RAC Library Leaves



Pending New Year Bringing Changes



So much has happened in the last year for our community library. It opened in 1999 with hard work by a group of volunteers and several boxes of donated books. Unlike a city-owned library, we have no paid staff but remain open four days a week with volunteers that believe in the Rio Abajo community, which includes all 14 rural villages in northern Socorro County.



When first opened the average graduation rate was about 13% -today we boast 97% and we have researchers from agencies around the country coming out to see why. When research was completed, our dramatic changes are attributed to the Rio Abajo Community Library (via Zillow, American Banking Association, Dun & Bradstreet, etc.). Some of the results are:

- Prior to 2016 if we were able to find a lender, it would have been at 2-5% higher interest rates. No longer is our community being "red-lined," which means residential and/or business loans in this community are now charged the same interest rates as other viable communities;
- being viable has meant we were able to keep the Bosque and La Joya Post Offices and

- Joya Post Offices and government funding for basic services increased;

who erected a store and helped provide two paid interns to the Library last summer;



Our successes are now being copied by libraries around the world, including the newsletter, which has been touted as revolutionary. impactful for distressed communities, and was said by the American Library Association to provide thermometer of the importance of libraries economic to development."

Today the RAC Library continues to operate with approximately \$7,500 from the State Legislature, which means there



are still no paid staff but is dependent upon volunteers to keep the doors open. The volunteer that functions as the Library Director will be leaving on June 30, 2019, so the search has begun to find someone willing to take over.

It has become apparent that a new Director will require raising more funds (at minimum, \$20,000 more) to pay someone at least \$15 per hour. We need someone who loves this community, who sincerely desires to reach out and meet the needs of our youth and seniors, be sensitive to the personal needs that arise and be willing to help find solutions, and all these abilities plus maintain the normal needs of a library.



We obviously welcome any and all help and firmly believe that there are people in the community who care enough to pitch in. Almost all present active volunteers do not have children or grandchildren in the community, so we hope more whose children have benefitted will pitch in. And we envision finding a sponsor and/or supporting source to keep our doors open. The alternative would mean closing and losing almost 20 years of benefits in 18 months or less, and that is too horrible to consider!

On-Farm Fuel Storage

Would I save buying money in bulk? Above-ground bulk storage tanks available in all

sizes, with or without an attached containment system, and with a barrage of laws at all levels and all have significant fines should one not comply.

Considerations for bulk storage

Determining how much fuel storage one needs can be calculated by the amount used in a year, which should be close year to year for equipment on a farm, excluding a backup generator system, which isn't so easy to figure.

Fuel stored at 0° to -5°F without an additive will last for about 12 months, warmer temperatures than that and the storage time will drop as much as six months. During storage and exposure to oxygen, gum will form in non-stabilized fuel, which can cause operational problems with carburetors, injectors, and filtration systems. These issues are manageable with a good fuel stabilization product, which is another addition to the already expensive product being stored.

Having the fuel delivered can become interesting; some dealers have a minimum amount of usage, delivery fees, and a contract as well.

Exemptions exist. Under the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Spill Prevention, Control. and Countermeasure Regulation (SPCC), farms with aggregate above-ground storage capacities greater than 2,500 gallons and less than 6,000 gallons are not subject to SPCC regulation based on aggregate above-ground oil storage capacity so long as they have a clean spill history.



An option would be stationary, mobile bulk tanks like those mounted in the backs of pickup trucks. Mounted on your pickup truck, it would be covered under your vehicle insurance, including theft, and have no bearing on the property insurance at all.

Equipment considerations

When comparing steel versus aluminum, both materials are robust and the material difference doesn't sacrifice stability. Aluminum has the benefits of being lighter in weight and rust proof, where with steel tanks, owners should keep the tank full, maintain lubricated walls, and prevent rust formation as a result of condensation or water in the fuel.

Maintenance on bulk units are visual (watch for rust and address immediately). If the pumping apparatus is electric, make sure the electrical contacts, especially the ground cable, are all in good order. Fuel stabilizer should be a "de-

emulsifier" and not an "emulsifier." Emulsifiers work well with carbureted engines, but with injected engines this will promote premature stretching of which causes injectors. poor engine performance. Deemulsifiers force the petroleum water molecules and apart, allowing proper capture and drainage of the contaminant.

Evaluating circumstances

In my case, I don't use enough fuel to warrant bulk storage, and being able to take my empty container(s) to the cheapest retailer works for me. My insurance company is not involved because of the quantity, and it keeps the fuel fresh without the use of stabilizers. I purchased and now use my USA-made "Mr. Funnel" every time I fill my equipment; it's equipped with a debris-water screen that will filter impurities but allow the fuel, even if mixed with oil, to flow through. It is a cheap way to prevent problems with your equipment fuel system, it's easy to clean, and they're cheap.

If you are considering bulk storage, call your insurance broker first. They can guide you on what vou need to do to comply with all government. levels of especially their requirements. There are recommendations in regards to installation distances such as 40 feet from buildings, 10 feet from property lines, 25 feet from ignition sources, 50 feet from a drilled well, and 100 feet from a dug well, as well as impact protection.

Even if your insurance company doesn't require you to keep logs of users, training, and additional details, this is a good idea, as is contacting your broker. It's not worth the risk not to.

Stay Safe, Warm around Electric Space


Space heaters can be a quick way to supplement heat in a room. However, they can be as dangerous as they are convenient if used improperly. Approximately 1/3 of all house fires nationwide happen between December and

February. Equipment that is intended to add a little extra warmth is the leading cause of these fires, according to the National Fire Protection Association.

When using electric space heaters, please observe the following safety tips:


- Before using any type of heating equipment, make sure your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are in good working condition.
- Purchase only space heaters that have been safety tested and UL approved. Make sure the unit is equipped with an emergency tip-over shut-off feature and heating element

guards. Read and follow all of the manufacturer's instructions for operation and care.



floor surfaces.

- Keep space heaters at least three feet from combustible liquids like fuel, spray cans and paint, as well as flammable items such as draperies, blankets and sofas.
- Keep an electric heater's air intake and outlet clear.
- Do not use a space heater in a damp or wet area, unless it's designed for outdoor use or in bathrooms; otherwise, moisture could damage it and create a safety hazard.
- Never allow pets or children near an electric heater.
- Do not overload electrical circuits with a space heater.
 Never use extension cords or multiple plugs with one, and make sure the unit is not plugged into the same circuit as other electric appliances.
- If your space heater is plugged into a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) and it trips, don't assume there is something wrong

with the GFCI. Stop using the heater until it can be checked by a technician.

- Never leave space heaters unattended. Turn off your space heater and unplug it before leaving the room or going to bed.
- Replace older space heaters with newer, safer models.



Many people also use electric blankets to keep warm during cold winter nights. Before plugging in electric blankets, check for any

damage and inspect cord for frays, cracks or cuts. Electric blankets should not be tucked under the mattress and nothing should be placed on top of the blanket while it's in use, including comforters and bedspreads. Pets should never be allowed to sleep on the electric blanket.

Electric bills can increase in the winter for various reasons – holiday gatherings, house guests and shorter days and longer nights.

Small measures can help control energy costs. Curb space heater usage and turn down thermostats, whenever possible. Decorate your home with LED lighting. Remember, every time you open oven door. the oven temperature can decrease as much as 25 degrees. X

I'd like to start with wishing everyone a merry and blessed holiday season.

Thank you for the invitation to the Senior's Thanksgiving Feast at our local Senior Center. It is always fun to be able to relax and join friends in a festive environment.

Also, we have updates to our medical center. First off, let me clear up some confusion!

It will be operated by Presbyterian Medical Services, which should not be confused with Presbyterian Hospital! The clinic will be open to everyone in the community and accept all insurances.

The building will have 1,500 square feet to include 2 examination rooms, a waiting room, and one office. Initially it will be open two days a week, and expand its services as the demand increases. In other words, every time the clinic becomes routinely booked up with people waiting, the clinic will open an additional day.

The clinic will maintain standard medications. For example, antibiotics for ear infections will be available. Specialized medications and narcotics will continue to require seeing your primary care physician.

Lastly, in the last few months several neighbors have needed to be air-lifted to a hospital. If possible, don't forget to sign up for the air-lift insurance. One hundred dollars per year is a lot cheaper than \$10,000-20,000 for one trip!


