FAITH GIVES US HOPE

Saint Paul taught us that of the three things that last, love is the greatest. However, faith and hope are the two virtues that allow us to see goodness in the midst of misery. A century before Christ was born, when the book of Wisdom was written, Jews were oppressed by Greek, then Roman forces. Yet the author dared to write that God "fashioned all things that they might have being" and "justice is undying" (Wisdom 1:14-15). Hope and faith sustained the author while the world they lived in became unjust and toxic. The Jewish people had overcome oppression before from slavery in Egypt and captivity in Babylon, so Wisdom's readers were encouraged to keep faith in God, who formed them to be imperishable, and sustain hope in a future transformed from their present condition.

In appealing to the Corinthians for assistance, Paul gives the Corinthians a reason and a recipe for a just and egalitarian community. Paul had been asked to take up a collection for the poor in Jerusalem. He felt it was especially appropriate that Gentile Christians give from their excess to Jewish Christians who were in need. Pointing out that Jesus sacrificed His life so that we can have eternal life, surely the Corinthians can sacrifice their surplus wealth so that others can have enough. As Christians, we are responsible for one another, for seeing that all people have enough to live on and can share in God's blessings.

Today's Gospel passage paints two pictures of tremendous hope and faith. The woman had suffered from hemorrhages for twelve years, was treated by numerous doctors, had spent

all the money she had, and was now worse then ever. Incredibly she still retained the hope that she could be cured. Her faith in this man she had heard about was so strong that she believed she just needed to touch His cloak to be healed. Jairus was told that his daughter died while he had followed



the crowd to see Jesus. In fact, he heard the people at his home weeping and wailing. Still, he held out hope, believing in this man with the reputation for healing. Their faith gave them hope and their hope drove their faith.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

How does my faith in the Lord give me hope when I might otherwise feel hopeless?

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS **Touching the Cloak of Christ**

Look to today's Gospel and you'll find one of the most arresting images in all of Scripture. Christ in a crowd, everyone clamoring for his attention, pressing against Him. Several feet away, is a chronically ill woman, weak and desperate for help. She knows she doesn't have a chance of getting his attention. She has no connections. She has no strength. All she can do is lift up her hand. So that's what she does. She reaches out.

There comes a time, or maybe several times, in each of our lives when we become this woman. We're tired and we're sick. Is it with sin? With fear? With anger? It doesn't matter. Whatever it is, it's made us weak, and we feel like we've run out of options. We've looked for help and come up empty. We've consulted friends and gotten nowhere. We're lost in the crowd of life, unable to stick our heads above the pressing throng to wave for help.

And there is Christ, always passing by us. The hem of His cloak is never far from our grasp. We have no hope of a big miracle like the synagogue leader. We don't even bother asking for that. But that cloak ... we can touch that cloak. That's something we can do.

Do we do it, though? Do we have the confidence of that sick, beaten-down woman who knew so totally that healing was there for the taking? Or do we retreat back into the crowd, stumbling back home with our pain and our sinfulness? Reach out, friends. However, whatever, whenever - reach out. Christ will not fail you.

O Mary, you shine continuously on our journey as a sign of salvation and hope. We entrust ourselves to you, Health of the Sick.


At the foot of the Cross you participated in Jesus' pain,
