### John Cleland

John Cleland is the third generation on his family farm in Capron, IL. However, the history that has unfolded in merely three generations is very intriguing. Cleland's great aunt's father, W.W. Wilson, bought the 320 acre farm in 1904. W.W. Wilson's brother, James Wilson, was the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture from 1897 to 1913. Mr. James Wilson holds the record for the longestserving United States Cabinet member. He served under William McKinley, Theodore Roosevelt, William Howard Taft, and for only a day and a half under Woodrow Wilson. W.W. Wilson's daughter, Ruth Wilson, married Cleland's Great-uncle, K.W. Cleland, in 1913 and took over the farm where Cleland currently lives. Cleland's father, uncle, and grandparents came to the farm in 1951 and farmed until 1973. Cleland joined his father in 1976 and he and his wife, Diane still farm there today. Cleland and his wife have two children, Scott and Daria. Both children are very active on the family farm. The Cleland's farm has grown in size and has modernized over the years. Today the Cleland's raise crops, beef cattle, and show hogs for the kid's 4-H projects. However, in the past they had a farrow to wean hog operation. John is currently serving on the Board of Directors for the Winnebago-Boone Farm Bureau. ### Jeremy Franseen

The Franseen family farm in Poplar Grove, now known as Friendly Franseen Acres, started out as a dairy cattle operation, began in 1940 when Jeremy's grandfather, Ken, started farming on shares. However, upon graduating from the University of Wisconsin-Platteville, Jeremy decided he wanted to try his hand at a different type of dairy. Today, Jeremy and his father, Rick, milk 220 dairy goats twice a day. Jeremy's brother, Josh, cash crops the 240 acre farm. The Franseens also offer handmade soaps, lotions and skin care products made from their goats' milk. Join Jeremy for a day on the dairy farm. Help feed kids, milk goats, and more. ### **Curt Greenlee**

Curt Greenlee of Caledonia, IL knows the term "start fresh" all too well. The Greenlee family farm has been in the family for seven generations. The original property, located on highway 173 across from Rock Cut State Park, was purchased in 1853. However, that

property had been displaced by development. The state widened Highway 173 and used eminent domain on the Greenlee property. Curt purchased land from his father and started over. Despite the move, the Greenlees actually farm a little more than what they did in the past. Curt and his family have overcome some of the biggest struggles a farmer can face. However, they still stay true to the ideas and purposes of their forefathers, those that farmed long before them: to be the best producers they can be. Curt, also serves on the Board of Directors, and partners with his father in their grain operation where he grows and harvests mainly corn and soybeans.
