LEAVE BEHIND YOUR "SINFUL PLEASURES"

Gen. 22:1-2,9-13,15-18; Ps. 116:10, 15-19; Rom. 8:31-34; Mark 9:2-10

The story of Abraham's faith cuts across the beliefs of major religions: Judaism, Christianity and Islam. His story brings out a timeless message to all who wrestle with the problem of fidelity, faith, and trust in a future. It teaches you and me that there is always a way out if we dare to persevere - hoping against all hope.

It all started when the Lord God called Abram to leave his father's land, his household "for the land I will show you" (Gen. 12:1-7) – a land unknown to him. He later became a wealthy and successful man, but without a child of his own. The Lord had told him: "Do not be afraid...I am your shield; your reward will be very great!" (Gen. 15:1). He and his wife, Sarah fasted, prayed and waited for the Lord to fulfill His promise and give them a child. But their desire did not materialize. In his frustration, Abram said: "My Lord, Yahweh, where are Your promises? I am still childless and...You have given me no children, so a slave of mine will be my heir" (Gen. 15:2-3). Abram's perseverance and trust in God paid off. The Lord, in His mercy, later granted his request, and his wife, Sarah, bore him a son whom he named Isaac.

Today's first reading tells us how God asked Abraham to sacrifice his only beloved child, Isaac. For many, such a request would have been seen as bizarre and outrageous. But Abraham never questioned God's intention for such an extreme request. He trusted in God, thus he was prepared to sacrifice his only son - the very "thing" that he loved dearly. He believed in the promise God made to him when he was first called to leave his land and go to a land that he did not know (Gen. 12:1-4). When God calls you, He promises you "a hundredfold here on earth and eternal life thereafter, but not without persecution" (Matt. 19:28-29). When God calls you to "follow Me," like Abraham, He makes "outrageous demands" of you. He calls you to sacrifice the "familiar and the more comfortable present" for the "unknown future." He calls you to a life of spiritual and emotional detachment from material things and persons. He calls us to leave our "comfort zones" behind and take on a new life of sacrifice that will in turn lead us to eternal life with Him in His Kingdom.

The Lenten season affords you and me the opportunity to take a leap of faith - leaving behind the comfortable, but sinful life, we may have been living; and thus, to go on a journey with Jesus to the Mountain where we might experience the light of His transformation. Like Abram, He wants us to sacrifice our pleasures and thus embark on a long and painful journey unto a mountain of possibilities. God requires you and me to put to death our old and sinful ways and to turn back to Him in faith.

Leaving behind our comfort zones for an uncertain future for God's sake can be challenging and sometimes overwhelming. Abraham did it and received God's abundant blessings. You can also do it. St. Paul assures you and me that if God is for us, nothing and nobody can be against us. If Jesus was willing to sacrifice His life for you, how much more will He take care of your material and emotional needs. He always rewards those who are faithful to His commands. God's command today is that we must listen to Christ, His beloved Son. Like Christ, we must be willing to make some painful sacrifices during this Lent and beyond - by dying to self and living for others. The sacrifices we make by way of almsgiving, prayer and fasting, will help us to experience the radiance of God's light, as the Apostles did on the Mountain.



Ten Points for Tithing and Blessings

- 1. Tithe in faith have faith about presenting your tithe by hearing God's Word on your tithe. (Romans 10:17)
- 2. Prove God with your tithes give your tithes, declaring your expectation that He will bless you (Malachi 3:10-12)
- 3. Tithe with rejoicing rejoice in every good thing God has done for you. (Deuteronomy 26:11)
- 4. Worship God with your tithe remember God's goodness towards you. (Prov.3:9-10)
- 5. Bring your tithe to Jesus it is Jesus you are presenting your tithe to. (Hebrews 6:20)
- 6. Bring your tithe to your home church if you want enough supply in your house be sure your tithe is providing supply in His house. (Malachi 3:10)
- 7. Tithe with all diligence this lifts your material affairs into God's sphere of care and fosters your good stewardship.
- 8. Give your tithe before tax your increase is before tax and your tithe is on your increase.
- 9. Tithe inheritances and all types of windfalls these are part of your increase; they are how God increased you.
- Petition God as you tithe your giving of tithes puts you in a special position of confidence as you ask for God's provision and prospering.



WORKSHOP ON END OF LIFE DECISIONS

Father Thomas Berg, Professor of Moral Theology and Medical Ethics at St. Joseph's Seminary in Yonkers will speak about our obligations as Catholics when making decisions about medical care toward the end of life.

As medical technology advances and choices seemingly become more complex, we have a serious obligation to inform ourselves as to what God expects from us when we are making medical decisions. What medical treatment would He want me - or the loved one for whom I am responsible - to undergo? Why or why not? What is the difference between Ordinary and Extraordinary care? What is the best way to legally ensure that my wishes are followed? Should I sign a living will or appoint a health care proxy? What should I look for in a health care proxy? There will also be a period for questions and answers.

The workshop, sponsored by the Advocates of Life, will be held at **St. Eugene's School**, 31 Massitoa Road in Yonkers on **Saturday, March 10th**, from 11:30 a.m. until 1 p.m. Light refreshments will be served.
