GOD: FIRST, MIDDLE OR LAST?

Deut. 6:2-6; Heb. 7:23-28; Mark 12:28b-34

A couple of weeks ago, I had a chat with a nine-year-old child. When I asked him how he was doing, I was amazed by the answer he gave me: "Oh, it's tough, Father!" What does a nine-year-old know about life being tough? "Come on Raymond, you don't have any bills to pay - you don't have to buy groceries - pay someone's school fees - you don't even have to think about washing or ironing your cloths. So, what do you mean by, "Life is tough?" In order to calm my curiosity, the boy explained further: "Father, I had two baseball games this morning, a basketball game this afternoon, and I just finished a soccer game an hour ago...now I am very tired!" I couldn't help, but to sympathize with my little friend, Raymond, I understood why he would see life as "tough" and why he would be tired at the end of the day. I urged Raymond that he didn't have to participate in all those sporting activities or to play all those games in one day. Disappointedly, he confided in me that his parents make him do it. If this child's conclusion of the fact is true, the question we might ask is: "Where do we place our priorities?"

"The Lord our God is Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength." In any community or society there are statutes, norms or code of conduct. Governments and countries are governed by decrees or constitutions. These laws are there to ensure peace and harmony. But, above all these, God's Laws are there to bring us salvation in His eternal Kingdom. There are also rules and regulations governing social and recreational actives like football, softball, soccer, baseball, boxing, etc. There is the civil law to govern and direct what citizens of a country do. Sometimes one or more of this set of rules contradicts or conflicts with God's commandment that is redemptive in nature. We often find ourselves in a maze - what should I believe in? Which of these laws or statutes are more important?

Our children are growing up in new culture - a society bombarded with sporting and cultural activities. A new culture whereby our young are being brought up to believe that what comes first in their life (or weekly routine) is their devotion to the secular matters. Sadly, children are caught in this dilemma and are forced to ignore the religious/spiritual development of their lives through prayers and Sunday Mass attendance. Parents / guardians would rather bring them to games, dances and/or rehearsals instead of Church. The confusion comes when the child attends Church or catechism class and hears that what comes first is our love of God. We can only show we love Him by dedicating time to prayers - going to Mass on Sundays and Holydays. Our actions and attitudes as adults sometimes confuse these little ones, thus, some of them wonder, "Which is the first of all the commandments?" Which of these regulations should take priority in my life? I find myself in a culture where I am bombarded with many social, recreational and religious activities every day. What must I do? How do I prioritize these things? I am confused!

Matters relating to God and pertaining to Him alone should take priority in our lives. In our observances of the different statutes and regulations - our desires, time, energy, resources, talents and our capabilities should primarily be directed to pleasing God. No doubt, we must love God above all other things by our words and deeds, but we cannot claim to love God when we do not have love for others in the community; therefore, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself!" Parents, sport organizers/directors and all must know that "There are no other commandments greater than these."

-----**UPDATE:** THE 2012 STEWARDSHIP APPEAL

Good News: Two weeks ago our parish received a rebate check of \$7,583.85 from the Appeal Office representing 100% of overthe-goal amount collected so far by the Campaign. You may remember that our parish goal for the 2012 Appeal was \$50,500. Through the participation of 212 of our families, we exceeded that goal with pledges of \$63,421.85. Of that total pledge, \$58,083.85 has already been paid to the Appeal; remaining balance is \$5,338. When all the outstanding pledges are paid, our Parish may receive an additional rebate of over \$5,000.

It is heartwarming to see that through your participation in the 2012 Stewardship Appeal our parish has directly benefited and is rewarded in the amount of \$7,583.85. Thank you all for your support of this Appeal and our Parish. God bless you all! -----

BELIEVING IN THE RESURRECTION OF THE DEAD



As nature sheds her colors, the Church reminds herself in a powerful way of the destiny of each human planned by our loving God, eternity with Him. This month began with the celebration of those members of the ecclesian family who "finished the race and won the crown" because of Divine Mercy. Then we continue reflecting on the needs of the

souls in purgatory. This Catholic doctrine is one which we should remember and take confidence in as believers. The Sacred Scripture recalls the deeds of Judas Maccabeus in which he prays for atonement for the dead, "...that they might be delivered form their sins" (2Macc. 12:46). The Catechism is about the Catholic Church building upon the teachings of the councils of Florence and Trent and teaches: "All who lives by God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation, upon death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven." In other words, though we have received forgiveness, we still must bear the consequences of our sins. While our parents would forgive us for not listening to their words and though they loved us despite failing to be responsible for our homework, they still grounded us for a period of time before moving on. If we showed remorse and did some extra chores or extended ourselves in some other way, they might have lessened the penalty. Sound familiar? That is what an indulgence is." An indulgence is partial or plenary, accordingly removes either part or all the temporal punishment due to sin. The faithful can gain indulgences for themselves, or apply them to the dead." These words came from the document on indulgences issued by Pope Paul; Christ's power coming through the Church can affect such an occurrence. Let us remember our loved ones participating in the Eucharist, being in adoration before the Blessed Sacrament, mediating on the Stations of the Cross, and performing works of Charity. There is a Church in Rome which contains the bones of monks from the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries. In front of them is a sign in many languages: "Where you are now, we were: where we are now, you will be." Let us pray for those who have gone before, so that they may pray in heaven for us.


