HYDE PARK 1

Interior renovation of kitchen, rear entry, dining and living room in a traditional brick 1890's home in a landmark district. Landmark approval was required because of new window installation.



HYDE PARK 2

Reworking of kitchen and associated areas in this early twentieth-century home. Original craftsman-style details inspired the cabinetry, built-in furniture and tile work.



HYDE PARK 3

In this house dating from the late 1800's a group of small rooms were united into a master suite including study, bedroom, bath and laundry room. Glass tile, handmade glass lav's and curved glass interior windows reflect the Owner's art glass collection.



SULLIVAN LAKE

A small existing lake cottage (left) was expanded on all sides to provide greater connection with the outdoors, more gracious flow of space, and more space for friends, children and grandchildren.



OAK PARK

A new 2-story addition and deck retained the essential craftsman character of this single family home. Special care was taken to ensure the continued health of a majestic oak tree shading the back yard.



EVANSTON

The addition to this 1920's wood-clad bungalow reflects the simplicity of the original while changing it enough to bring in more light and air. The kitchen is opened up and a new home office and expansive deck were included.



HYDE PARK 4

A second floor was the best way to expand this 1950's U-shaped house in a landmark district and leave the rear courtyard and original Keck and Keck design intact. The front elevation recedes from view and the courtyard façade continues the original passive solar elements.
