#### **Playing the lottery**

The WI Lottery is an exciting weekly lottery that raises money for good causes in the UK. All good causes supported by the lottery will benefit the UK and its residents.

Play the lottery, support good causes in the UK - it's that simple!

Tickets for the lottery cost just £1 a week. Each ticket has a **1 in 50** chance to win a prize each week, with a top prize of £25,000! There's a better chance of winning the jackpot than the National Lottery or the Health Lottery.

Each ticket has six numbers and each number is between 0 and 9. There will be a draw every Saturday night when a six digit winning combination will be picked. As mentioned in the last newsletter, the 16 days of activism to end gender-based violence runs from 25<sup>th</sup> November to 10<sup>th</sup> December, the latter being International Human Rights Day.

The WI campaign No More Violence Against Women was launched in 2019, but the WI has long campaigned to make sure that women and girls can live the lives they choose, free from the fear of abuse. United Nations' research estimates that globally approximately 736 million women — almost one in three — have been subjected to either physical or sexual intimate partner violence, non-partner sexual violence, or both, at least once in their life. In addition, the UN report that more than five women or girls are killed every hour by someone in their own family and that 86% of women and girls live in countries without legal protections against gender-based violence.



## Positive Steps for the Environment – 10

Buy Nothing Day 24<sup>th</sup> November

The tradition of 'Black Friday' started in the United States and has now been adopted here in the United Kingdom. It takes place on the fourth Friday of November and is when many shops and retailers reduce their prices temporarily to encourage shoppers to buy more products.

While we all love a bargain and there are some genuinely good deals on Black Friday, companies are really encouraging people to buy more 'stuff' – often things that they don't really need. If we are trying to live more sustainably and reduce our impact on the planet, one way to do this is to cut down on our consumption of goods.

In an effort to counteract the effects of over-consumerism, Buy Nothing Day was established in 1992. The idea is that this day is a 24-hour detox from consumerism and an opportunity to think about the impact we have on the environment through shopping. Recycling is great but reducing is better! If we all take simple steps to cut down on what we consume, we will change our attitude towards single use packaging, fast fashion and our throw away culture. Many companies with a more ethical outlook reject Black Friday and offer alternatives such as donating to charity.

## <u>United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP 29) – November 2024</u>

COP 29 will take place in Azerbaijan from 11 - 22 November this year. It is a conference where world leaders come together to measure progress and negotiate the best ways to address climate change. This year, the intention is to ensure all countries commit to ambitious national plans and that finance is made available to put plans into action.
