R. Milton Owen passed away on March 1, 2024, leaving behind his beloved wife Margaret of 60 years. He was a family man, a musician, an accountant and an integral part of the Richmond Council Navy League. Milton was “one of a kind” and will be remembered for his dry wit, his **very** impressive retention of details, (no one needs to look it up, just ask Milton), and his tireless service to the council.

Milton served in the Naval Reserve and had a long successful career, working in the Accounting Department at Reynolds Metals Company Bellwood Printing Plant and ending his career in the Corporate Accounting Department. In his spare time he enjoyed being a member of the Thomas Jefferson High School Alumni Band, playing the trumpet in concerts on a regular basis in and around Richmond.

Milton joined the Richmond Council in 1992 and began his 25+ years of service to the Navy League. Soon after joining, it became clear that Milton was going to be a great asset to the Council. He soon came to be known as the “Go to Man” for anything computer related. Whether it was setting up a new computer, setting up wi-fi, installing software, troubleshooting computer glitches, or solving any land-line problems, Milton knew it all. He also served as our de facto office manager. Milton kept an inventory of our office supplies (always keeping our supplies stocked), reviewed and distributed mail, managed the credit card and negotiated the rental agreement for the Navy League office.

Milton wore many hats and was responsible for many projects. He served as a production assistant on the “Lucky Bag” staff; enhancing photos as needed, mailing of the “non-digital” newsletters and proofreading. Milton often quoted his grammatical teachings from his early school days. He was our “eagle eye” in proofreading. Over the years, he also served as Vice President, Sr. Vice President and Treasurer.

Milton took special pride in heading up the Council's annual Pearl Harbor Commemoration Ceremony at the Virginia War Memorial. He devoted time to keeping track of Pearl Harbor Survivors and worked on the many details for the ceremonies at the War Memorial. Not only did he coordinate with the War Memorial, he also ordered the Memorial Wreath and frequently was one of the members who carried and placed the wreath at the ceremony.

Milton personified the ideal Navy League member, director and officer. He could be counted on to hold up his hand when a volunteer was needed and to do any task with professionalism and vigor. The Richmond Council will forever be grateful for Milton's service.

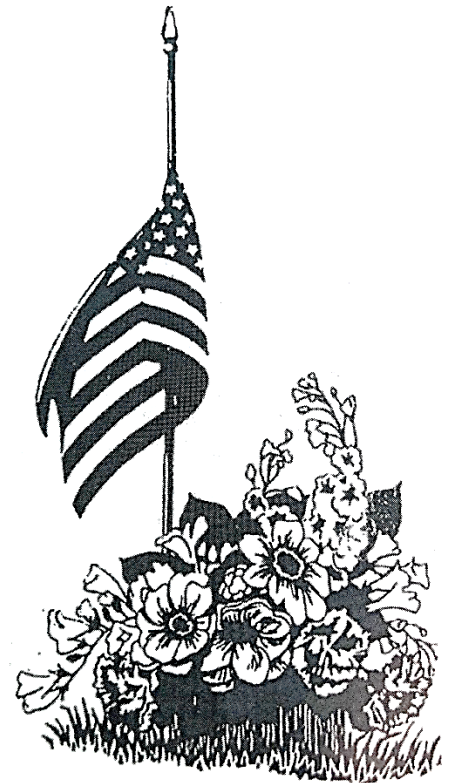

COL MORTON C. MUMMA, III UNITED STATES AIR FORCE 1926 - 2024



Colonel Morton C. Mumma, USAF, (Ret.) died peacefully on 22 February 2024 at his home in Chester, Virginia, with Babs, his wife of 74 years, by his side. Born 24 August 1926 to Morton Claire Mumma Jr, Rear Admiral, USN (Ret.) and Virginia Page Elder in Berryville, Virginia, young Mort traveled the world to many of his father's duty stations. An exceptionally intelligent young man, Mort graduated from high school at the age of 15 and matriculated into the Class of 1946 at the Virginia Military Institute in Lexington, Virginia. After two years, he matriculated into the Class of 1948 at the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York. During the summer of 1949, he was stationed at Randolph Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas for pilot training. On 28 June, he met the love of his life, a fellow Virginian by the name of Barbara Anne Joseph. That day by the Officers' Club Pool at Fort Sam Houston was the beginning of a lifetime of memories. They were married exactly six months later at the Fort Myer Chapel in Arlington, Virginia on 28 December 1949. While at West Point, Mort discovered the fledgling U. S. Air Force, decided he wanted to fly, and embarked on a remarkable aviation career flying numerous fighter aircraft. One of the many highlights of his flying career included serving as a Squadron Commander in 1968, flying the F-4 Phantom out of Cam Rahn Bay, Vietnam, when he also earned the Distinguished Flying Cross. After graduating with the National War College, Class of 1970, Mort and Babs moved back to Europe where

another career highlight was serving as the Group Commander at Aviano Air Base, Italy. Returning stateside in 1975, Mort's final tour was spent at the Army War College at Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania as the Senior Air Force Representative. A life-long marksman, Mort had also been the Team Captain of the United States Air Force High Power Rifle Team and became the first Distinguished Shooter - Rifle Badge #001 in the Air Force in 1957. He and Babs spent 18 of his 30 years in the Air Force stationed overseas. They moved a total of 36 times into 33 different homes and had six children: Anne, Barbara, Morton IV, Andrew, Robert, and James. They have ten grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. After retiring in 1978, Mort and Babs returned to the Washington, D.C. area where Mort eventually went on to serve as the Executive Staff Director of the National Rifle Association. Permanently retiring in 1986, Mort and Babs then turned to their hobbies of real estate and traveling, while enjoying their favorite mode of travel: river and ocean cruises. HISTORY OF THE NAVY RESERVE

The history of the Navy Reserve is a proud legacy forged by dedicated men and women who, when duty called, were willing to leave their homes, put civilian careers on hold, and serve in defense of our Nation.

At the beginning of World War I, a young Assistant Secretary of the Navy, Franklin D. Roosevelt, anticipated the need for a federal maritime reserve force and began to urge Congress to enact legislation to accomplish this goal. On March 3, 1915, the United States Naval Reserve was officially established, and by the war's end, over 250,000 Reserve Sailors were serving. During World War II, 84% of the 3.4 million Sailors serving on active duty came from the Navy Reserve — including five future U.S. Presidents.

From Korea to Vietnam, the Gulf War to Iraq and Afghanistan, and humanitarian missions like Katrina and Haiti, Reserve Sailors have continued to answer our nation's call, providing strategic depth and critical expertise to the Navy, Marine Corps and Joint Force.

For the past 105-year history, Navy Reserve Citizen Sailors have set aside civilian lives to proudly serve in defense of the country. They've manned the rails in service to their nation — creating and maintaining a proud heritage and history built on the Navy core values of Honor, Courage and Commitment.

The Navy Reserve is a force of highly experienced Sailors who come from all walks of life. They include teachers, engineers, business owners, medical professionals, construction workers, pilots and police officers. Their specialized knowledge and skills complement and enhance the ability of the Navy to successfully execute its mission, making the Navy Reserve a key element of America's maritime defense strategy.

As the Navy Reserve continues to sail into its second century of service, its mission to support the Navy remains vital. Whether mobilizing for overseas contingency operations, providing humanitarian assistance and disaster relief, or supporting the fleet's forward presence requirements, Reserve Sailors are trained and ready — anytime and anywhere our country needs them. ✍

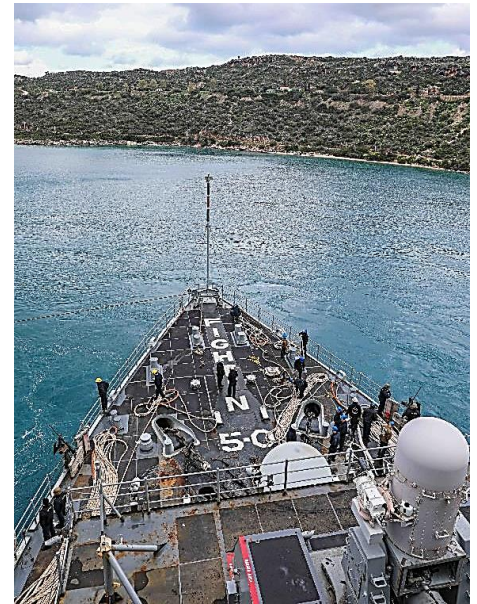

We've recently completed a Joint Inter-agency Task Force – South patrol working in both the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans. Our mission focused on intercepting and deterring drug smuggling activities, a testament to our commitment to safeguarding our waters from illicit trade. Presently, **NORTHLAND** is high and dry in a period of drydock maintenance, a critical phase where we meticulously inspect and repair various vessel components. Our efforts have spanned from conducting side scan sonar inspections, to measure hull thickness, to repainting the hull and anchor chains, as well as undertaking, thorough maintenance, within our bilges and other crucial sections. The crew is dedicated to ensuring that **NORTHLAND** receives the needed maintenance and repairs to continue serving our Nation well into the future.

When not engaged in duties on **NORTHLAND**, our team embodies the spirit of community engagement. Whether it's contributing to the upkeep of local parks, assisting in projects at a children's museum, or serving meals at local shelters, our crew has collectively devoted over 135 hours to volunteer work, reinforcing our bond with the community.

As the annual transfer season ushers in a time of transition, we have already bid farewell to Lieutenant Junior Grade Kent Donaldson, who will commence a new chapter at USCG Patrol Forces Southwest Asia in Manama, Bahrain where he'll serve as executive officer in USCGC Emlen Tunnel. Numerous crew members are also engaging in temporary duty assignments to facilitate this transition and foster professional growth.

who play a vital role in ensuring we stay safe and situated whenever **LEGARE** needs to tuck away and anchor from extreme weather. The team wears various-colored hardhats for easy identification: blue and green hats for line handlers, gray and orange hats for engineers responsible for operating the windlass and fire hoses, and yellow and white hats for the petty officer in charge and the safety observer during operations. Throughout this patrol, **LEGARE** has anchored five times, and we extend our sincere gratitude to our anchoring detail for ensuring our safety and security at every anchorage.

As **LEGARE** nears the conclusion of this D1 deployment, we have conducted a total of 35 boardings, resulting in six violations issued to mariners found non-compliant with federal law and regulations. We are eager to continue our law enforcement efforts and maintain a strong Coast Guard presence in federal waters up north, serving as stewards of the \$13 billion dollar fishing industry here in New England.

In a short span of time, **LEGARE** has bid a fond farewell to Seaman Megan Royer as she sets sail for Intelligence Specialist A-School. **LEGARE** extends its heartfelt wishes to Seaman Royer for a prosperous career in the Coast Guard and her pursuit of attending Of-

ficer Candidate School. During her brief tenure as the lead seaman in the Deck Department, Seaman Royer made valuable contributions by overseeing hull and deck maintenance projects and orchestrating small boat movements as a skilled boat deck captain. **LEGARE** also welcomed three new members from Training Centers Yorktown and Cape May. BM3 Ryan Smith, an alumnus of Boatswain Mate A-School, joins **LEGARE's** esteemed Navigation Division, and SN Cecilia Cube and SN Kiara Madison, recent graduates of Boot Camp, bring their dedication to **LEGARE's** renowned Deck Department.

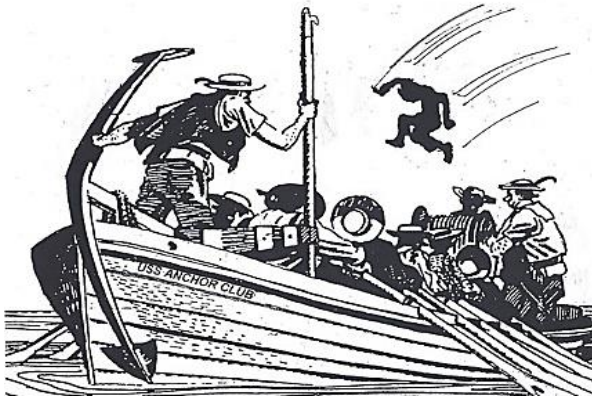
