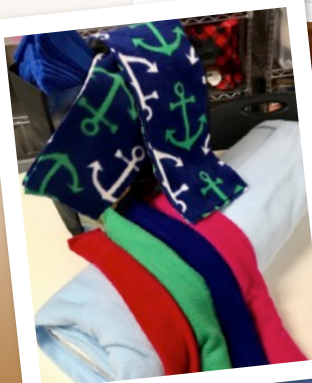
TOL Volunteers Create Handcrafted Items

So often members are asked what we make at Threads of Love. Currently, more than 20 items are handcrafted for babies and families in need. Over the next several issues of our newsletter we will highlight items that are made at TOL and why they are so important to our families.

Caskets – Paul Schmoker has handcrafted more than 300 caskets for financially challenged families in need of a dignified way to bury their child. Each casket is beautifully lined with fabric from wedding dresses donated to TOL. There is no fee for the casket.

Memory Boxes – Memory boxes are created for parents who have lost a baby. Each unique box contains scripture, a small crocheted baby hat and booties, a CD narrated by Max Lucado, a cross, Forget-Me-Not flower seeds, a crocheted bookmark, a small bag for a lock of hair and a small handmade teddy bear. The purpose of the box is to celebrate the life of the baby, no matter how short it was, and is intended to go home with the mother when she leaves the hospital.

Isolette Covers – Isolette covers are important to the development of premature infants. The 36 by 42 inch handcrafted quilts minimize the impact of heat, light and sound to the isolette. The undisturbed sleep helps to promote neurological development in the babies. The handmade quilts are made with lightweight batting and bright, cheerfully colored fabrics. Parents and the nurses share that the quilts brighten up the NICU. And when the babies go home, the isolette covers go home as the baby's first quilt.



Remarkable Rena

Rena Mimms is another unsung hero at Threads of Love. For the past ten years Rena has cut fleece for the most requested item at TOL – our positioning aids. She cuts the fleece for both the large and small positioning aids at her home and frequently delivers the cut pieces to our door. Thank you Rena!

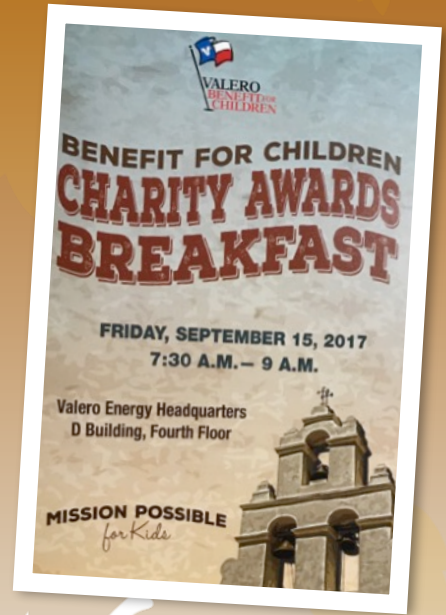
