## *The President's Message*

*October 20 2010*

Compatriot Bob Bowen recently wrote an article on the SAR-OFFICER web site concerning the CAAH Society and the Chapter Challenge Program. I am taking the liberty of quoting his article and will give my reasoning at the end of the article.

“Gentlemen:

Congratulations to the 18 State Societies that have contributed \$1,000 or more to the Center for Advancing America's Heritage. Kudos also to the 67 Chapters that have contributed \$500 or more to the CAAH. Each of these Societies and Chapters has earned a streamer for their flag and a certificate of recognition. (This is what Compatriot Hoffman was talking about at our October luncheon). Now, if we could get the remaining 31 State Societies and 454 Chapters to climb onboard, we would add \$258,000 to the CAAH Capital Campaign. And that more than a quarter of a million dollars would go a long way to bringing us closer to realizing our dream of a new library, headquarters, museum and education center.

Phase One of the project was completed and dedicated on September 25 (2010). All of the library books have been moved from their old location at National Headquarters on 4<sup>th</sup> Street to our new location on Main Street and all of our membership records, genealogy staff, registrar staff and merchandising are being moved this week (with estimated completion by 25 October 2010).

Phase Two will complete the project but it awaits the generosity of you and our corporate donors. If you would like to help your Chapter or State Society meet this challenge,” (then now is the time to get started). This is where I entered the picture and asked all Saramana Members to match my \$25 so that we could send it to the CAAH. You will note that nothing was said of a special form or procedure to do this. All they were concerned with is having us help them complete the CAAH. I personally ‘thank’ everyone who wrote checks because there was \$150 collected. My goal for the Chapter was to try and get 51% of the membership to contribute and we could have raised \$1,650. I was *taken* out of this loop and we lost \$100 that was pledged by a guest. But, nevertheless, I encourage each and every member to consider sending in \$25 designated specifically for the CAAH. Try to visualize that it is “Our CAAH” designed for the future use of our younger generation, your children and grandchildren. They don't care how they get the donations; they just want us to participate. Formalities are nice when we have nothing else to do and all kinds of time to do it in. So, let us do something good for the CAAH. I know we, the Saramana compatriots can make a difference.

We **need** nominations again for Secretary. This Officer position is a very important post that provides the SAR the much needed operational support. The SAR Secretary's support and guidance CD is provided to make the work easy to follow...Charles Riegle will provide all the support necessary.

And now for a more solemn note; we have lost two valued and dedicated Compatriots in Lester K. Hunt and James B. Huff. In addition, the wife of Compatriot Bob Grant has also departed this earth. Please remember them in your prayers. Thank you for your support and may

# *The Secretary's Report*

October 18 2010

## Board of Governors' Meeting

The meeting was called to order with a quorum present, at 2:10 p.m. by Chapter President Harold Crapo, Jr. at the Church of the Redeemer in Sarasota. In attendance were: Compatriots Crapo, Riegle, Mahaffey, Peck, McMurry, Miller, Lowe, Bradley, Mange, Hornback, and Huff. Chaplain Bradley led us in prayer and Peck led the Pledge of Allegiance. President Crapo provided an agenda of items, which gave the dates for the next chapter luncheon meeting on Saturday November 13<sup>th</sup> and BOG the 17<sup>th</sup>.

Reports were given (and typed copies attached to these Minutes) from the Vice President and Secretary, Historian, Treasurer and President. Discussions were held on the status of the new Library building space, the CAAH, and possible meeting day changes for the 2011 meetings, if the attendance at the rescheduled November and December luncheons proves effective in attracting the new or younger members to the meetings. The Nominating Committee report was discussed and approved by a voice vote. The Budget Committee was nominated and approved. It will be Harold Crapo, Charles Riegle, John Mange, Victor McMurry and Ted Hornbeck. A meeting will be scheduled by Mr. Riegle. The President asked for nominations or suggestions for the open positions on the upcoming BOG, namely Capt. of the Color Guard and Secretary. *The chapter By-Laws call for the men holding these positions to remain in the job until a suitable candidate can be found to replace him.*

The OTF report was given by McMurry and a motion to accept was made by Mahaffey and Mange with unanimous approval. Lowe reported that he is trying to recognize some 33 individuals who have helped him over the past year get publicity for the chapter and as he and his wife will be marching in the Palmetto Veterans Day Parade, someone else will have to be responsible for the photographs of the chapter members parading in the Sarasota parade. Also, we have received an invitation to march in the Manatee Co. Veterans Day Parade, which Bradley will respond to, saying that we are too few to split our ranks on such an important day.

*The BOG voted unanimously to ask the Secretary to advance the nomination of President Harold Crapo for Veteran of the Year Award, given by the Sarasota Veterans Council. He will do this before the deadline, October 15<sup>th</sup> by contacting Mr. Nick Catsakis.*

Crapo noted that in his state society role, he has helped redraft the rules for judging the Marlin award for publicity reports, so that there are not such great disparities as have occurred in previous years. He also mentioned that a Veterans discount is available to some 187 state parks now.

We approved sending our annual donation to the Veterans Council of \$50 and paying Huff some \$495, which he paid for our Medals & Awards for the upcoming year, to stabilize our inventory. Riegle had picked up these items in Louisville and provided a receipt for the Treasurers files.

Riegle gave Huff two copies of the new NSSAR Memory of Respect certificates for his inventory. The BOG immediately voted unanimously to prepare one for the widow of our compatriot, Lester B. Hunt, who died recently. It was agreed that such a certificate would be framed. President Crapo can decide the date of presentation with the widow.

Reports were given on the recent Service Academy Information Fair for junior and senior high school students, the Secretary's endorsement of compatriot Lindsey Brock for Registrar General, the new Eagle Scout pamphlets and the 40 sets of Eagle Scout Merit Badges required for the Eagle Scout Award at National.

The 2011 Poster Contest for 5<sup>th</sup> grade students has begun with a notification to the Sarasota and Manatee School systems. Meetings will follow in a few weeks to ensure compliance. Wreaths Across America donation forms and CAAH donation request forms and Manatee County History Fair requests for judges at the upcoming fairs were passed out and discussed. The president reviewed the NSSAR request that we consider purchasing D&O insurance, but as there is no directive from NSSAR Chancellor regarding this issue, it was tabled.

A motion to dismiss was made and passed unanimously at 3:30PM and Chaplain Bradley gave the benediction.

President Crapo gave McMurry a check for \$150 for CAAH, which had been collected at our recent luncheon from some of our members. It was decided that all future donations from members of our chapter will be handled directly by McMurry, utilizing the form proscribed by the NSSAR Foundation in order to keep the line of communications as straight as possible. ## Wounded Warrior Medals



The Badge of Military Merit designed and awarded by General George Washington became the Purple Heart Medal of the U.S. Military. Three Saramana Compatriots will be presented the Wounded Warrior Medal on Saturday, November 13 at our Luncheon. These three members shed their blood in battle defending freedom for America and other people around the world. They received the Purple Heart Medal. The Wounded Warrior Medal is a limited Award presented to the Saramana SAR Board of Governors and approved for presentation to SAR Compatriots or spouse and DAR members or spouse. The balance of the remaining 25 Medals approved after committee verification of qualifications to receive the award will be awarded to Veterans nominated by the Military Order of the Purple Heart in future months.

*The final Farewell*

As with the military itself, our armed forces' final farewell to comrades is steeped in tradition and ceremony. Prominent in a military funeral is the flag-draped casket. The blue field of the flag is placed at the head of the casket, over the left shoulder of the deceased. The custom began in the Napoleonic Wars of the late 18th and early 19th centuries, when a flag was used to cover the dead as they were taken from the battlefield on a caisson. One will notice, during a military funeral that the horses that pull the caisson which bears the body of the veteran are all saddled, but the horses on the left have riders, while the horses on the right do not.

This custom evolved from the days when horse-drawn caissons were the primary means of moving artillery ammunition and cannon, and the riderless horses carried provisions. The single riderless horse that follows the caisson with boots reversed in the stirrups is called the "caparisoned horse" in reference to its ornamental coverings, which have a detailed protocol all to themselves. By tradition in military funeral honors, a caparisoned horse follows the casket of an Army or Marine Corps officer who was a colonel or above, or the casket of a president, by virtue of having been the nation's military commander in chief. The custom is believed to date back to the time of Genghis Khan, when a horse was sacrificed to serve the fallen warrior in the next world. The caparisoned horse later came to symbolize a warrior who would ride no more. Abraham Lincoln, who was killed in 1865, was the first U.S. president to be honored with a caparisoned horse at his funeral.

Graveside military honors include the firing of three volleys each by seven service members. This commonly is confused with an entirely separate honor, the 21 gun salute. But the number of individual gun firings in both honors evolved the same way.

The three volleys came from an old battlefield custom. The two warring sides would cease hostilities to clear their dead from the battlefield, and the firing of three volleys meant that the dead had been properly cared for and the side was ready to resume the battle.

The 21-gun salute traces its roots to the Anglo-Saxon empire, when seven guns constituted a recognized naval salute, as most naval vessels had seven guns. Because gunpowder in those days could be more easily stored on land than at sea, guns on land could fire three rounds for every one that could be fired by a ship at sea.

Later, as gunpowder and storage methods improved, salutes at sea also began using 21 guns. The United States at first used one round for each state, attaining the 21-gun salute by 1818.

The nation reduced its salute to 21 guns in 1841, and formally adopted the 21-gun salute at the suggestion of the British in 1875.

A U.S. presidential death also involves other ceremonial gun salutes and military traditions. On the day after the death of the president, a former president or president-elect -- unless this day falls on a Sunday or holiday, in which case the honor will be rendered the following day -- the commanders of Army installations with the necessary personnel and material traditionally order that one gun be fired every half hour, beginning at reveille and ending at retreat.

On the day of burial, a 21-minute gun salute traditionally is fired starting at noon at all military installations with the necessary personnel and material. Guns will be fired at one-minute intervals. Also on the day of burial, those installations will fire a 50-gun salute -- one round for each state -- at five-second intervals immediately following lowering of the flag.

The playing of "Ruffles and Flourishes" announces the arrival of a flag officer or other dignitary of honor. Drums play the ruffles, and bugles play the flourishes -- one flourish for each star of the flag officer's rank or as appropriate for the honoree's position or title. Four flourishes is the highest honor.

When played for a president, Ruffles and Flourishes is followed by "Hail to the Chief" which is believed to have been written in England in 1810 or 1811 by James Sanderson for a play by Sir Walter Scott called "The Lady of the Lake". The play began to be performed in the United States in 1812, the song became popular, and it became a favorite of bands at festive events. It evolved to be used as a greeting for important visitors, and eventually for the president, though no record exists of when it was first put to that use.

### *This Month in American History* **A Brief History of Veterans Day**



**Veterans Day**, formerly known as **Armistice Day**, was originally set as a U.S. legal holiday to honor the end of World War I, which officially took place on November 11, 1918.

In legislation that was passed in 1938, November 11 was "dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be hereafter celebrated and known as 'Armistice Day.'" As such, this new legal holiday honored World War I veterans.

In 1954, after having been through World War II and the Korean War, the 83rd U.S. Congress -- at the urging of the veterans service organizations -- amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation on June 1, 1954, Nov. 11 became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

In 1968, the **Uniform Holiday Bill** ensured three-day weekends for federal employees by celebrating four national holidays on Mondays: Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Veterans Day, and Columbus Day. Under this bill, Veterans Day was moved to the last Monday of October.

Many states did not agree with this decision and continued to celebrate the holiday on its original date. The first Veterans Day under the new law was observed with much confusion on Oct. 25, 1971.

Finally on September 20, 1975, President Gerald R. Ford signed a law which returned the annual observance of Veterans Day to its original date of Nov. 11, beginning in 1978. Since then, the Veterans Day holiday has been observed on November 11.



**The difference between Veteran's Day and Memorial Day.** Memorial Day originally called Decoration Day honors service members who died in service to their country or as a result of injuries incurred during battle.

Memorial Day was officially proclaimed on 5 May 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in his General Order No. 11, and was first observed on 30 May 1868, when flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery.

The first state to officially recognize the holiday was New York in 1873. Memorial Day is about reconciliation; it is about coming together to honor those who gave their all for us. Deceased veterans are also remembered on Veterans Day but the day is set aside to thank and honor living veterans who served honorably in the military - in wartime or peacetime.

**Celebrating the Veterans Day Holiday** United States Senate Resolution 143, which was passed on Aug. 4, 2001, designated the week of November 11 through November 17, 2001, as "National Veterans Awareness Week". The resolution calls for educational efforts directed at elementary and secondary school students and secondary school students concerning the contributions and sacrifices of Veterans.
