Grace & Peace from the Pastor's Desk

Happy New Year!

At the beginning of the year some of us make new year's resolutions. If we remember we've made them, we usually are finished with them by mid-February. I have a friend who told me her daughter's practice is to choose a word, one single word, to concentrate on for the entire year. I believe she said her daughter's word for 2022 was "thorough".

I thought that was such an awesome idea, especially for persons who practice meditation or centering prayer, to choose one word on which to concentrate every time the practice is performed. It may even encourage someone who needs the centering prayer or meditation in order to stay mindful or relaxed to begin a practice. The problem is, what word should be chosen?

My suggestion would be to breathe deeply and go to prayer asking God to open you to the word you need to hear for a year. The word may come immediately, or it may take an hour or a day after you ask God to reveal it; but you will know the word if you ask God to make it clear to you and allow yourself to accept the word you are given. Then thank God for giving you a focus for the year.

When I went to prayer the word God immediately gave me is "diligent". I asked God if this was truly the word, or if this was just my own subconscious brain speaking. I received no other word, so I asked God to define what I need to be diligent about. Several life circumstances came to mind. And after thinking about it a little I remembered the story of the 10 bridesmaids waiting and only 5 of them were prepared; 5 of them weren't diligent in their preparations. I can't say that this will be your experience, but it is worth a try.

After you receive your word, you may worry that meditation is not a Christian practice, or that you will not have time to practice it. When our focus is on God and what God would have us do in this world, meditation is a Christian practice; it's when we focus on only ourselves or on another "deity" that the practice becomes unchristian. If you have never practiced Centering Prayer and are wondering what it is, it is a time when you open yourself up to God's message to you. Ask me about it and I'll give you more information on it, if there is enough interest, I will lead Centering Prayer times. It takes 20 minutes of your day to practice.

As you begin your new year, I wish you the best, knowing that God does not desert us no matter how trying our lives become. Turn to Proverbs 3:5-6 and trust in faith.



West Milicreek Food Pantry Annual Report

The West Millcreek Food Pantry was blessed to provide services for over 110 families. Our 25 volunteers serve an average of 110 families: 68 children under the age of 17, 111 adults, and 82 seniors each give out (approximately 524 duplicated individuals per month). Our area is the 16506 and 16505 zip codes (Pittsburg Ave. to Millfair Rd., W. 38th to the Lake with a cut out around the Waldameer area). We give out every 2nd and 4th Tuesday of the month. To qualify for our programs, clients must earn less than \$2095 for single adults, \$2800 for couples, \$3500 for a family of 3 and so on. We give out nonperishable foods and meat we purchase from the Food Bank. We get free bread, dairy and sweets from the Food Bank. We purchase milk and receive a produce box with approximately 15 pounds of fresh fruit and vegetables on the produce trailer. We distributed 115 turkeys for Thanksgiving and will collect and distribute 115 hams for Easter. We participate in the Senior Box federal program for needy senior citizens to receive an extra 30 pounds of food and 2 pounds of cheese once a month. So far this year we ordered and distributed over 65,000 pounds of food plus an additional 10,000 pounds of organization donated food. Our average monthly food bill is between \$0.00 and \$1200 depending on the grant money available plus the rental of the Penske truck.

The West Millcreek Food Pantry is an important mission for our 8 contributing churches. (Our Lady of Peace, Westminster Presbyterian, Wayside Presbyterian, Church of the Cross, St. Julia's, Lakewood Methodist, Asbury Methodist and the Universal Unitarians). We thank each congregation for their unique donations to our Pantry. We get assistance from McDowell HS, Our Lady of Peace School, Local Service organizations (VFW, American Legion, the Auxiliaries, the Moose Lodge and the Sportsman Club), First Student, Ryan Bizzaro's office and individual donations. Through the generosity of these people and organizations, both financial and food items, we are able to provide food for our clients. We set aside sugar free and gluten free items as they come in for our clients with special needs. We provide emergency assistance when requested.

Through donations from our churches and the Sunshine Girls we provided gifts and gloves, hats and scarves for our clients during the month of December.



What is Environmental Justice?

Environmental Justice is a concept that was coined in the early 1960s during the Civil Rights movement and has increasingly picked up momentum as our social justice movements and environmental issues have grown. The issues of racism and socioeconomic justice are central to the issue of **Environmental Justice**. At its core, **Environmental Justice** guarantees that *all people* have equal access to a healthy, safe, and sustainable environment, as well as equal protection from environmental harm. **Environmental Justice** requires that we incorporate racial and socioeconomic justice into the way we fight for the protection of our planet. Exploring the ways that global warming harms low-income communities, primarily black, brown, Indigenous, and migrant communities are critical to understanding how the fight must be won.

Example of **environmental injustice** include how in the Navajo Nation, children who are raised in uranium mining areas are developing cancer at 15 times faster than the national average; In Memphis, Tennessee, there are higher rates of cancer, chronic respiratory illness, and neurological disorders in non-whites; and in Lake Charles, Louisiana, people of color are experiencing eye irritation, nosebleeds, nausea, and cramps due to contaminated water and fumes blown in by wind from chemical plants. Many of these toxic facilities are placed in minority communities. This is a world-wide issue. What can you do to fight **environmental injustice**? Practice Self-Education, Elevate the Voices of Impacted Communities, Hold Your Representatives Accountable, and Use the Power of Boycott. Eliminate Food Waste

Food waste in the US occurs mostly in stores and at home—either because it spoils on the store shelf or before we can eat it. According to an NRDC study, Americans throw away up to 40 percent of the food they buy. We can combat food waste by shopping for only what we need, eating leftovers, composting scraps, and donating excess to food banks. Project Drawdown estimates that curbing food waste could avoid 70.5 gigatons of CO2—that's a bigger impact than restoring 435 million acres of tropical forest.

Eat Plant-Based

Transitioning to a vegetarian diet can cut your carbon footprint in half, and going vegan, even lower. Even shifting from high to low meat consumption can shrink your footprint by a third, according to a University of Oxford study. So, if switching completely seems unreasonable, just increasing plant-based eating to more days per week, more meals per day, or even a greater proportion of each meal is a great option.

Every day, 80 percent of the global population engages with social media. These platforms are designed to keep people logged on and interactive as long as possible—their business models hinge upon user engagement. Unfortunately, research has shown time and again that salacious comments and conspiratorial content are powerful tools for online engagement. As a result, global cultural discourse has become more polarized and hateful. The church has an important role in offering alternatives to this dangerous online climate.

Workshop Presenter

Lauren Krapf serves as the Anti-Defamation League's Counsel for Technology Policy & Advocacy, leading strategy and operations for ADL's policy initiatives to fight online hate, hold Big Tech accountable, and protect targets of digital harassment. Prior to joining ADL, Lauren worked as an attorney in Los Angeles, where she managed trial and appellate litigation and advised employers about issues and policies related to workplace harassment prevention. Lauren was an Ernie Pyle Scholar at Indiana University and Chief Note & Comment Editor of the International Law Review at Loyola Law School. She recently received a Master's degree at the University of Pennsylvania's School of Social Policy and Practice. In 2020, Lauren was selected as one of New York Jewish Week's 36 Under 36. In 2021, her work at ADL won Honorable Mention in Fast Company magazine's "World Changing Ideas" Awards.
