Pastor's Message

His vast understanding of building effective collaborative community networks makes it possible for UPC, and me, to engage in shared ministry that creates the links necessary to positively impact the quality of life for others less fortunate than ourselves.

Davaughn does an excellent job of remaining in the background while helping strengthen community partner relationships and coordinating collecting and moving goods, including providing the physical labor needed. He works with our ministry partners to identify ways UPC can collaborate with them for the good of the community. He manages the church's food ministry and loads and unloads the boxes of food that UPC distributes to other organizations that offer that food to individuals and families in need.

During this season of thanksgiving, please join me in thanking God for empowering us to show God's love by using

In addition to a beautiful plaque and the privilege of attending the As-


sociation's keynote address about effective leadership, I received a monetary award that I am donating to United's Helping Homeless Families Initiative (HHFI).

What is Advent? (November 27th to December 24th, 2022)



"The celebration of Advent is possible only to those who are troubled in soul, who know themselves to be poor and imperfect, and who look forward to something greater to come." ~ Dietrich Bonhoeffer

"God of hope, I look to you with an open heart and yearning spirit. During this Advent season, I will keep alert and awake, listening for your word and keeping to your precepts. My hope is in you." ~ Matthew Kelly

"Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." <u>Isaiah 7:14</u>

Advent (from Latin *adventus*, "coming") is the period of preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ at Christmas and of preparation for the Second Coming of Christ. Advent begins on the Sunday nearest to November 30 and is the beginning of the liturgical year. The traditional liturgical color for Advent is purple.

Advent Symbolism

Advent symbolizes the present situation of the church in these "last days" (Acts 2:17, Hebrews 1:2) as God's people wait for the return of Christ in glory to consummate his eternal kingdom. The church is in a similar situation to Israel at the end of the Old Testament: in exile, waiting and hoping in prayerful expectation for the coming of the Messiah. Israel looked back to God's past gracious actions on their behalf in leading them out of Egypt in the Exodus, and on this basis, they called for God once again to act for them. In the same way, the church, during Advent, looks back upon Christ's coming in celebration while at the same time looking forward in eager anticipation to the coming of Christ's kingdom when he returns for his people.

In this light, the Advent hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" perfectly represents the church's cry during the Advent season:

O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, That mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appears. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.


While Israel would have sung the song in expectation of Christ's first coming, the church now sings the song in commemoration of that first coming and in expectation of the second coming in the future.




Congratulations to William Bishop-Mote

On average, approximately 4-6% of all Scouts earn the Eagle Rank. Congratulations to William Bishop-Mote on successfully completing his Eagle Board of Review and earning the rank of Eagle Scout. William is Helen Foerster's grandson and the son of Leslie Bishop who grew up in UPC.

Will's Eagle Service Project was the remarking of the Bird Street Trail System and adding an informational kiosk at the Forest Road entrance near the water tower in their town. This kiosk contains a map of the Bird Street trails, along with a QR code linking back to the PDF of the map as well as a legend of the trail marking symbols. The Stoughton Conservation Commission (Stroughton, MA) has received a grant that will include adding kiosks at the other trail heads.

Will led a group of 5 adults and 11 current and former Scouts from Troop 516, including 2 Eagle Scouts, in remarking the trails in June and July and completed the kiosk build and installation in July. A total of more than 154 combined hours were spent planning, preparing, and executing this project.





November 1st—All Saints Day

All Saints' Day is holy in the Western Christian tradition, celebrated by the Roman Catholic Church, the Methodist Church, the Lutheran Church, the Presbyterian Church and more. It is designed to show honor and reverence to saints both canonized and unknown, and in some faiths also to



give thanks to those who have guided others to Christ, like a friend or relative. Around the world, there are many traditions woven into All Saints' Day, from the laying of flowers on graves on November I to the Mexican Day of the Dead — which honors children who have passed on, on the holiday's first day — not to mention Halloween in the U.S. and Canada, a celebration that originally was in large part linked to All Saints' Day.

Today, the holiday is also known — depending on the location and branch of the church — as All Hallows' Day, Hallowmas, the Feast of All Saints, and the Solemnity of All Saints.

The tradition of Haloween originated with the ancient Celtic festival of <u>Samhain</u>, when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. The evening before was All Saints Day was known as All Hallows Eve, and later Halloween.

Election Day - November 8, 2022

One of the most important rights of American citizens is the franchise—the right to vote. Originally under the Constitution, only white male citizens over the age of 21 were eligible to vote. This shameful injustice has been corrected and voting rights have been extended several times over the course of our history. Today, citizens over the age of 18 cannot be denied the right to vote on the basis of race, religion, sex, disability, or sexual orientation. In every state except North Dakota, citizens must register to vote, and laws regarding the registration process vary by State.

Prayer:

May the God of justice lead us through the tumultuous seas. May the Christ who came to dwell among us renew the strength of our dreams. May the Holy Spirit guide us to still waters where justice, solidarity, and peace reign. Amen.

At the Time of an Election Under your law we live, great God, and by your will we govern ourselves. Help us as good citizens to respect neighbors whose views differ from ours so that without partisan anger, we may work out issues that divide us, and elect candidates to serve the common welfare; through Jesus Christ the Lord. Amen.






A veteran is a word that simply means someone who is experienced in a field. But in our country, we also call those men and women who serve (or have previously served) in our military and in any branch a veteran.




Contributions to the Building Fund are welcome anytime and may be accomplished in the following ways:

Just know that they are human first and though they are family to you,


they may be a friend to someone else and will fit somewhere in the criteria above.

How to Turn a Church Into a Garden

Rev. Dr. Heber Brown III wants to connect Black churches with Black farmers—and transform a historic source of trauma into a source of pow-

It wasn't until Rev. Dr. Heber Brown III decided to transform the front yard of his church into a garden that he began to remember his

own connection to farming. The senior pastor of Pleasant Hope Baptist Church in Baltimore grew up picking string beans and tomatoes from his grandparents' backyard. He'd listen to stories about how his great-grandmother used to preserve food in towering stacks of mason jars—enough to share with her whole rural Virginia neighborhood. Today he carries that legacy forward as founder of the Black Church Food Security Network, an organization that connects churches with farmers in numerous states. His goal? To create alternative food systems that address systemic issues such as racism and climate change.

Foster connections and teach churchgoers to grow their own food

In addition to fostering connections and teaching churchgoers to grow their own food, Brown's own church regularly hosts a market where they sell tomatoes, cucumbers, summer squash, radish, okra, and other produce at affordable prices. They even grow their own herbs and make elderberry syrup to serve during communion instead of the usual packaged juice.

Last year, amid the global pandemic and a nationwide racial reckoning, Lizzo and Dua Lipa were among the celebrities to champion the Black Church Food Security Network, attracting funding from partnerships and a major increase in public donations. I caught up with the reverend to learn more about the inspiration behind the network, the enduring legacy of Black churches, and the outdated nature of our current food system.

Ten years ago I started really paying attention.. to a pattern I saw in my congregation: People being hospitalized for diet-related issues. I wanted to do something about it beyond the spiritual support that is common for a pastor. So we took a portion of the church's front yard, about 1,500 square feet, and started growing our own produce.

The death of Freddie Gray... at the hands of the Baltimore police came five years after that. In the midst of the uprising. we saw city government and social support agencies back up off the Black community. Public transportation stopped running for a few days. The school system closed and 80,000 Black students who depended on school cafeterias for breakfast and lunch couldn't get that support. And so, bending the existing assets of Black churches—their kitchens, the vans, the people, the space—we began connecting with Black farmers so we could feed ourselves. That's how I launched the Black Church Food Security Network, in hopes of connecting Black churches with Black farmers. Word started to spread beyond Baltimore. Today we have more than 60 Black farmers providing fresh produce to the congregations within our network.

Our current food system is propped up by... plantation economics and has a deep legacy of enslavement and oppression. There's little that can be done to completely reform and change that system, and for me, little motivation to dedicate the few years I have on this earth to trying to change such a gargantuan system that has been oppressive

for centuries. What I'd like to do is co-create alternative micro food systems, not just because of the racism and the oppression in the current food system, but also because of the impending challenges around climate change, the growing concerns around geopolitics, and COVID-19, which showed us how fragile our current food system is.

There's a lot of trauma... around farming and gardening in the Black community. Historically, many Black families left or were forced out of the South and off their land. The ripple effect of that trauma can be passed from generation to generation so the idea of farming can bring up some difficult memories. We had to create space to recognize that the land never terrorized us. Corn, tomatoes, cucumber, and watermelon never disrespected or violated us. The land is not the source of our trauma; it can be a source of our power if we organize those assets and resources together.

I know I've failed if...this effort ceases to exist once I'm no longer here. Food is a sacred symbol in every Black church. I say to people often that after the pulpit, the second holiest place in the building is the kitchen. The Black church has been around for a very long time; our greatest shot at having something that extends far beyond our lifetime is planting it in our soil and watching it blossom.

Zacchaeus Goes Out on a Limb

Theme: Jesus knows my name.

Object: A tape measure to measure the children.

Scripture: Luke 19:1-10

How tall are you? I thought it might be fun to measure some of you and see how tall you are. (Take a few minutes to measure some of the children.) Well, some of you are rather tall and some of you are shorter than some of the others.

I can remember when I was the age of some of you. I wasn't very tall. Many times I had trouble reaching things that were up on a high shelf. Sometimes, I would have to stand on a footstool or pull up a chair to stand on to reach what I wanted. If there was a tall person sitting in front of me at the movie, I would have to lean from side to side to see around them or sit on my knees to see over them.

What are some challenges people face when they're short? What's it like for you when you're somewhere and you just can't see? What do you do to try to see better?

I don't have to tell you about the problems of being short in a world full of tall people. You face that problem every day.

Today's Bible lesson is about a man who was very short. His name is Zacchaeus. You may know his story. You may have learned this song when you weren't much more than a baby:

Lead children in singing:

Zacchaeus was a wee little man, And a wee little man was he. He climbed up in a sycamore tree, For the Lord he wanted to see. And as the Savior passed that way, He looked up in the tree, And he said, "Zacchaeus, you come down! For I'm going to your house today. For I'm going to your house today.

When Jesus came by and saw Zacchaeus in the tree, Jesus looked up at him and called him by name. Jesus knew his name! And Jesus knows your name.

Jesus said. "Zacchaeus! Come down quickly. I am going to be a guest in your home today." And Zaccaheus took Jesus to his house. The people could not believe that Jesus would go to the home of a man like that!

Lead children in acting shocked.




