<u>Course description</u>: Spanish 2360 expands on the grammar & writing skills mastered in SPAN 1-4. It will be a review & expansion of grammatical & writing patterns, intensive reading, and essay production following formal grammar and writing standards. If your grammar & writing skills in Spanish is higher or lower than what is expected for this course you should see the professor/Dept. Chair immediately to find an appropriate level for you.

<u>Placement policies</u>: This course is available for students who completed SPAN 4 or those with an equivalent (or higher) competency as shown in an interview, test, or any other assessment considered appropriate by the instructor. Heritage speakers of the language (those with home knowledge of the language) must talk to the instructor during the 1st week of classes to determine their eligibility to continue in this course. There is a LOT of reading & writing here.

STUDENT OUTCOMES:

At the end of the class, students will be able to (approx. at an intermediate high level of Spanish) appropriately: 1-recognize grammar mistakes and fix them,

2-produce essays in Spanish that follow formal grammar and writing standards,

3-produce acceptable grammar both in writing and speaking

Grading: -3 tests: 60%; Hwk assignments 15%; quizzes 25%

Each test consists of 2 parts at least: 1) an objective part (multiple choice, completion...); 2) essays.

Scale: 90-100=A, 86-89.9=B+, 80-85.9=B, 75-79.9=C+, 70-74.9=C, 65-69.9=D+, 60-64.9=D, Below 60=F

NOTE: You must earn a grade or C or higher to advance to the next course in the language.

<u>Expectations</u>: The following are the regular expectations for this class. Even if they are not included in the grading system, they might affect your grade significantly.

I will assume you will comply with these. Failing to comply with these may cause a low grade, a failing grade, or being dropped out of the course.

-Regular attendance (check regular NGU policies regarding this and my policies below)

-Read before the class, review after the class, and apply whatever is learned.

-Acceptable in-class conduct (respect for others, cooperation, reasonable participation, and the like)

-Constant hwk (**Hwk assignments are indicated on the schedule**. Follow that plus other instructions in class) Submit all assignments (for a grade) via Bb, unless specified otherwise)

-Cells off. (No e-device is allowed during in-class evaluation: quiz, test, essay, oral interview, etc.) -Arrive (and leave) on time (tardies may count against your attendance; and I CONSIDER CONSTANT TARDIES AS A SIGN OF DISRESPECT & DISINTEREST)

-Talk directly to the instructor first (or email him) regarding any doubts/problems/comments you have about anything related to this class. If the issue is not resolved, you may contact the Dean.

-If you foresee that you may not comply with some expectation or regulation for this course, at a certain point (for ex. You need to leave the class earlier), please, discuss about this with the instructor IN ADVANCE.

-READ the syllabus frequently to keep track of what is going on in the class. I rarely deviate from it.

Incompletes or WPs: Do not consider 'I' or 'WP' as an option in the last weeks of the semester. Students who can not complete the work in the course on time or are seriously struggling otherwise must talk with the instructor and make arrangements at least three class weeks before the course ends.

<u>Attendance policy</u>: You are required to attend classes regularly. Even though there is no percentage of the grade directly assigned to attendance, you may be automatically dropped out of the class due to unjustified absences. If you miss the equivalent to 2 weeks of classes, you may fail the course. You are responsible to keep track of your absences and tardies (3 tardies equals 1 unjustified absence). Also, **pop quizzes are possible**. Pop quizzes are not announced in advance. If you don't show up the day of the pop quiz, you simply miss that grade, unless you justify your absence with proper documentation (doctors' notice, hospital prescription, NGU authorized personnel letter, or similar documents). You're responsible for anything that happens in class, even if you are absent ("I was not here last class" or something similar is <u>not</u> an excuse)

<u>Academic Integrity</u>: (taken from the NGU 2018-2019 Catalog) "Violations of the Student Conduct Code such as cheating or plagiarism will result in sanctions deemed appropriate for the offense. Possible sanctions include: 1) Assignment failure; 2) course failure; forced withdrawal (with no NGU credit for a period of one semester; or 4) expulsion (for an indefinite period of time)". NO email submission of hwks or grades (unless the professor informs otherwise). NO technology-related excuses.
