Bible School. (Should there be a time of active ministry before ordination?)

The committee suggests these changes:

- (1) There should be a time of 1 to 3 years active ministry before ordination.
- (2) In case of a young minister being drafted, the School offer a "letter of activity" to the

Draft Board, stating the actual ministerial activities of applicant.

III—Should a Trustee's term of office be limited to a certain number of consecutive terms?

The committee felt that there could be merit in limiting the time that trustee could serve, but also felt that the over-all picture of this question would be solved through the nominating committee system heretofore mentionel in this report. No time limit suggested.

IV—The Bible School properties are appraised in excess of 125,000.00. Can these properties be used more to the Glory of God than $3\frac{1}{2}$ month term of school?

The committee makes these suggestions for your consideration:

- (1) A longer term of school
- (2) Conduct a singing school
- (3) Sunday School workshop
- (4) Soul winning workshop
- (5) Some discussion concerning printing our own Sunday School literature

V—Is the Apostolic Faith Report reaching out to full capacity as a minister to our people? How could the Report be improved?


The committee offers these suggestions:

- (1) A separate Editorial Board
- (2) More announcements and news of churches, ministers, Bible School activities, reports on Camp Meetings, Convocations and Youth Camps. Personal testimonies of victory.
- (3) Sermons of Apostolic Faith Truths.

This committee suggests that the idea of an advisory Board become a permanent function of our Movement.

These above matters of consideration will be discussed and voted on at the annual business meeting at the close of this term of Bible School in Baxter Springs. Also we will be electing or reelecting a member of our Board of Trustees. This is a rotating board and it is Bro. Doyle Wiles time for consideration.
