

Thoughts from Ringwood Benefice-Times and places

I wonder whether there are particular places that are special to you? Places can have important emotional connections for us, and often a particular church can have a special connection for a family, perhaps it is a place where you were married, or where your family has worshipped and served.

I have recently been on a tour of the Holy Land, visiting different historical and religious sites in Jordan and Israel. While I enjoyed visiting these two countries, there were some places that held more connection for me, where I could imagine Jesus living and working. In some ways, I was struck by how these sites differed from my image of how they might be when Jesus would have been there. Clearly there has be quite a lot of change in 2000 years, so in many ways that seems obvious, but some sites had a different connection, and felt special either because they had been preserved or because their natural features were still the same. For example, it was easier to imagine Jesus being baptised in the Jordan River or walking along the edge of the Sea of Galilee teaching his disciples.

One of the churches we visited in Jerusalem was St Peter in Gallicantu. This church had been built on what was believed to be Caiaphas's house, where Jesus was questioned and imprisoned overnight, and where Peter three times denied knowing Jesus. The church was outside of the old town and had an amazing view of Jerusalem. Being in the place where Jesus suffered, where he was beaten and rejected, helped me connect with him and to others who are suffering.

During times when we are suffering, the question that is often asked is, 'Where is God in this suffering?' At the present time we see great suffering in Ukraine, as cities are bombed, families divided and people are killed, and we cry out for God for peace in Ukraine. You may yourself be suffering with illness or bereavement or through other circumstances. As we look at Jesus, we know that He understands our suffering, he journeys with us and is present in our suffering. We can cry out to him as he did to the Father. Archbishop Stephen Cottrell has said that when he is asked the questions where is God in our suffering, he points to the cross, saying that is where Jesus is, he carries our suffering.

Isaiah the prophet, speaks about Jesus in Isaiah 53. 'He was despised and rejected by mankind, a man of suffering, and familiar with pain.'

As Christians, we believe that God sent his son to reveal his love to us. Jesus is with us in our sadness, suffering and grief. He bore the weight of our pain and sin on the cross, so that we could know God's forgiveness and love. God is with us, as he has promised in our joys and in our sadness. If you feel alone in your suffering, look to Jesus at the cross, talk to him in prayer, he walks with you, you are never alone.



Ringwood and Bisterne welcome Ukrainians

The war in Ukraine seems to have dominated the world's headlines since the end of February – and so it should. The plight of those poor innocent people, minding their own business and getting on with their daily lives, just like the rest of us, only to be invaded and torn apart by a country intent on grabbing what they think should be theirs, is repugnant. Has nothing been learnt from the two world wars lived through by our parents, grandparents and great grandparents?

Ringwood is one of the most pro-active towns in the whole of Hampshire to take in Ukrainian families and there are about 30 families coming into the area. It has been encouraging and uplifting to be part of the group, led by the All Churches Group, Town Council, schools and food bank who are offering their time and resources to help these poor refugees. Bisterne is hoping to play its part in receiving a family, so feel much heartened to be part of this warm spirited team, along with the other host families, who are all supporting each other. I'm sure when they arrive, we too will need that support from Bisterne and Ringwood friends, as we get to know them and vice versa, and they get used to their new life far from home, in a foreign country. Lady Mills, Hallam's grandmother, hosted evacuee children from bombed Southampton during the last war so the story continues in another form.

On that note, if anyone has any toys/games/bicycles etc. appropriate for a 7-8 year old girl, that they no longer need and wouldn't mind giving us, we would be most grateful. We have been given a lot of clothing but can always take more, of the quality and condition you would dress your own children in please, to make her feel good and less of a refugee. Just send me a message and I will pick up whatever you can kindly offer.

We hope that by early June Yevheniia and Diana will have recovered enough to come and join in the Jubilee Street Party at Kingston on the 5th June to which we're hoping as many of you as possible will come. Please sign up if you are intending to come so we can provide enough chairs for everyone. It is a great opportunity for everyone, particularly tenants on the Bisterne Estate, to meet and get to know each other. We all lead such separate lives owing to our rural surroundings, so gatherings such as this are a vital way to make everyone feel part of the community. The Barn Dance following the lunch should be great fun too. We really look forward to seeing you there.

Yevheniia and Diana come from Kharkiv, and have had a bad time. Their home has been destroyed and parents and other family members have been left behind. They don't speak English but we are hoping Diana (7) will be able to go to school and in time Yevheniia might be able to get a job in a hospital. She is a trained dermatologist.
