Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Thank you to Pastor Kochenderfer for preaching a wonderful sermon on the Baptism of Our Lord. Thanks, too, to the many people who contributed to the Music fund-raising goal. We met the goal, so we had the great enjoyment of hearing Pastor Martha Kriebel on All Saints Sunday and then Pastor Kochenderfer commemorating one of the great events of Jesus' life

and ministry.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 26, 2020. The Ash Wednesday Service starts at 7:00 PM. The confirmands will take a major role in this liturgy as worship leaders. Worshipping with us on Ash Wednesday is a powerful way to begin Lent and a sign of support for our confirmands as they continue to assume a greater adult role in the life and ministry of Augustus.



I would also like to report on our 2020 Stewardship Campaign to date. As of the writing of this newsletter article in mid-January, we have received 78 Commitment Cards for 2020 totaling \$131,406 of the \$275,000 we need to support our ministry. If you have not returned your Commitment Card, we would be delighted to receive it by the end of February. A copy of the 2020 Commitment Card can be downloaded from the parish web site, www.augustustrappe.org, under the "About Us" tab.

To give some perspective, we have 274 giving units at Augustus. What is a giving unit?

A husband and wife together constitute a one (1) giving unit.

A single adult is counted as a single giving unit.

Confirmed children living who are living at home are each considered a single giving unit.

Add them all together and you get 274 giving units.

Now of the 274 *giving units*, 74 are confirmed members who are still in school and have not yet entered the adult work force. Therefore, we have 200 **adult** *giving units*.

78 of the *giving units* have submitted a financial Commitment Card for 2020 totaling \$131,406 to support our ministries of worship, education, outreach, and helping others.

The remaining 122 *giving units* must make up the remaining \$143,594 if we are to maintain our current level of ministry.

If you are one (1) of the 78, thank you for your written estimate of commitment. If you are one of the remaining 122 adult *giving units*, we await your commitment.

May the God of glory dwell in you richly and shine brightly on your path.

#### **Christian Education**

Winter can be long, dark and cold—good thing we in the Church can bask in the light of Christ and the warmth of God's love! Our Sunday school students will be celebrating Jesus' teaching and miracles in February, ending with our yearly ice-cream social on Transfiguration Sunday (our mini-"Mardi Gras" just before Lent begins).

On March 1<sup>st</sup> we'll meet our prayer pals—adults in the church who are not involved in Sunday school but who care about our children and pray for them during Lent. If you would like to be a prayer pal to a group of extraordinary children, please let me know!

I will be exploring spiritual gifts with our Senior High Youth Group and our soon-to-be confirmed 2<sup>nd</sup> year confirmands on February 5<sup>th</sup>. Confirmation is perhaps the first "adult" decision an individual makes. We drive at age 16, vote at 18, and are given full privileges at 21, but at around 14 in most churches, a young person is given an opportunity to confirm for themselves the promises made for them at their baptism. The next step is to discover how God is calling us to live out those promises in the life of the church. We are each given gifts of the Spirit with the expectation we share them with others to strengthen the Church. Take a look at the spiritual gifts listed in Romans 12:6-8 and I Corinthians 12:4-11&28 and think about which have been given to you and how you can use them at Augustus!

#### Why do we use ashes on Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday is the Wednesday of the seventh week before Easter and the first day of Lent. The day is named for the practice of imposing ashes, a practice that many Lutheran congregations have found to be a very meaningful part of the Ash Wednesday liturgy.

Using ashes as a sign of repentance is an ancient practice, often mentioned in the Bible (e.g., Jonah 3:5-9; Job 42:6; Jeremiah 6:26; Matthew 11:21). The early Christians adopted the use of ashes from Jewish practice as an external mark of penitence.



Ashes symbolize several aspects of our human existence:

- Ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19).
- Ashes suggest cleansing and renewal. They were used anciently in the absence of soap. Even on Ash Wednesday, this most penitential day, we receive ashes in the form of the cross, the same symbol placed on our bodies with water in our baptism. Even in this ashen mark of death, we anticipate the new life of
- Ashes remind us of the shortness of human life, for it is said as we are buried into the ground or as ashes are placed in a tomb:
  - "We commit this body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust"
- Ashes are a symbol of our need to repent, confess our sins, and return to God.

## **Money Matters**

#### Personal Financial Stewardship

A budget is a spending plan. You develop a budget to plan your monthly expenditures. The plan determines in advance how much of your income you are comfortable allocating to each spending area. Your income and spending allocations will be defined by your values and interests.

In developing your budget as a Christian, one of your first tasks will be to examine the priorities that God has directly revealed in his Word. Basically, there are four general budget categories that are clearly mandated: giving, saving, living expenses, and debt repayment.



Giving is part of the budget: God's Word

directs us to give him our first and best. In Proverbs 3:9 we read, "Honor the Lord with your wealth, with the firstfruits of all your crops." The Apostle Paul wrote, "On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with his income" (1 Corinthians 16:2). Giving demonstrates our gratitude for who God is and what he has done for us.

Saving is part of the budget: To prepare for emergencies and to have resources so you can achieve your financial goals, saving is essential. In Proverbs 21:20 God shares his wisdom regarding saving: "In the house of the wise are stores of choice food and oil, but a foolish man devours all he has."

Living expenses are part of the budget: If you have not previously developed a budget, you could be struggling to discover a reasonable allocation for your lifestyle that you can afford. An important first step is to distinguish between what you need versus what you want. Jesus said, "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions" (Luke 12:15). What you allocate for your living expenses should be established with the money that is left after giving and saving.

**Debt repayment is part of the budget:** In Scripture, God warns you to be cautious about debt. God's Word does not forbid you from borrowing money, but it does discourage it. "The rich rule over the poor, and the borrower is servant to the lender" (Proverbs 22:7). The Bible is clear as to your responsibility to repay money that you borrow.

In order to avoid dependence on others and to set a good example, you should develop a budget. If you include the four above parts within your budget, you will gain control of your money.

# Sharing God's Bounty

#### Have a Heart

ebruary: the month devoted to love. Stores are filled with heart-shaped boxes of candy and heart-shaped cards and vases of flowers with heart-shaped gift tags. All this is available for the consumer so that he can find the appropriate expression of his devotion to his loved one. If that expression of love has been preceded by a year of thoughtful and loving words and deeds, it is welcomed and cherished by the recipient. If not, it is just an empty ritual, done out of duty rather than true devotion.

Our relationship to the Lord is similar. God, too, desires our sincere devotion, not empty lip service. "The Lord says: 'These people come near to Me with their mouth and honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me'" (Isaiah 29:13).



Stewardship is serving, helping, giving, but love is the basis for stewardship. Without love, our good deeds are empty and without merit. The first act of true stewardship is to "love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength" (Deuteronomy 6:5). Jesus called this the most important commandment (Mark 12:29, 30). With that love for the Lord in us, we are enabled to be good stewards. Then we can do acts of good stewardship, acts of true devotion. We are enabled to . . .

- "Give generously to him and do so without a grudging heart" (Deuteronomy 15:10).
- "Carefully observe [his decrees and laws] with all your heart and with all your soul" (Deuteronomy 26:16).
- "Share with God's people who are in need. Practice hospitality" (Romans 12:13).
- "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men" (Colossians 3:23).

God, through Ezekiel, promised, "I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. And I will put my Spirit in you and move you to follow my decrees and be careful to keep my laws" (Ezekiel 36:26-27). This promise he has fulfilled in his Son, Jesus, who has followed his Father's decrees and kept his laws for us. As we strive to live fruitful lives of stewardship, at the same time, we rest in Christ who has been the perfect steward for us.



Tithing is an outgrowth of a sense of thankfulness. Since God's mercies are constant and unfailing, our response should be of the same nature in proportion to our ability. The "grace of gratitude" has high rating in the Christian standard of virtues. It is developed by saying "Thank you" to God. At the entrance to life abounding stands the cross of self-denial.



#### **Rest In Peace Pastor Michel**



Rev. Herbert H. Michel, D.D., Pastor Emeritus, Augustus Lutheran Church, died Friday, January 31, 2020, at Lehigh Valley Hospital – Cedar Crest.

Pastor Michel was born on October 19, 1948, in Munich, Germany, to the late Jakob and Anna (Gabel) Michel. He and his family emigrated to Burholme, Philadelphia in 1951.

Pastor Michel graduated from Murrell Dobbins High School, Philadelphia, Asbury University, and Asbury Theological Seminary, Wilmore, KY.

Pastor Michel was pastor of Augustus Lutheran Church from 1984 until he retired in 2008. He previously was pastor of Mount Carmel United Methodist Church, Olney, and St. Timothy Lutheran Church, Fox Chase. During his retirement, he moved to Breinigsville and served as interim pastor of Ziegels Lutheran Church, Jordon Lutheran Church, and Zion Union Church, Maxatawny, all in the Lehigh Valley.

Pastor Michel was a past pres. of the Trappe Historical Soc. and former auditor for Trappe Borough.

Pastor Michel is survived by his sister, Anna Marie, wife of the late Hans Steinhofer, Philadelphia; his nieces and nephew, Ruth (Steinhofer), wife of Kenneth Trainor, Christopher Michel, Annette (Michel), wife of Peter Hart, and Rebecca (Michel), wife of Jack Winebrenner; his great nieces and nephews, Andrew, husband of Sierra (maiden) Trainor, Monica (Trainor), wife of Mark Fahy, Jakob Michel, Makenna Michel, Mondo Hart, Lola Hart, Julia Winebrenner, Claudia Winebrenner, Alysa Winebrenner; and his great-great-nephew, Conor Fahy; He was preceded in death by his brother, Richard, husband of Ursula (Baumann) Michel, Harleysville.

#### God's Own for Eternity


There are only two sure things in life: death and taxes. We talk about taxes, but many of us avoid talking, or even thinking, about death. Yet, death is inevitable. We need to talk about death with our children. The most natural time to do this is when a death occurs.

Encourage your child to talk about it and to remember the times he or she spent with the one who died. Invite him or her to draw a picture or create a song that expresses his or her feelings. Older children might want to write a story or compose a prayer. Children have lots of questions about death. When you don't have an answer, admit it, but take time to explore the question with them. You might want to bring your unanswered question to your pastor. Assure your child that Jesus promises us eternal life when our earthly life has ended. Underline Bible verses such as John 3:16 that promise eternal life. In faith we can believe God's promise of eternal life. And trusting in God's promise of eternal life helps our faith to grow.


