

DECEMBER 2017 . . . REMINDERS OF WHO WE ARE

We will be observing the Season of Advent during the four weeks of December. Advent begins the church year. It is a time of anticipation, of watching and waiting for the coming of the kingdom of God in power. Although in some ways it shares with Lent in an atmosphere of preparation, restraint and penitence, it confidently directs us toward the joy of Christmas as that season draws near.

In his Catechetical Lectures, Cyril of Jerusalem teaches that we do not preach only one coming of Christ, but a second as well, more glorious than the first. The first coming was marked by patience; the second will bring the crown of a divine kingdom. In general, what relates to our Lord Jesus Christ has two aspects. There is a birth from God before the ages, and a birth from a virgin at the fullness of time. There is a hidden coming, like that of rain on fleece, and a coming before all eyes, still in the future.

Since we are now at the beginning of our church year, it seems to be an ideal time for us to remind ourselves of our roots in our Lord Jesus Christ, and the tradition to which we belong. If you go to the official website of the Episcopal Church (www.dfms.org) you can find the following:

What makes us Anglican? Hallmarks of the Episcopal Church having its roots in the Church of England, is also an Anglican Church. Like all Anglican churches, the Episcopal Church is distinguished by the following characteristics:

Protestant, yet Catholic, Anglicanism stands squarely in the Reformed tradition, yet considers itself just as directly descended from the Early Church as the Roman Catholic or Eastern Orthodox churches. Episcopalians celebrate the Mass in ways similar to the Roman Catholic tradition, yet do not recognize a single authority, such as the Pope of Rome.

Worship in one's first language, Episcopalians believe that Christians should be able to worship God and read the Bible in their first language, which for most Episcopalians, is English, rather than Latin or Greek, the two earlier, official languages of Christianity. Yet the Book of Common Prayer has been translated into many languages, so that those Episcopalians who do not speak English can still worship God in their native tongue.

The Book of Common Prayer, Unique to Anglicanism, though, is the Book of Common Prayer, the collection of worship services that all worshipers in an Anglican church follow. It's called common prayer because we all

pray it together, around the world. The first Book of Common Prayer was compiled in English by Thomas Cranmer in the 16th Century, and since then has undergone many revisions for different times and places. But its original purpose has remained the same: To provide in one place the core of the instructions and rites for Anglican Christians to worship together.

The present prayer book in the Episcopal Church was published in 1979. Many other worship resources and prayers exist to enrich our worship, but The Book of Common Prayer is the authority that governs our worship. The prayer book explains Christianity, describes the main beliefs of the Church, outlines the requirements for the sacraments, and in general serves as the main guidelines of Episcopal life.

Scripture, Tradition, and Reason the Anglican approach to reading and interpreting the Bible was first articulated by Richard Hooker, also in the 16th Century. While Christians universally acknowledge the Bible (or the Holy Scriptures) as the Word of God and completely sufficient to our reconciliation to God, what the Bible says must always speak to us in our own time and place.

The Church, as a worshiping body of faithful people, has for two thousand years amassed experience of God and of loving Jesus, and what they have said to us through the centuries about the Bible is critical to our understanding it in our own context. The traditions of the Church in interpreting Scripture connect all generations of believers together and give us a starting point for our own understanding.

Episcopalians believe that every Christian must build an understanding and relationship with God's Word in the Bible, and to do that, God has given us intelligence and our own experience, which we refer to as Reason. Based on the text of the Bible itself, and what Christians have taught us about it through the ages, we then must sort out our own understanding of it as it relates to our own lives.

We are people of faith immersed in a rich tradition with Jesus Christ as the head of the church which he founded. We are the community of the New Covenant, the People of God; we share in the royal priesthood of the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic church. As such, our mission is to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ. You and I pursue our mission as we pray, as we worship, as we proclaim the Gospel, and promote justice, peace, and love. Each one of us is called to carry out this mission. It is our . . . it is your ministry.

As we live into the seasons of Advent and Christmas that this month brings us, remember that you are ministers of the Church which was founded by our Lord Jesus Christ. Remember also that your ministry is to represent Christ and his Church; to bear witness to him wherever you may be; and, according to the gifts given to you, to carry on Christ's work of reconciliation in the world; and to take your place in the life, worship, and governance of the Church. As you do this, may God fill you with an abundance of divine grace during these blessed days.





Friday, November 10 and 11, 2017 Father Leon, Rebecca Johnson, and I attended the 149th CNY Episcopal convention. It was impressive to see so many people from the Diocese, and parishioners from some of the 86 congregational bodies.

Three new rectors were introduced: Gary Cyr- St, James', Clinton, NY; Jon White- St. Luke's, Camillus, NY; and Steven White-St. Andrew's, New Berlin, St. Matthew's, South New Berlin, Emmanuel, Norwich. I was fortunate to have Rector Cyr at my table and available for questions.

I have wondered about the Old Testament entries I have read in church. It seemed to me that a lot of times the readings showed the opposite behavior of what Jesus would do. I didn't read about Love and Forgiveness that is always promoted. I asked Rector Gary about this observation. He told me that he had a professor that explained that what was in the Old Testament were things that did not work out well. He said that the New Testament brought forth the beliefs that we hold now.

There were 7 resolutions proposed and passed:

- 1. Clergy compensation should be considered for a cost of living increase of 2%.
- 2. Commending the Diocese of New York Reparations Committee for its call for a "Year of Lamentations" for the sin of slavery.
- 3. Commitment to Anti-Racism and Opposition to the All-Right Movement.
- 4. Work for Racial Justice and Reconciliation
- 5. This 2017 Diocesan Convention gives its heartfelt thanks for the dedicated ministry of the Rev. Donald W. Matthews (Grace Church, Elmira), and its warmest wishes for his happiness and that of his wife Margaret in his undertaking of retirement.
- 6. Greetings to the Rt. Rev. Gladstone "Skip" Adams and Mrs. Bonnie Adams; the Rt. Rev. David Joslin and Mrs. Carol Anne Joslin; the Rt. Rev. David Alvarado and the Rev. Irma Alvarado; and to Bishop John S. Macholz, E.L.C.A.
- 7. Thanks to Exhibit Hall Organizers, Exhibitors, Syracuse Technologies and the Holiday Inn, Liverpool.

There was an interesting presentation by Rev. Dwight Zscheile, where he tested our ability to listen to others. He presented a passage from the bible for us to read. He then asked 2 questions that we were to discuss with a friendly stranger. We were to remember what the stranger said and then present their answer to our home group. It was obvious how difficult it was to remember what had been said, even though we were told to pay attention. This is a valuable skill to keep practicing.
