

New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

SPIRITUAL REFLECTION: OF TESTING AND ANGELS

Mark tells us in today's gospel that the "Spirit drove Jesus out into the desert, and He remained in the desert for forty days, tempted by Satan" (Mark 1:12). The original Greek word used by Mark translated "test" and not "tempt". I guess they convey the same meaning to us. But as I reflected on the verbs "test" and "drive" my mind pulled up some TV commercials from automakers that I had seen several times. In one such commercial, a truck is driven out from the factory into the wild and through the jungle, up the mountain and down the valley, climbing boulders and swimming through muddy ponds. Finally, it emerges on the other side, battle tested and victorious, with mud as the only scar.

So, why spend a lot of money to show customers all that? Of course, they want us to believe that their truck has been tested and been found worthy. We can now put our trust in them and spend thousands to purchase them. We can trust that they will deliver on serving us for years to come.

What has all this to do with today's gospel? Again, Jesus is driven out into the desert by the Spirit, to be tested! While the trucks spend at most an hour going through their rigorous tests, Christ spends 40 days and nights being tested. And he emerged triumphant. He is found worthy and ready to begin His ministry. But also notice the part that says that the angels ministered to Him. For Mark, the angels were with Jesus all through His testing, not just at the end as we read in some of the other gospels.

So, what is the message for us this First Sunday of Lent? Like Jesus (and like the trucks), we too will be (have been and will continue to be) driven into the wilderness of this world, into its mountains and valleys, through its storms and ponds, obstructed by boulders, rocks and irritating pebbles (as in our shoes). Lenten Season offers us another opportunity to reflect on these and other such realities of our spiritual journey and re-strategize for ourselves. As we do so, there are some facts to remember.

As for being tested in the desert, let us remember that God does not test us. Yes, we do pray, "Lead us not into temptation" but God does desire us to do only what is right and good. Mark notes that Jesus was "tempted by Satan."

Secondly, we must remember that "temptation" is not a sin in itself. Yielding to temptation is! Like Jesus, every Christian, and even atheists, will be tempted.

Third, no you will not have less testing or temptations as you grow spiritually and become a better Christians, as much as you'd love it to be so. Actually, the opposite is the case. The better Christians we become, the more temptations Satan will throw our way. Temptation can be a very trying time.

Finally, we have another Good News. The same angels that ministered to Jesus all through His testing in the desert will be there to minister to us, too. I prefer this interpretation to the other versions where the angels ministered to Him at the very end of His testing. I need them all through, for I may not even survive till the end.

So, as we begin our Lenten journey, as we practice our Fast, Pray more and Give to others in need, as we become more re-aligned with God, and grow towards God, Satan, the Master of Lies and Deceit, will not like it and will put up a fight to stop us. But as the Scripture tells us, "Be of sober spirit, be on the alert. Your enemy, the devil, is prowling round like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour. But resist him, firm in your faith, knowing that the same experiences of testing are being experienced by your brethren who are in the world" (1 Peter 5:8 & 9).

May you have a fruitful Lenten Season! And May the Angels minister to you, too. Amen. ~ Father Raphael Ezeh, MSP

POLYCARP Bishop & Martyr (d. 156) February 23

Polycarp, bishop of Smyrna (modern Izmir, Turkey) disciple of Saint John the Apostle and friend of Saint Ignatius of Antioch, was a revered Christian leader during the first half of the second century.

Saint Ignatius, on his way to Rome to be martyred, visited Polycarp of Smyrna, and later at Troas wrote him a personal letter. The Asia Minor churches recognized Polycarp's leadership by choosing him as a representative to discuss with Pope Anicetus the date of the Easter celebration in Rome - quite a controversy in the early church.

Only one of the many letters written by Polycarp has been preserved, the one he wrote to the Church of Philippi, Macedonia.

At eighty-six, Polycarp was led into the crowded Smyrna stadium to be burned alive. The flames did not harm him and he was finally killed by a dagger. The centurion ordered the saint's body burned. The "Acts" of Polycarp's martyrdom are the earliest preserved, fully reliable account of a Christian martyr's death. He died in 156.

COMMENT: Polycarp was recognized as a Christian leader by all Asia Minor Christians - a strong fortress of faith and loyalty to Jesus Christ. His own strength emerged from his trust in God, even when events contradicted this trust. Living among pagans and under a government opposed to the new religion, he led and fed his flock. Like the Good Shepherd, he laid down his life for his sheep and kept them from more persecution in Smyrna. He summarized his trust in God just before he died: "Father...I bless Thee, for having made me worthy of the day and the hour..." (*Martyrdom*, Chapter 14).

QUOTE: "Stand fast, therefore, in this conduct and follow the example of the Lord, 'firm and unchangeable in faith, lovers of the brotherhood, loving each other, united in truth,' helping each other with the mildness of the Lord, despising no man" (Polycarp, *Letter to the Philippians*).
