

# **Upcoming PdNDS Trail Clinic**

#### April 30<sup>th</sup> – Dressage trail clinic w/ Sandra Perez Welch

In this clinic, Sandra will use simple trail obstacles to improve the rider's understanding of dressage concepts. The focus will be on keeping classical dressage training fun and uncomplicated. <u>This clinic is for both traditional and western dressage riders.</u> Requirements for riding Western Dressage Association Tests will also be covered. In addition, this clinic will help prepare you to ride in the Trail Class at our Schooling shows on May 8<sup>th</sup>, June 5<sup>th</sup>, Sept 4<sup>th</sup>, Oct 2<sup>nd</sup>, Oct 30<sup>th</sup>, and Dec 4<sup>th</sup>



This clinic will allow for a maximum of 12 riders in 3 groups of 4 riders.

<u>Group 1</u> will cover introductory movements at a walk & working jog/ trot. **Basic Movements:** trot over poles, corners, 20 meter trot circles, and rein backs.

<u>Group 2</u> will cover Basic & Level 1(intermediate) movements at the walk, working jog/ trot, & working lope/ canter. **Basic Movements:** trot over poles, 20 meter canter circles, rein back, turn on forehand, cone weave.

<u>Group 3</u> will cover Level 2 and 3 (advanced) movements at the walk, jog/ trot & lope/ canter. **Basic Movements:** trot over poles, collected walk, trot, & canter, lengthened trot, side pass, reinback, canter over poles, cone weave, and turn on haunches.

Each group will ride for 2 hours to ensure each rider gets individual attention. When signing-up, please select the group you would like to ride in. If you wish to be paired with other specific riders, please indicate this on the entry and we will do our best to accommodate the request. Anyone mounted on a horse must wear protective headgear.

This clinic is designed for both riders and auditors. Auditors will hear the clinician's comments via a sound system. Both Traditional and Western dressage riders are encouraged to enter.




# Not Your Grandmother's Western Saddle

Local Spotlight by Arden Evans

If you are interested in western dressage, you might have noticed all of the new western dressage saddles on the market. A quick google of "Western Dressage Saddles" brings up all sorts of links and images of saddles that have been specifically designed for the sport. Many of these saddles have incorporated design features found in traditional dressage saddles- For example, some have added padding to the bottom of the saddle and created a "channel" or gap along the horses' spine allowing the horse to be more comfortable when they "round" their back. They also have less bulk beneath the rider's leg, allowing the rider to have a better feel of the horse's movement. Many have "flex trees" and other new features. One of the issues with these new types of saddles is that the designs are so new, it is hard to say whether or not they are really better for the horses' back or not. For example, when the flex tree saddles first hit the market, some models had too much flex and did not distribute the rider's weight as efficiently as the traditional non-flex trees.

According to the USEF western dressage rulebook, the saddle requirements for western dressage are defined as:

A standard stock saddle, national, working saddle, Aussie, native or western side saddle is to be used but silver equipment will not count over a good working outfit. A horn is not required but western style fenders are required. Tapaderos are permitted except in Western Dressage Equitation. Padding or pads on the seat of the saddle are permitted.




I recently had the opportunity to try out a "newer" type saddle on my paint gelding "Indie" that was designed to work well for Western Dressage. The saddle was a "Trail Light" model made by Specialized Saddles, located in Vinton (on the west side of El Paso). The owner. Dave Kaden started out designing saddles that would relieve back pain for endurance horses and their riders. They make the most popular endurance saddle on the market today. What you may not know about Specialized Saddles is that they have a division called TW (Totally Western) that makes performance saddles for Western Dressage, Barrel Racing, Ranch Versatility, Trail riding, and Mounted Shooting. Their Western Dressage saddle (Featherweight Trail model), was featured on the cover of 101 Western Dressage Exercises for Horse & Rider. (Photo on left)

Francis Carbonell of Colorado (photo on right) worked with TW saddles to design her own "FC Legacy" model of TW saddles, also for use in western dressage. (Her saddle is a Feather Weight trail model with the butter fly skirt option that has her logo carved on the skirt.)

What makes the TW saddles different is a combination of their specially designed tree and their patented fitting and construction system. The three dimensional fit system uses special cushions that are adjusted for each horse to mirror the horse's back, thus providing even pressure distribution. The saddle is also designed to free the horse's shoulder improving lateral movement.



Before I test rode one of their saddles on Indie, I looked at the placement of the saddle on his back and noticed that the front of the bars were located behind Indie's shoulder allowing for greater freedom of movement than a traditional western saddle. I lunged Indie with the saddle on so I could see how the saddle looked while Indie was moving. The saddle stayed in place and never rode up in the front or the back, and it never shifted from its original position. It fit Indie like a glove! When I rode in the saddle, I was amazed at how comfortable it was. Did I mention that there are three stirrup positions on this saddle which allow you to adjust the stirrup position on the saddle? This gives the rider a choice of where they would like to position the stirrup to maintain a balanced position.



The saddles are light weight, ranging from 18 to 24 pounds depending on the model. One of the ways they cut down on weight and on bulk is to make the saddles out of bridle" leather; a more flexible and expensive leather than traditional saddle leather.

There are several different "styles" of western saddle to choose from. They have saddles that look like traditional western saddles (i.e. The Wade, Texas Wade, Ranch Versatility, The Shooter and The Barrel Revolution). The "Trail Light" saddle that I tried out did not have a horn or a western style cinch. Instead, it had an English girth and wider stirrups. However, it still fit the USEF definition of a western saddle because it had western fenders. The saddle had beautiful tooling and even came with a breast collar

The bottom line is that Indie and I both loved the fit and feel of the saddle and I bought it. This is by far the best saddle I have ever ridden in. If you are interested in trying out one of these saddles, call Specialized Saddles at (915) 726-0550 or visit their website at <u>TWsaddlery.com</u>. The website has videos and other information about saddle fit and explains why the Specialized Saddles are unique. We are fortunate indeed to have this saddle maker located here in El Paso!

The Century Club recognizes Dressage riders and horses whose combined age totals 100 years or more. Horse and rider perform a Dressage test of any level, at a

Dressage show or event, and are scored by a Dressage judge or professional. An application (found under "Join the Century Club" on the left side bar) must be completed and sent to the Foundation prior to the ride. The Dressage Foundation will send a beautiful black and gold ribbon to be presented to the team at the show. Following the test, the score sheet and papers verifying the ages of the horse and rider are sent to The Dressage Foundation. A handsome Century Club Award bearing the names of the rider and horse, the year of their ride, and team number, is presented to the Century Club Team.

The Century Club was formed at The Dressage Foundation in 1996, at the suggestion of Max Gahwyler (CT), who with his horse Prinz Eugen, became team # 2 in the Century Club (pictured at the left). The first "Centurion Class" ride, held in 1996, featured Lazelle Knocke and her teammate Don Perignon. Lazelle's ride came after her extensive 'three year vacation' away from riding due to surgery and rehab time. As she said, "hopefully the Centurion class will be in the forefront of a very interesting opportunity for Seniors and Dressage as Recreational and Therapeutic riding. It really is challenging and has long-term goals and benefits." The Century Club ride has evolved into a serious endeavor that encourages and rewards our older senior riders. The rider need not show everything at their level of ride, but it is important to show that rider and horse work well together. And while we stress the serious nature of riding a test, we want all senior riders for the Century Club to have fun!

While this club has no dues, no meetings and no agenda, except to enjoy the occasion, many do keep in contact with the Foundation and with each other by email and phone. This is a wonderful group, not only experienced in horsemanship, but in various and unique life experiences. In order "to do good, we must do well," and we will welcome your financial support to help with expenses of the Century Club News, and the personal plaque and ribbon that we present to each Century Club member.

#### ARTICLE WRITTEN BY SUSAN REED, CENTURY RIDER

I have owned Jamaica Rain since her conception – that would be 33 years, now. I brought her sire from Oregon to New Mexico, hence the Rain in his name, and in hers. I traded my diamond ring from my first marriage for her mama, and I definitely got the better deal there! The Jamaica part of my girl's name came from Jamaica Kincaid who was writing short stories that I loved in *The New Yorker* magazine in the 80's.

As soon as she was weaned, I began taking her to various local breed shows to compete in Open Halter classes. More than once, she was champion halter mare over mature mares twice her age. She was, and is, conformationally correct. Her shiny blue-black coat didn't hurt, either.

Jamaica's first dressage competition was as a five-year-old. I

was also showing her older half-brother. They insisted on continually whinnying for each other. We received many "inattentive" comments. I decided to alternate their shows, with much improved behavior and scores. She finished her dressage career with me when she was too heavy in foal to canter 10 meter circles comfortably. Her scores at Second Level were consistently above 60%.

I bred her four times, and she produced two fillies and two colts. Two of those went on to successful careers over fences. I have one of her daughters, Abigail Rain. She has her mother's sweet, patient disposition, and is used for advanced lessons with adult riders.

One of her sons, A Jamais, was spectacular, placing second in the US at the American Warmblood Society Stallion Approval. He had Jamaica's correct build, graceful, natural suspension, and a kind, giving mind. In 2004, he colicked and we couldn't save him.

A friend had taken Jamaica to work while I concentrated on her son. She was stabled just down the road, a short ditch-bank ride away. I saw her frequently. After Jamie's death, I brought Jamaica home to use in lessons. She taught a dozen or more kids to ride. They all wanted to show Jamaica because she always won ribbons in the fun shows.

Two years ago, my vet and I decided it was time for her to retire. The kids still brought her treats and fussed over her. I kept her worked on the lunge line several times a week, and she was turned out with other "senior" ladies to socialize every day.

When I first read about the Century Club, I wondered if Jamaica would still be with me when we were old enough to join. I knew she could be gone any day. Still, she bounced on the lunge line, and cleaned up her meals. I took her to my vet last summer to see what he thought of our prospects. "Go for it," he said, after stress-testing her heart and joints. He did mention that she doesn't have many molars any more, but that doesn't matter much. She'd be getting soaked senior ration and soaked alfalfa pellets.

My old partner was so delighted to go back to work. We practiced only for 15-20 minutes a day in the last weeks before we showed on November 8<sup>th</sup> at the NMDA Cherry Tree Farm Schooling Show. She unloaded from the trailer and took a look around with bright eyes, "Yes! I know the steps to this dance, let's go!" We did well, and lots of us cried after the final salute.
