I'd also like to acknowledge Tom Newell for working on the wastewater lagoons. His work should improve our wastewater test results and lower the amount of sludge at the bottom of the lagoons. Please do not put grease down your garbage disposal. We are getting huge grease logs in the lift station that is hard to get rid of. Wet ones and other wipes are also not good for the lift station pumps. Please be mindful of these products. The village has had to spend over \$35,000 on repairs and new pumps in the last 2 years.

Our current website is being revamped. We will also be adding new features that will be useful to our residents. We will let you know when it is accessible.

August 16 was the first day back to school for our school district's children. Please be watchful when students in town get on the bus between 7:30 and 8 a.m. and getting off the bus between 3:30 and 4 p.m. Remember, do not pass a bus when the red lights are on and the stop arm is out.

As Fall nears and leaves begin to fall, it is time to rake leaves. You can bag your leaves and take them out to the lagoon for burning. According to our Burn Ordinance 93-3, you may burn leaves in town, but please be considerate of your neighbors who may have breathing problems. We ask that you do not burn on the street because that is not good for our oiled roads. If you burn in the ditch, make sure it burns all the way. Ashes and leaves left in the ditch can lead to drainage problems. Residents should not burn before sunup or after dusk. This excludes fire pits or campfires for wiener roasts. Garbage cannot be burned within the village.

All village residents are invited to the following events: Community Wiener Roast- Sept. 27, Fall Rummage Sale- Oct. 12, and Burn out in the Burg - Oct. 12, featuring a German meal served at the park hosted by the Lions Club.



Part I HERE and THERE in Shelby County

STRASBURG

For some the royal road to romance leads from Killarney to Mandalay, from Rome to Timbuctoo and up and down the perilous expanse of all the seven seas. Those travelers we understand, but do not envy. The seven seas are damp and Rome has beggars. The royal road that we shall take is Route 129, and our port of destination is Strasburg, Richland township.

Arrived, let us turn time back to the year 1800 when the great Northwest Territory was divided into two parts, and the western half which included our state of Illinois, christened The Indian Territory.

For a record of those early days we quote from a short history of Strasburg written by Dr. W. F. Schroeder.

"The ground on which now stands the town of Strasburg was part of the grand prairie extending between the Ohio and the Mississippi River. Evidences of Indian habitation are found a few miles southwest of town where many arrow-points, tomahawks, medicine bowls, etc., point to probability of a battle fought perhaps long before Columbus came to America.

"Beginning the history of Strasburg at 1800 A.D., the first bit of history of the place is the record of a deer-lick in what is now nearly the center of town. (In the lot behind Lauren Hamm's restaurant). The deep trails worn by deer and other wild game, when the lick was discovered, gave evidence of perhaps hundreds of years of use.

SPARSELY SETTLED

"Throughout the country were a scarce half dozen log cabins built by men who had either fled from the law in some eastern state or who loved the utter solitude of a lonely life in the wilds. Living on a bit of corn, some beans, and the bounty of nature in the form of game, fish, berries, nuts, etc., theirs was a life of ease and contentment.

"By and by men from Kentucky, Virginia and other states beyond the Wabash, bent on exploration and exploitation drifted into and through that area of which Strasburg is now the business center. With the advent of winter they again drifted south and southeast, spreading the news of the wonderful prairie country abounding in deer, prairie chicken, grouse, quail, rabbits, squirrels, and many fur-bearing animals. Soon the covered wagons of the Kentuckians, Tennesseans, Virginians, and others began to cut trails over the unbroken prairies. The first house to be built on the ground now covered by Strasburg, was built a stone's throw from the above mentioned deer lick. It was a one-room shack made of poles. The owner was a restless soul like most of the squatters, and within a short time abandoned the hut to seek his pot of gold at the end of some other

rainbow. The deer again ventured back to their salt lick but in time another and still another frontiersman occupied the shack.

"The trekking of pioneers from Kentucky and other states seeking the route of least obstruction, eventually cut a trail that began at the south central part of Illinois in the general neighborhood of Centralia and then came northward striking near the present town of Strasburg. In fact, Strasburg was built on the road that once was the trail. This trail became known as the Grand Prairie Trail. It crossed most of the state from south to north just as the Old National Trail does from east to west.

"Eventually another log house was built on the ground that was later to become Strasburg, followed years later by still another. This last log cabin is still standing and being lived in by William Faster and his sisters. It is part of their lovely home and from both its external and internal appearance gives no evidence that it was built of solid logs and so long ago as to defy the memory of the old timers.

"The Grand Prairie Trail became worn by the wheels of the covered wagons on their way from the southeast of the Sangamon country. Many watered their horses, oxen, and cows in the tributary to Richland Creek which tributary runs through nearly the center of Strasburg. This watering hole was hear the place where now stands G.C York's modern garage. (GN Editor note: The G.C. York's Garage building was later Kull Appliance Center-Gary Kull and is now Powersport Focus, Inc.-Nathan Stremming.)

Stewardson-Strasburg Area Seasoned Citizens Tour Effingham County Museum

Seventeen Stewardson-Strasburg Area Seasoned Citizens journeyed to the Effingham County Museum on Wednesday, June 26. There were welcomed by volunteer guides Delaine Donaldson, LoElla Baker, Jerry Katz, Linda Ruholl and Allen Westendorf.

Our tour began in the courtroom on the main floor learning how Effingham was settled by native tribes, followed by mostly German descendants that came to American for a better life. We were guided through five different gallery rooms depicting areas from WW1 through the rest of the wars. We viewed pictures, clothing and personal items of the men and women from Effingham County and surrounding areas who had served in each war. They also had pictures and items from the St. Anthony Hospital fire, doctors and lawyers who established their office here and displays with miniature buildings of the businesses in Effingham.

Our final stop was on the floor above which is being recreated to look like the original courtroom used back in the era of President Abraham Lincoln. We also marveled at the painting artistry in the center of the ceiling which is being created and painted by Dr. Ruben Boyajian.

Everyone enjoyed the tour of the museum and was very appreciative of the volunteers that were so informative. Concluding the tour, everyone enjoyed lunch at Joe's Pizza.

The 7th Annual Strasburg Strongman/Woman Event was a hot success!

Take a breezy and hot July day and a firetruck and usually what you first think of might be a field fire. But at the 7th Annual Strasburg Strongman/Woman Event held recently, the athletes heated up the Strasburg Park! The event, held during the annual Strasburg Homecoming, boasted 37 athletes from through the Nation. It is a United States Strongman sanctioned competition and it kicked off with the Star Spangled Banner, sang by Zachary Shelton, age 10, of Strasburg.

The competition then was underway. It was comprised of four events: Firetruck pull: which is using a harness



and rope to pull the village's 10,000 pound fire truck for the fastest time; Farmers Walk: which is done with weights but a replica of a farmer walking with two large, heavy buckets for the fastest time; Log Reps: which is as if a logger was hauling in a large log for as many times possible; and Max Floor Dead lift: which is a sheer strength event of who can pull the most weight off the floor and to the waist.

Jordan Donaldson, and Altamont native, lifted a whopping 730 pounds in the deadlift competition. DeAdrea Lynn Meyers, a Teutopolis native, and also Donaldson's wife, also competed. The couple now reside in Bloomington, had a baby earlier this year, and have another child, but stated they feel it is important to demonstrate to their children that this level of a sport is part of their overall health. They supported each other to first place finishes in their areas.

The meet was highly competitive, but a trait of the strength sports world is to treat each other as family and not try to bring others down. All the spectators and athletes cheer each other on to do their best. Also this year had a record 50 sponsors. The Strasburg Lions Club, with the help of Brian Shelton of Strasburg, have established this event has one of their biggest fundraisers of the year. All proceeds of this event go to the Strasburg Lions Club.
