

Dear Catholic Daughters;

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength" (Mk 12:30) and to "love one another" (Jn 15:12). Our Blessed Lord is always desiring a more profound and personal relationship with each of us. We are created in God's image and likeness and the realization of this truth requires on our part an openness to the workings of the Holy Spirit in our lives. St. Augustine wrote: "You made us for yourself, Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you." With another Lent near at hand; the practices of the Lenten season help us to eliminate the obstacles in our

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hearts that keep the Lord from fully reigning as the beloved bridegroom. Pope Francis wrote in last year's message for Lent; "By devoting more time to prayer, we enable our hearts to root out our secret lies and forms of self-deception, and then to find the consolation God offers. He is our Father and he wants us to live life well." The more we allow Christ to reign in our hearts the more loving we become. "Love is patient; love is

kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or re-



sentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things" (1 Cor 13:4-8).

It is an everyday struggle, due to our fallen nature, to love others as the Lord desires us to do, "everyone will

know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (Jn 13:34-35. The sincere practices of Lent facilitate the dying to self, so that all our actions will be Christlike. "It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me" (Gal 2:20a). The Church encourages us to participate in the traditional practice of Lent, which include prayer, fasting and almsgiving. The Stations of the Cross is always a good pious exercise for Lent or any time of the year. The Holy Father, Pope Francis, writes; "Lent is a time of renewal for the whole Church, for each community and every believer. Above all it is a 'time of grace' (2 Cor 6:2). God does not ask of us anything that he himself has not first given us. 'We love because he first has loved us' (1 Jn 4:19).

My Dear Sisters,

As spring approaches and the ground begins to thaw, we are reminded of the coming of Lent and the gift that it brings us. Some may regard Lent as a solemn time of preparation and fasting; it absolutely is. I regard Lent as a time of spiritual "spring cleaning" for my heart and soul. For those who know me, I love to be tidy and organized. So, when its time to clean out a closet or mop a floor, I'm ready to go. All of us have a junk drawer in our homes; some may even have a junk closet - the drawer or closet that nobody should see. The place in our home that we know is a little disorganized but we're the only ones who know about it, so it's okay. It's the place for rubber bands, loose kevs that go to nothing, bobby pins, pennies, dried out pens, and that roll of old scotch tape you're never going to use.



Our hearts can be like that as well. There may be a place in your heart that you maybe haven't given to Jesus Christ just yet; the junk drawer of our hearts that we feel is too cluttered or messy for Jesus to get into. We stand between Jesus and that drawer, and instead direct Him to the pristine looking living room of our hearts. After all, why should Jesus focus on that? It's too disorganized and chaotic, right?

WRONG! In Lent, its time for us to step aside from that junk drawer and let Jesus weed out all those pieces of junk that we think are too much for Jesus to handle. Take on extra tasks that help you grow in a specific virtue or Spiritual Work of Mercy; lead a bible study for the women at your parish; find a spiritual director to journey with you during this wonderful season.

I am praying for each of you during the coming season of Lent. May the junk drawers of our hearts be cleaned out for Him, so we may all the more joyfully sing "Alleluia" at the coming of Easter Morning. God be with each of you.

First, I want to thank the courts who have checked their rosters updated them and gotten them to me. If your court has not had the time to get that done yet, I would appreciate it very much if you would try to work on them soon.

Hi.

Next, I just want to share with you about a pilgrimage that I was blessed to be a part of. Our church, St Catherine of Alexandria in Valley City, sponsored a pilgrimage to the Holy Land at the end of January for 10 days. Msgr. Skonseng was our spiritual leader and 27 other people went on the pilgrimage. 18 from Valley City, 3 from Fargo, 6 from Nebraska, and 1 from Florida. The one from Florida was my sister, Anne, and it was because of her and her husband, Gary, that I was able to go on this pilgrimage. It was a trip of a lifetime. Not only was it wonderful to spend 10 days with my sister, it was incredible being in the same places where Jesus was born, grew up, walked, preached, suffered and died.

The first day after arriving in Nazareth, we traveled to the Mount of the Beatitudes and enjoyed Mass at the St. Matthew Altar which was outside. We then proceeded to the Sea of Galilee and rode on a wooden fishing boat, like what Jesus would have been in. Even tried fishing with a net, but no success. We visited the Church of the Multiplication of Loaves, and the Church of the Primacy of Saint Peter. There we were able to go down and walk on the shore of the Sea of Galilee and put our foot in the water. It was so peaceful there. Then off to Capharnaum, The Town of Jesus. We saw remains of the late 4th Century A.D. "White Synagogue" that was built upon the remains of the "Synagogue of Jesus" and the sun set on the Sea of Galilee.

The Second day we set out to The Cana Catholic Wedding Church. There were ten couples on the pilgrimage that renewed their wedding vows there. That was so beautiful!! Next, we proceeded to the Basilica of the Annunciation and held Mass at the main altar. It is the largest Church in Nazareth. Then to the Church of St. Joseph where there are 3 altars, each dedicated to special times in Joseph's life: the betrothal to Mary, his dream when the angel told him to take Jesus and Mary and flee to Egypt, and one in his sickness. This church is built where Joseph's Carpentry Shop and home were. We went back to the Basilica of the Annunciation and headed to the lower level to where the home of Mary was. Next, we traveled to Mount Tabor to the Church of the Transfiguration. We moved part way up the mountain in the bus, then finished going up in vans. There were 17 hairpin curves to get to the top. That was quite the ride going up and down that mountain.

Day three, we left Nazareth and headed for Bethlehem. On the way we stopped at the Carmelite Monastery on Mount Carmel and had Mass. Then traveled to Cesarea and stopped by the Mediterranean Sea, where a 13-mile Water Channel had been built from Mount Carmel to Cesarea by King Herod at the time of Jesus. It was quite impressive to think that had been built so long ago and was still there. It was the way to get water to Cesarea. We saw many towns on the way. Stopped at Shepherds' Field about one mile outside of Bethlehem where the shepherds were as they heard about Jesus being born. We also saw ruins of a Monastery and Byzantine Church from the fourth, fifth, and sixth centuries.

Day four, we headed to Jericho. Jericho is the oldest and lowest city on earth. It is desert between Jerusalem and Jericho. We proceeded to the Church of the Good Shepherd for Mass when we arrived in Jericho. From there, went to the base of the Mount of Temptation where Jesus was tempted by the Devil. I rode a camel, tasted dates, figs, and sycamore nuts they called "Love Nuts." From there we drove to the Jordan River, renewed our baptism promises, and were blessed with the water from the Jordan River by Msgr. Skonseng. We then headed to Oumran, where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found and last to the Dead Sea where we could float in the water or walk in on the edge. I just walked in on the edge.

Day five, we started the day with Mass at the Church of the Grotto Gethsemane, then to the Garden of Gethsemane and the Church of all Nations where the Rock of Gethsemane is at where Jesus praved and sweated blood. We walked through the old city of Jerusalem, went to the Church of St. Anne and saw Mary's birthplace. Then we walked the Via Dolorosa, the Stations of the Cross. Monsignor carried a cross as we walked and prayed all the Stations. Stations 10-14 are in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, so we visited them the next day. Last of all that day we visited the Wailing Wall.

Day six, we woke at 4 AM to leave by 5 to have Mass at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre at 6. We had Mass at the Eleventh Station, where Jesus is nailed to the cross. (continued on page 6)

We visited the rest of the Stations while we were there. Saw where Jesus was crucified, the stone that He was laid on, and went in His tomb. From there we went to the Mount of Olives, where Jesus taught the disciples the Lord's Prayer. Then to the Chapel of the Ascension, where Jesus ascended into heaven, the Tear Chapel, where Jesus wept for Jerusalem, and we saw Mount Zion and Mount Moriah, where Abraham's sacrifice of Isaac took place.

Day Seven, went to visit the Good Shepherd School. It is a private school for children from age three through eighteen. We visited a few

where the classrooms. children. danced for us, sang songs, counted backwards, and then we went outside to their playground. From there we traveled to the Church of St. Catherine of Alexandria. We enjoyed Mass downstairs in the cave of St. Jerome. The Church of St. Catherine of Alexandria is right next to the Church of the Nativity, Jesus' birthplace, so we visited there. It is the oldest church in the world. Then around the corner and up the hill, we walked to the Milk Grotto, where Mary breast fed baby Jesus. From there we rode the bus to the Museum of Israel and saw the Dead Sea Scrolls and a model of Old Jerusalem and then visited the Holocaust Museum. After leaving the museum we descended to the city of Haikim and visited St John the Baptist Church, which is his burial place. We ended the pilgrimage at a restaurant called 'The Tent' with a great dinner and dancing for entertainment.

The pilgrimage was rather fast paced, and sometimes I felt I didn't have much time to devote to any one place. But since I've been home and have had a chance to contemplate the trip, read and listen to scripture every day, it is really sinking in, that I was there. I walked on the ground where Jesus walked. Wow!!! It is humbling and amazing all at the same time. Words cannot express the gratitude I have in my heart. I am so thankful to God and my sister and brother-in-law for the chance of a lifetime to walk where Jesus did. I also believe that those who went on this pilgrimage grew closer to one another in friendship and to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. And I have to say, if you ever have an opportunity to experience a pilgrimage to the Holy Land, GO!!! God is good, all the time!!!
