Worship Elder Report I We Have New Carpet in the Sanctuary

The crew is looking back on the carpeting job, thinking of a job well done! What does it take to organize and move the contents of a sanctuary? Let me tell you.

- 1. Get three bids. Getting them was no small project.
- 2. Meet with the session to choose a company.
- 3. Fill out paperwork and give a deposit.
- Set up a schedule for Monday, October 9th -Friday, October 13th, coordinating it with the Trinity Church facility.
- Recruit movers for the furniture, sound equipment, and instruments. Four pews were moved and stored by a company that does only that.
- 6. Meet with the installer to learn the installation progression. We found out the installation would probably take an extra day to finish.
- Organize volunteers into groups to move colorcoded furniture in a specific area in the narthex, cry room, and green room. Type handouts of assignments to give out on October 8th.
- On October 8th, right after church, the volunteers began moving rooms of their furniture. I want to thank the dedicated volunteers who moved everything perfectly, packing it into the Youth Room.
- 9. Riley Casey and her crew cleared the entire sound booth, cords, cameras, amplifiers, and mikes out of

the area to be carpeted - an easy job to take out and a tricky, miserable job to reinstall.

- 10. On Monday, October 9th, the installers realized they needed more time to remove the old carpet than expected. On Wednesday, the installation began.
- The organ was moved on Wednesday with TOSSD President Mike Williams supervising so the workers could lay the carpet. On Thursday, the organ returned to its spot. The carpet installers assisted with this challenging move.
- Installers were finished by 1:30 p.m. on Saturday. The volunteer movers arrived at 10:00 a.m. Though few, they worked hard and took only a short time to get things back in order.

A few volunteers jumped into setting up for the worship service on Sunday, October 15th. John Barry finished the width of a sound booth step. Jim Baker and John Barry put down the Velcro tape to keep the camera cords from tripping the congregation. Kirk Drummond, John Barry, Jim Baker, Terry Becker, and Rick Calderone moved the Communion Table and pulpit off the stage onto the chancel.

Please honor the work and cost of the new carpet by keeping food and drink outside.
