The Future of Smoke Rise Elementary by Kimberly Sizemore

On May 11, 2016, local officials of the DeKalb School Board met with the Smoke Rise community to discuss the future of Smoke Rise Elementary (SRE). Plans to tear down and rebuild a new 600-seat school on its current site have been tabled in light of information pertaining mainly to the septic

system. Mr. Alan Armstrong, chairperson for the Global Committee, communicated clearly that they would not be able to rebuild on the current site due to unforseen issues. "We are committed to having it in this community, but unfortunately we will not be on this site where we have been for the last 50 years. Unfortunately the soil and the rebuild just will not support that," he said.

The school has run into some cost-prohibitive issues, which does not make a rebuild on that site currently feasible. Steve Green, DeKalb Superintendent and Smoke Rise neighbor, was very apologetic that they did not realize until late in the process that the septic issue would pose such a significant problem. In order to put a new sewer infrastructure in place, it would take nine years and 2.5 million dollars. They are constitutionally restricted from using school funds for this. Even more important than the money, is that a new septic system would take up valuable property and would hinder the future school from having desired playing fields and other potential use in that space.

The only alternative is to rebuild on a different site. Currently prospective sites are being considered in three target areas – Smoke Rise, in the Smoke Rise district and attendance area, and outside of the current attendance area, but within the City of Tucker. The problem with rebuilding inside of Smoke Rise is that no property is currently served by sewer, which will require 5-10 acres more than is otherwise needed. If the county finds property that is already connected to septic, they will only need 10-15 total acres.

Multiple members of the board reiterated that the initial goal is to keep the school within Smoke Rise or in its current attendance area. If the school moves outside of the area, but still within the City of Tucker, the county could be looking at redistricting all local schools.

This project could realistically take as long as 22 months to determine a site, using specific criteria, and as long as 24 months to complete after that, putting the projected completion date at as late as March, 2020. In the meantime, students will stay at Smoke Rise Elementary and they will use their budget to complete necessary maintenance items to make the school a viable option until the new completion. Certain maintenance items, which had been previously put off with the expectation of a tear down and rebuild, will now be taken care of as students continue to use that facility for a possible four more years. Concerned community members asked a multitude of questions, including what happens to the current school building. A host of possibilities were presented, included selling the property (although septic problems will be an issue for anyone using the facility), tearing it down or possibly talking to the City of Tucker for using it as park/green space. All of these were just hypothetical possibilities, but the school board assured the community it would not be left as an uninhabitable space.

SRCA NEWS – Sears Development

On April 26th, representatives from Macauley Development and Jerry Silvio & Associates unveiled a redevelopment plan for the 90 +/- acre Sears property at the corner of Hugh Howell Road and Mountain Industrial Boulevard. This is very much a preliminary plan with a lot of moving parts. SRCA is pleased to pass on what we know to date...

Components of the Plan:

Anchoring the current plan is a large postproduction film and television studio with screening rooms. Yes, there is a current proliferation of sound stages in the metro Atlanta area, but none of these are devoted to the lucrative post production market. This would be the first of its kind on the east coast.

There is housing for all age groups from millennial rentals to active adult patio homes, child & adult day care with all-age playgrounds, amphitheater, office space, retail & restaurants, grocery, green space with walking trails with possible connection into Smoke Rise proper, urban garden, and townhouses reminiscent of the Royal Crescent in Bath, England. Parking will be situated in the center of the building squares and therefore hidden from view. Keep in mind that this is the conceptual phase and the project has undergone changes based on input from neighbors and community leaders and will most likely continue to be modified. SRCA will continue to update our members on the latest news. We are, of course, interested in the impact, both positive and negative, this will cause for our community. We are monitoring any proposed changes, traffic patterns/ increased usage, proposed retail/restaurant tenants, and the latest news to keep Smoke Rise up to date and in the loop. Updates are also posted on our Smoke Rise, Georgia 30087 Facebook page. 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Steve Green made sure to voice his commitment to the project. "I am committed to Smoke Rise Elementary, even if we cannot proceed as planned. Nothing will happen to those dollars until a rebuild happens, somewhere in Tucker, hopefully in this community. I am committed to this project and we will take this journey together," he said.

The community was encouraged to get involved and provide feedback and dialogue. A series of meetings will continue over the course of this year, with September and December 2016 meetings already scheduled. At each meeting, they will provide status updates on the site selection, as well as the deferred maintenance items at the current school site.



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

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

Kingfisher Academy Field Trip



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
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Jackson Gibbs, Eagle Scout

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

Personal safety when at home or away

• Safety tips for the exterior of your home. Get motion activated flood lights in your yard. This will not only illuminate potential predators but will also light up the yard for late night family football games. Trim bushes and hedges so they are too small for someone to hide in or behind. Install dead bolts on all exterior doors and change the locks after first moving into your home.

• Seek out security software for your cell phone. Smart-phones have software available that makes tracking them down easy via GPS and built in GPRS frequencies. This will come in handy not only if you lose your phone but also if you are kidnapped or lost. Make sure that family members are familiar with how to use the software to locate your device

• Establish emergency procedures with your loved ones. In addition to standard fire escape routes and safe rooms for your home also consider the following. Decide on key rendezvous locations and assign each one a code name. Potential locations could include: relative/friend's home, zoo, shopping mall, etc. Also establish a code name for each family member and an emergency phrase that family members can use to signal that they are under duress.

• Keep emergency stashes of the most important essentials in key locations. Essentials may include: cash, firearm plus ammunition, photocopies of passports, birth certificates and insurance policies, a prepaid cell phone w/ charger, etc. Storage locations may include: safe deposit box, buried lock box in one of your key rendezvous locations, rented storage space, etc.

Join the Beautification Unit and Make Our Community Shine

DeKalb County launched its newly established Keep DeKalb Beautiful Beautification Unit last month (May 12). This one-stopshop for beautification places the headquarters for Code Enforcement, the Foreclosure/Vacant Property Registry, and Mowing and Herbicide all under one umbrella - and literally under one roof. This initiative helps strategically integrate complementary county services that promote community beautification throughout the county.

The new Beautification Unit is working on creative solutions to

persuade, cajole, and encourage property owners to maintain their buildings and grounds consistent with the minimum standards of habitability and decency, or be subjected to strict enforcement actions. Code Enforcement is now ramped up to hit the streets and hold offenders accountable. Litter patrols are also canvasing the roads to remove unsightly lit-

Probiotics

Scientists have been studying the gastrointestinal tract for a long time. What they have found in the last ten to fifteen years is very interesting, and is changing the way they think about the GI tract's function. The upper intestine and stomach contain very few naturally occurring organisms...possibly because stomach acid and bile secretions keep the organisms from growing. The colon, or lower intestine, however, contains close to 500 different organisms...mostly bacteria and some yeast. These naturally occurring 'bugs' live on the surface of the intestinal tract and seem to perform important roles in maintaining health and immunity.

Since the introduction of antibiotics into the field of medicine in the 1940s, a renaissance of sorts has taken place in the treatment of infectious disease. Over the decades this has resulted in the overuse of antibiotics. In patients who have overused antibiotics, disruption of the balance of naturally occurring gut and skin microorganisms has occurred, leading to antibiotic resistance, serious intestinal diarrheal diseases, and perhaps even a disruption in the role gut microbes have in disease prevention.

So what are probiotics and where do they come in? The American Family Physician calls probiotics "microorganisms with potential health benefits." Simply stated, probiotics are live microorganisms - chiefly bacteria and healthy yeasts - that when taken, prevent disease or help treat it. Currently, there are only three or four circumstances in which probiotics have been scientifically shown to be of benefit. Many of the health claims about probiotics that are currently advertised are unsubstantiated or even false. There are many ongoing studies.

What are the uses for probiotics? Although there is much enthusiasm for probiotics and there are many claims made, there are really only three well-studied uses for them.

• Probiotics can reduce the incidence of antibiotic-related diarrhea by about 50-64% when given with the antibiotic series. The most commonly used probiotics for this cause are Saccharomyces boulardii and Lactobacillus rhamnosus GG. Dosages of more than 5 billion CFUs per day were most effective. Yogurt starter cultures with live Lactobacillus bulgaricus and Saccharomyces thermophiles can prevent antibiotic related diarrhea.

The Cochrane Institute reviewed twenty-three studies that used various probiotics to treat acute infectious diarrhea. (traveler's diarrhea, viral diarrhea and other acutely infectious stomach bugs). They found that probiotics decreased the number of days sick and the amount of diarrhea when they were used along with rehydration therapy solutions. Probiotics, especially S. boulardii, may prevent traveler's diarrhea if begun the week before leaving on a trip.

There are mixed reviews on relief of symptoms of irritable bowel syndrome. Abdominal pain and bloating were the symptoms most relieved. One study showed a 20% reduction in symptoms.

Probiotics have been shown in some studies to prevent atopic dermatitis in susceptible children. Other allergic conditions, such as asthma, food allergies or allergic rhinitis, were not affected or decreased in these children. Lactobacillus fermentum VRI-033 was shown to decrease already established eczema in children with moderate to severe eczema.

Are they safe? There are no absolute reasons not to take probiotics. Mild flatus or occasional abdominal discomfort and soft stools have been reported. Rarely, in severely immunocompromised or seriously ill patients, life threatening infection can occur. This has never been reported in healthy individuals.

Which ones do I use? Most common commercial brands contain a mixture of strains of probiotic including Lactobacillus acidophilus, L. rhamnosus, L. bulgaricus, Bifidobacterium bifidum, B. longum and Saccharomyces boulardii. Many live culture yogurts and yogurt drinks contain Lactobacillus strains in varying amounts per serving. Common doses are 5-10 billion CFU/ day in children and from 10-20 billion CFU / day in adults.

The book, based partly on characters Karen has known, takes place in the Cape Cod/Boston area and she told us how the book came into being. We all had questions about being an author and



the writing process. Before undertaking this novel, she wrote articles for fashion and travel publications.

Her second novel, The Russian Bride, is in the works and we look forward to reading it.

The problem with probiotics: Probiotics are considered a health food or dietary supplement and not a medication, so they are not regulated by the FDA. This means you will see varying amounts of probiotic in different brand products, and even significant variation within the same brand. Because much more research is needed, there is no standardized 'recipe' for what works best with each condition.

Answer Your Door from Anywhere

And I do mean anywhere. Last week from a business meeting in Miami, I answered my side door using my iPhone. With the soothing sound of a wind-chime, it alerted me that there was motion at the door. Seeing on my iPhone screen it was a contractor coming to work on the house, I was able to speak with him and give him instruction about how to enter the house. All from Miami. How cool is that? And convenient.

These new smart doorbells provide much more than convenience. The wide-angled high definition video with motion detector and cloud-recordings of activity serve as a home monitoring system. Depending on how you position it, your phone can alert you when someone steps onto your property or comes down the driveway.

Several popular versions are available at hardware stores or on the Internet, and the going price for them seems to hover around \$199. We picked up the "Ring" doorbell at Lowe's. They come in four colors so you can match it to the color suiting your house. And there are remote add-ons that give additional monitoring and security functionality. For an additional \$30, you can add a chime module that plugs into any electric outlet in the house and chimes so you know when you have a visitor even when you don't have your phone with you.

If you are handy with do-it-yourself projects, you can probably install the device yourself. It replaces the existing doorbell. Once it's installed, you download the app from the iTunes store (or Google Play for Android), and you are in business.

Next month, I'll elaborate on how my smart house enabled me to give access to my contractor remotely.





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Book Clubs – a Window to Conversation and Contemplation by Barbara Bruschi

Books are the silent diplomats of the world. They empower people of all nations to gain knowledge and enable individuals to expand their horizon and guide them to pursue the path of education and a better future.

Around the 17th century the French defined them as "fashionable assemblage(s)." The meetings to discuss ideas circulated in print took place in private homes, as it is often the case today. Perhaps the earliest community book discussion club was founded in 1877 "by the ladies in the small Corn-Belt town of Mattoon, Illinois". It still meets today. Mary Elizabeth Waterhouse founded the Clover Club literary society in 1891. The object of these book clubs is to further reading and to enlighten people globally. With the help of the internet we can stir interest in great books world-wide. Book clubs bring people of all walks of life together to engage in thought processes and to enlighten the mind, to ponder upon the challenges of generations documented in libraries throughout the globe.

It is my pleasure to share some thoughts with our readers about books I have read and enjoyed.

1) Gertrude Bell Queen Of The Desert, Shaper Of Nations: by Georgina Howell.

This is a richly compelling portrait of a woman (born in the year 1868) of extraordinary talents, courage and endless curiosity and intellect. She transcended restrictions of gender, and her vast knowledge of Arabia helped shape the fate of Iraq. She was an archaeologist, spy, Arabist linguist, poet mountaineer and fearless traveler.

2) Mutant Message Down Under: by Marlo Morgan.

An American doctor receives a prize to accompany a remote tribe of nomadic Aborigines to travel the rugged bush of Australia for a four-month-long journey. She faces tests of endurances and challenges and becomes a witness to a world based on ancient wisdom. (The book is not without controversy).

3) The Nightingale: by Kristin Hannah.

An epic drama of World War II. Two sisters embarking on their separate dangerous voyage of survival, love, passion and freedom in a war-torn France.

4) The Book Thief: by Markus Zusak.

This is a love affair with books and words. Liesel the protagonist of the story learns to read and ultimately steals books from bonfires and mansions which are destined to be burned by the Nazis. Liesel, an adopted child tries to preserve the innocence of her childhood in the midst of her destructive surroundings by ultimately writing her own story. The story involves the reign of the terror of the Hitler regime and deals with mortality, friendship and self-discovery.

5) *My Escape from North Korea, A Thousand Miles to Freedom:* by Eunsun Kit with Sebastien Falletti.

This is a dramatic escape story of a woman and her two children from North Korea to South Korea. North Korea being one of the most oppressed regimes on earth. Eunsum is sharing her story with the millions of North Koreans that are still living and suffering daily.

6) Circling The Sun: by Paula McLain.

This is the personal story of Beryl Markkam. Brought to Kenya from England at a young age. Abandoned by her mother, she becomes a bold woman living by her own rules amongst a decadent, bohemian community of Europeans expats. She also has a string of disastrous relationships.

7) The No.1 Ladies Detective Agency: by Alexander McCall Smith.

This is a delectable heart-warming story of a lady detective in Botswana, Africa. The female detective MMA RAMOTSWE sets out to be the first female detective. With her ambition to help and her intuitive thinking and ability to judge people she embarks upon many ventures. There is a series of books written to follow this one.

8) Mademoiselle Chanel by C.W. Gortner

Born into poverty, raised in a convent orphanage, this is the rise of legendary Coco Chanel. The discovery of her sewing talent propelled her into the world of luxury by ultimately finding favors with the love of her life. In 1920 Coco Chanel created the youthful image of the modern woman.

9) Rogue Lawyer: by John Grisham

This book has a series of vignettes about a lawyer who takes cases of rather despicable criminal defendants. Like all of Grisham's books, it is entertaining and at times humorous. 10) *I am Pilgrim*, author Terry Hayes is riveting and thrilling and you don't want to put it down.



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11) The Martian: by Andy Weir

One Man's struggle to survive on Mars. Left behind by his crew in a sandstorm, astronaut Mark Watney is being challenged to create a sustainable way of surviving as the sole inhabitant on Mars. Science fiction at its best.

No matter how individuals feel about a certain book, the idea of critically evaluating



what we read is up to each of us. Without books our world would be deprived of history and all events taking shape in our universe. Silent diplomats can be a blessing in many ways. Morning Glories Met the "Komodo Dragon"

Well, it was not the famous huge lizard but a named hosta cultivar "Komodo Dragon"! Rick Lee, co-owner of PoPo's Garden in Stone Mountain was the guest speaker for the May meeting. Rick brought a wide variety of hostas for the club to admire and purchase for their own gardens. In his talk, he noted that hosta is considered the "Queen of the Shade Garden". There are over 8000 named cultivars of hostas from the original family of about 40 native hostas in Asia. The "Komodo Dragon" variety is quite large and can quickly grow to 36" tall and 30" wide. Hostas

can be grown in the ground or in containers very successfully. The time to fertilize is fall and spring when they are just emerging from the ground. Rick uses Osmocote, the slow release fertilizer, in his nursery and also uses soil conditioner when planting the hostas. When the hosta leaves die back in the late fall, remove the leaves and throw them away. Do not compost the leaves as they might contain virus or disease.

Rick observed that the darker the leaves, the more they prefer shade. Lighter or white edged varieties can tolerate morning sun. There are many sizes and types of hostas now including the mini varieties. For more information on hostas, you can go to www.hostalibrary.org or the Georgia Hosta Society has a very active chapter in our area.

Mountain Mums Weather the Storm

The Mountain Mums held their May meeting at the home of Mary Jacobson. After touring Mary's beautiful gardens they listened to speaker, Diane Minick, owner of Stormwater Landscapes in Canton. She is also the Watershed Director of the Upper Etowah River Alliance. Diane discussed bog and rainwater gardens and also various problems that we face with water run-off and pooling in our yards. She focuses on natural methods to solve ugly problems by determining what



is right for each individual site. Solutions may include developing the site to include either a rain garden or an infiltration garden, the building of a swale, terracing the land or a combination of any of the above. One interesting fact the Diane shared is that English ivy is a haven for mosquitos and rather than using pesticides or removing the ivy altogether, a simple solution is to leaf blow the ivy once per week. It is the accumulation of water on the underside of the flat leaves that attracts and breeds the mosquitos and the leaf blowing dries up this water. A recurrent theme in her presentation was the importance

of slowing the water down so it can seep into the soil as much as possible. Ideas included attaching flexible downspouts with holes punched along the sides so that the water could escape along the length of the tube, along with capping the tube at the end. She also demonstrated a variety of materials to slow the water down and use it to nourish different native plants. Her presentation was informative and enjoyable, and at the end it seemed that each Mum, either has or has had some problem with water run-off in their yards. Container Bog Garden Demonstration at Mountain Shadow Garden Club June 13

Some of you might have noticed that I have taken a little break. Most people take a break to recharge and re-energize, coming back full of new ideas and vigor and all kinds of positive attitudes. Yes, I took a break. Yes, I intended to recharge. No, it didn't work. Instead of being productive, I relaxed to a point where I now realize that I actually didn't cook for two months – well, nothing new anyway. What I did was make afternoon tea munchies and obsess over tiny little yummy things. I love making tiny, yummy things for a crowd because they almost always get compliments, some of which are sincere. Tiny things taste complicated but are, in reality, just big things cut into small shapes. Think about how much cuter a tiny cube of cheese is than a wedge...add a toothpick and you have a party. Put it on a doily and wait for the compliments to just roll in. So here goes with a couple of tiny, delicious things that made up part of my obsessive tea party.

First, let's deal with finger sandwiches. Finger sandwiches are just sandwiches cut small. Do not be intimidated. There are tricks to insure that people will think you are a master fiddler and chef extraordinaire. First, use crumby old cheap white sandwich bread. You can use cheap wheat bread for a color contrast. Don't use nice thin lovely expensive bread. Just don't. The filling should be the star, not the bread.

Second, fill sandwiches first, then cut off crusts using a serrated knife...saw them off...If you push you'll mash the edges and that bread will seal itself into flat awfulness. You will lose a bit of filling that escaped to the edges, but you can eat those scraps or toss them.

Third, cut a sandwich into three rectangles, sawing away with your lovely sharp, serrated knife. You can layer them in a plastic container, but no more than three high or the sandwiches will smash themselves into a large blob of unrecognizable breadish adobe brick food. Over the first layer, place a sheet of waxed paper, then place a barely moist paper towel, then another sheet of waxed paper. Put another layer of sandwiches and repeat with waxed paper and paper towel. Your last layer can have just waxed paper. Seal and refrigerate overnight if you need to. They will be fresh and moist – no problem. I guess you want a recipe by now, huh?

Spring Veggie Sandwiches

Filling :

2 medium peeled carrots, cut into chunks

1 green pepper (or red if you want filling to be a bit pink)

- 2 stalks celery, cut into chunks
- 1 smallish green onion, white and pale green part only
- 1 lg. or 2 med. cucumbers (peeled, seeds removed and cut up)
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 hefty tablespoon mayonnaise
- 8 ounces good quality cream cheese
- ½ teaspoon salt

Put carrots, pepper, celery and onion in food processor and grind until tiny. Add cucumber and whirl around again to grind it. You should have about 3+ cups. Put in colander or fine mesh sieve over a bowl and drain forever. Really. Drain until it's pretty dry, should take about 45 minutes at least. Press on it some. The leftover juice is totally wonderful and healthy and is great with tomato juice and vodka to get you through this ordeal. Mix cream cheese, lemon juice and mayo until it's really smooth. Do this in processor if you want. Add back the really well-drained veggies and salt and mix. Spread on sandwiches and cut into thirds. Or however you want. These are the best cucumber sandwiches ever and taste fresh and summery.

Walnut Cookie Bars

Base: 16.5 ounce pouch dry sugar cookie mix 1/2 cup real butter and 1 egg (Base) Filling: 1 ¹/₂ cups brown sugar ³/₄ teaspoon baking powder ¹/₂ teaspoon salt ¹/₂ teaspoon maple extract 3 eggs 3 cups chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 350°. Lightly spray a 9x13 pan.Mix base ingredients and pat into pan. Bake 15-20 minutes until just brown around edges. Mix sugar, baking powder, eggs, salt and extract. Add nuts, mix and pour over hot crust. Bake another 15-20 minutes. Cool and cut into squares, then cut those into triangles to impress everyone. These are not super sweet and are fabulous with tea. You can make them with pecans, but leave out the maple and add a touch of vanilla extract instead. They freeze beautifully as well. They taste more delicious because they are tiny!!
