Hello, Everyone! Welcome to another new and exciting year for the Northern Kentucky Bluegrass Music Association! I certainly hope everyone had a wonderful holiday! The weather has been surprisingly mild this year and now we only have a few more weeks until it's OVER!

The purpose of this article is to announce the results of our Martin Guitar Raffle. Dan Schnitzler's name was drawn as the winner of the guitar on a Facebook live feed at our annual Christmas Party December 14, 2018. We tried every way we could to reach him, but for several weeks we heard nothing. I kept the remaining ticket stubs in the raffle barrel in the event we would need to hold another drawing. During our ticket sale campaign, I also kept a running list of each purchaser's name, phone and ticket number- as well as who sold the ticket. This effort certainly paid off! I was able to look at the list and find Dan's son's phone

number and called him. I explained to his son, Kraig, that his father had won the guitar raffle and we were trying to reach him. Within a few minutes Mr. Schnitzler called me and we arranged for him to receive the guitar at our January 25th Willis jam session.

Fast forward to January 25th. It was getting late and we were worried that Dan wouldn't make it to the jam session when he finally arrived with his family. We captured the presentation of the guitar on FaceBook Live and he played a quick tune for us.

Dan purchased his ticket at the AJ Jolly Sun Valley Bluegrass Festival that was held in Campbell County in July. When I asked him what prompted him to purchase a ticket he stated, "because you were only selling 250 tickets and the odds would be better." Real Bluegrass

I woke up this morning and looked out at my weather rock in the yard. It was brightly lit and had a thin coat of frosty snow on it which told me it was clear, sunny, and cold. I recommend everyone have a good well-calibrated weather rock. They are always reliable and correct. If you need one, stop by my house and we'll pick out a good one down on the creek bank for you. I bundled up in many layers of clothes bearing a Carhartt tag, put the fur of a dead rabbit on my head and headed out to take care of the creatures. The horses still had 500 lbs of hay to nibble on but their water was under an inch of ice. They could have busted through it with their dinnerplate sized feet but I felt like I was doing a good deed for them by chopping away the ice. I then opened up the kiddies swimming pool ice for the ducks because the pond is just too far from the house for them to feel safe. My three hundred pounds of dogs that came from the upper slopes of the Pyrenees Mountains are comfortably stretched out in the snow, really in their element, the female of the bunch in her second week of pregnancy. The cats are, well....they are cats.

I headed out to work, diesel smoke gently blowing behind the truck and got caught at the train tracks for a minute of quiet reflection with the clickety clack of the cars going by. On the other side of the tracks, I passed a neighbor and we stopped our trucks. He showed me his missing rear door handle which he pulled right the heck off this morning trying to get it open past the ice. We caught up on all the latest news through open windows, in the shade of a new barn being framed up, blocking the whole danged road and finally parted ways as a car was coming up. I passed the feed store where you can get anything from bee boxes to cow mix to old saddles and everything in between. But most importantly, you get the news. That is where you go to find out what happened down the road

where there were tracks...looked like upside down...and the proprietor would tell you what really happened. There is no fake news in the feed store. There's also an old guitar and a mandolin on the wall in case anybody is feeling musical as they sit around the pellet stove warming up.

Tonight I am heading to an assisted living home with some friends to do some caterwauling, bluegrass style for some people that generally seem to enjoy it. True, partial deafness might help the audience but I have always enjoyed playing at places like these.

Back when I was a young impressionable lad, I was beaten and forged like a horseshoe on an anvil by a Marine Drill Instructor and literally re-taught how to walk (albeit exactly like everyone else under his instruction). This Marine inherited his grandpa's fiddle and learned how to saw that thing with more musical grace than the A LETTT, ROIT, LETTT, ROIT cadence that I first heard him bark out. After 15 years or so of our military careers and life, we ran into one another and started picking together. His living room is often the gathering place for getting together for what I would have to call a "bluegrass service". Often friends, sometimes strangers, come together under the common cause of music right there in his home. Food and

drink, good times, bad jokes, and lots of music.

About the same time in my youth when I was learning what, "drop and give me twenty" meant, a young redheaded horse-crazy girl was stopping by the family farm to play with the horses. She is still horse-crazy and her Dad plays music with



us, even going so far as to join the N K B M A board and produce this newsletter.

My Dad and I built him his first bass. A "Doghouse" bass including shake pine shingles, adjustable foot peg, model 'KAY-9' nameplate and dog in the sound hole. A 60th birthday surprise currently display in his music studio.

I can't begin to tell you how much fun it is to play music. It has very little to do with moving your fingers to the right frets and picking the right notes though it is awesome when everybody gets it all together and you are really MAKING MUSIC. The real beauty of bluegrass is the all-inclusiveness, the making and keeping friends, the life paths you never thought would end up this way, and the nostalgic way of life that is somehow still going on. I am writing this

article on January 25, 2019, but all of this could have easily happened a hundred years ago or more with almost no changes. Bluegrass music, playing bluegrass music is a way of life and a drug that is way better than anything you could get on a street corner. I'm hooked.




