TOUGH LOVE

(Acts 8:5-8, 14-17; Psalm 66: 1-7, 16, 20; 1Peter 3:15-18; John 14:1521)

"Beloved: Sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts. Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope..." (1 Peter 3:15)

May I use this opportunity to congratulate twenty of our children who received the holy Sacrament of Confirmation last Sunday; and also to reemphasize what was said to them by the confirming prelate, Bishop Gerald Walsh, that Confirmation is not the end, but the beginning of their Christian journey. They must understand that the Sacrament of Confirmation imprints a character on each of them, and empowers them to stand up for what they believe and avoid bad company and falsehood. Consequently, it makes them true Disciples of Christ and empowers them and sends them on a mission. The Bishop reminded the newly confirmed of the "Miracle on the Hudson," and challenged them to emulate the courage and wisdom of the pilot, Captain Chesley "Sully" Sullenberger, who, putting into practice what he learned thirty-five years earlier, was able to land his plane safely on the Hudson River on January 15, 2009, saving the lives of 155 passengers. As confirmed Christians, you should "Always be ready to give an explanation...for your hope (faith)." When the time comes, you must be ready and willing to put into practice what you learned in school, catechism classes, Bible Study and in church.

Today's first reading prepares us for the coming of the Holy Spirit, and outlines for us some of the fruits of the Holy Spirit. In the reading we heard how Philip, Peter and John continued to carry out the work of preaching the good news - driving out demons, healing the sick, baptizing the multitude and laying hands on them for the reception of the Holy Spirit. As confirmed Catholics, you and I have become soldiers of Christ, and have been tasked to defend the faith we were baptized into, and to uphold the Church's teaching, which we were taught in Catholic schools and Religious Education programs. We are summoned to show that we love God by being faithful to the commandments He has given to us through the Church. Thus, in today's gospel, Jesus says to you and me, "If you love Me, you will keep My commandments." Jesus' commandment is the commandment of love - "You must love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your mind, and with all your soul...and you must love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:34-40).

You and I know that being faithful to Jesus' commandments requires a lot of discipline and sacrifice. Jesus' commandment is that "...love one another. Just as I have loved you..." (John 13:34). In other words, you and I must be ready to sacrifice our time, our resources, our talents and even our lives for the good of others. It has to be a self-sacrificing love. This is the kind of love that Saint Peter talks about in the second reading when he says, "it is better to suffer for doing good, if that be the will of God, than for doing evil" (1 Peter 3:17). By the grace of the Spirit you and I received at Confirmation, we will be able to endure the pain and suffering that come with the good we ought to do. In our day-today living and in our encounter with other people, you and I must always remember to keep Jesus' commandments of love because, "Whoever has My commandments and observes them is the one who loves Me. And whoever loves Me will be loved by My Father, and I will love him and reveal Myself to him."


PARISH NEWS



ASCENSION THURSDAY (June 2nd)



The fortieth day after Easter Sunday, commemorates the Ascension of Christ into heaven, according to Mark 16:19, Luke 24:51, and Acts 1:2.

In the Eastern Church this feast was known as *analepsis*, the taking up, and also as the *episozomene*, the salvation, denoting that by ascending

into His glory Christ completed the work of our redemption. The terms used in the West, *ascensio* and, occasionally, *ascensa*, signify that Christ was raised up by His own powers. Tradition designates Mount Olivet near Bethany as the place where Christ left the earth. The feast falls on Thursday. It is one of the Ecumenical feasts ranking with the feasts of the Passion, of Easter, and of Pentecost among the most solemn in the calendar, has a vigil and, since the fifteenth century, an octave which is set apart for a novena of preparation for Pentecost, in accordance with the directions of Leo XIII.

Although the place of the Ascension is not distinctly stated, it would appear from the Acts that it was Mount Olivet. Since after the Ascension, the disciples are described as returning to Jerusalem from the mount that is called *Olivet*, which is near Jerusalem, within a Sabbath day's journey. Tradition has consecrated this site as the Mount of Ascension and Christian piety has memorialized the event by erecting over the site a basilica. St. Helena built the first memorial, which was destroyed by the Persians in 614, rebuilt in the eighth century, to be destroyed again, but rebuilt a second time by the crusaders. This the Moslems also destroyed, leaving only the octagonal structure which encloses the stone said to bear the imprint of the feet of Christ, that is now used as an oratory.

Not only is the fact of the Ascension related in the passages of Scripture cited above, but it is also elsewhere predicted and spoken of as an established fact. Thus, in John 6:63, Christ asks the Jews: "If then you shall see the son of Man ascend up where He was before?" and 20:17, He says to Mary Magdalene: "Do not touch Me, for I am not yet ascended to My Father, but go to My brethren, and say to them: I ascend to My Father and to your Father, to My God and to your God." Again, in Ephesians 4:8-10, and in Timothy 3:16, the Ascension of Christ is spoken of as an accepted fact.

The language used by the Evangelists to describe the Ascension must be interpreted according to usage. To say that He was taken up or that He ascended does not necessarily imply that they locate heaven directly above the earth; no more than the words "sitteth on the right hand of God" mean that this is His actual posture. In disappearing from their view "He was raised up and a cloud received Him out of their sight" (Acts 1:9), and entering into glory He dwells with the Father in the honor and power denoted by the scripture phrase.
