## **SACRIFICIAL GIVING**

When we think of ancient Israel, we often think of priests offering sacrifices on altars: a lamb, a sheaf of wheat, a small bird or some grain. Whatever the gift may have been, all would be consumed in the flames. What is the point? The



basic point seems to have been this: worshipers brought things, most often their most previous tings, and left them at the altar. They gave them up; they gave them away. The liquid was poured out, the animals were slaughtered, the grain was incinerated. People gave offerings to God as an act of worship and those offerings were simply destroyed.

The idea of sacrificial giving is foreign to most people. This practice of faithful giving requires *renunciation*—we are to use all of our money in God-pleasing ways but we are to take some of our money and give it to God ...and give it away. The biblical standard of sacrifice means that we give up control of all the money that has been given to us. and we do not expect anything in return. I am invited by Christ to give my money to God in a sacrificial way as a response to his goodness and love.

I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship.—Romans 12:1







How to confront and embrace your fears One daughter of a contributing writer embodied Death which she feared. She dressed up as and pretended to be Death. The fear didn't completely go away, but the intensity diminished.

How to relate to other people, even when they seem different. Young readers remind another author how similar we all are beneath the surface - we are all human. Young readers tend to see her Asian protagonist as any American teen. Her background may be different but her conflict with loved ones, feelings that she doesn't measure up, struggling to fit in are world -wide in the teen world.

How to find joy in the day-to -day. Everything is new to them. Borrow that wonder, notice the joy in the everyday. Children don't care if the day is not sunny...a picnic is a joy.

How to make time for bonding rituals. How deeply children remember rituals and the important part s of rituals. Two of my granddaughters visit, the third one wants to do exactly the same things as the other two when it is her turn. And how often do conversations begin with "Grandma, do you remember when we...?"

igspace How not to hold back. I A had a grandson run into the house and into me and say "I have missed you, Grandma." Melts my heart. And out of the blue, one of the grandchildren will throw arms around me and say "I love you, Grandma!" Or just to hear "Grandma, you're the best." It is so freeing just to tell them how you feel as well... my line, when they do something ridiculous is "well, that's attractive," with all the sarcasm I can muster. They of course have picked up the line and let me know when I do something "less than attractive", as well! I love their freedom with emotions.

## Happy New Year from the Social Ministry Committee!

We hope you all had a very Merry Christmas and wanted to thank you for your generosity in supporting *Coats for Christmas* and *Hope for the Holidays*. First Lutheran provided 50 coats, as well as 21 accessories hats, scarves and gloves for folks in our community and sent 73 beautiful Christmas cards and wishes to interned migrant families.

With the first of the year upon us, we'd like to talk to First about First Aid.

First aid supplies are on the main floor in the kitchenette in cupboard marked *FIRST AID*. There is also a first aid box in the pantry in the kitchen in Fellowship Hall. It is to the left as one enters the pantry.



A wrist blood pressure cuff is also available for anyone in the congregation to use to check their own or someone else's blood pressure if there is concern about the person. This will be kept in the cupboard in the kitchenette. While it is shiny and new, it's not a toy and must be used by a responsible person. It isn't difficult to use and if you would like to learn how to use this cuff or have questions please see Carolyn Bryant for a demonstration.



Social Ministry has ordered an AED (automated electronic defibrillator) to be used in an emergency here at the church. While we all hope that we will never need it, it is a valuable tool to have just in case. A class will be offered for ushers and anyone else interested in learning how to use this item. It is not difficult to use as the AED gives verbal commands when it is in use and only applies a "shock" if it is needed. If you are CPR and AED certified to teach others, please contact Carolyn Bryant (419-422-0015) and together we will try to set up a time for a class.

Our committee is thankful for the support and generosity of First's church body and we are excited for a New Year, full of opportunity for this great ministry. Join us! We meet the second Monday of the month.

#### "WHO AM I"

As we hear and read the Gospel lessons, we ask the question, "Where am I in the story that Jesus tells: WHO AM I?"

In the First Sunday in Advent, Jesus is talking to us about the end times and tells us that no one knows the time, so we are to be ready. Yes, we are to be ready by reading scripture, praying, and helping others.

In the Second Sunday in Advent, we hear that we are with Jesus at the Jordan River watching a man dressed in rags saying that he is preparing the way of the Lord and baptizing people. The question for us is raised, what are we doing to prepare the way for the Lord?

In the Third Sunday in Advent, John the Baptist is calling us to repent, which means to turn back to God. Who Am I but a blessed, beloved, baptized Child of God? In the Fourth Sunday in Advent, we find that we are witnessing an awesome event. Joseph's young bride to be is with child and says she has conceived by the Holy Spirit. Joseph does not want to disgrace her, so he decides to marry Mary. If you were a participant in this strange story of Matt. 1.18-25, what would you do as a member of the crowd or a family relative? Yes, WHO AM I, and what would I do?

After the Advent Season we have the beautiful season of Christmas with all the lights and Christmas carols. Here again we ask the question, "Where are you in this Christmas story?" The story is in Luke 2.1-20. We read that Joseph takes Mary to Bethlehem, finding there is no room for them but in a stable. Out in the valley below Bethlehem there are shepherds watching their sheep at night, and an angel appears saying, "I

bring you good news." If you were one of the shepherds, what would you think? When is the last time you saw an angel? Or heard a host of angels singing:

"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"

Yes, for unto you and me is born a Savior, and His name is Immanuel, "God with us" (Matt. 1.23). If you were one of the shepherds, what would you do? What do you do today? You received the candle light on Christmas Eve. What a beautiful sight, but did you take the light of Jesus into your heart? For unto you Jesus is born.

Next month we will look at *Epiphany, Lent and Holy Week.*


