### More Frequent and Severe Atmospheric Rivers Equal Increased Damage and Costs

An <u>article</u> by Tom Corringham, a postdoctoral scholar in climate and atmospheric science at University of California San Diego, summarizes research he helped conduct using a catalog of <u>atmospheric river</u> events compiled by Scripps Institution of Oceonography's Center for Western Weather and Water Extremes that were matched to over 40 years of flood insurance records and 20 years of National Weather Service damage estimates. Applying a classification scale to categorize the level of severity similar to what is used for hurricanes, his team found that the most dangerous levels have caused \$1 billion in damages occur every three to four years. Each increase in the classification scale from 1 to 5 severity level was associated with a 10-fold increase in damages. Their research warns that atmospheric rivers are projected to grow longer, wider, and wetter in a warming climate.

#### **Corps Funds Levee Planning and Work**

In recent press releases, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers announced a \$29.5 million construction contract for Sacramento River levee improvements just upstream of <u>Miller Park</u> and awarded an additional \$22 million to complete the <u>Hamilton City</u> Flood Damage Reduction and Ecosystem Restoration Project.

## LEGSILATIVE LATEST

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#### Governor Releases State Budget

On January 9<sup>th</sup>, Governor Newsom released a \$225 billion fiscal year 2021-22 <u>State Budget</u>, which includes \$183 million for <u>flood</u> <u>management</u> programs, \$75 million in funding for critical levee repairs and \$43.7 million for Delta resilience.

#### Local Congressman Appointed to Key Resource and Infrastructure Subcommittee

U.S. Representative John <u>Garamendi</u> (D-Davis) was <u>selected</u> by his colleagues to serve on four <u>key subcommittees</u> that deal with helping communities be more resilient to natural disasters, including the Water Resources and Environment Subcommittee which deals with water development, infrastructure, and conservation, which are important issues for the Central Valley and Delta.

# **DELTA DOWNLOAD**

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#### Delta Stewardship Council Tackles Climate Resiliency

In accordance with the 2009 Delta Reform Act and more recent Executive Orders by Governor Newsom, the Delta Stewardship Council released a draft report and technical addendums to address climate resiliency. Once finalized, the <u>Vulnerability Assessment</u> report, called Delta Adapts, will guide the Council in adopting new enforceable policies in the Delta Plan. This will include influencing the development of a revised Delta Levee Investment Strategy (DLIS) and associated regulations that guide levee investments "targeted to protect communities and assets." The deadline to comment on the draft report has been extended to <u>March 16</u>.

#### Levee Projects File Certification of Consistency with DSC

The Central Valley Flood Protection Board submitted a Determination of Consistency to the Delta Stewardship Council on January 29, 2021 to self-certify an erosion project for the <u>American River Common Features</u> program. A certification of consistency was also filed by DWR on February 1, 2021 for a tidal habitat restoration project on <u>Bradmoor Island</u> and Arnold Slough. Any appeals on these projected must be filed within 30 days.
