Catch The Action

Dog Days Of August

August in Southwest Florida means hot sticky days, plenty of rain, and often thunderstorms. If you don't mind working around the weather the fishing is often pretty good and competition is scarce.

Catching redfish should become more consistent as the month progresses. Odds are better on days with extreme high tides; this is the time to fish the baits deep under the shade of the mangroves. Floating a silver dollar-size live pinfish or pilchard under a cork or soaking dead bait including cut ladyfish, pinfish, and mullet are all excellent redfish baits. These redfish are tight under the mangroves on the higher stages of the tide, it's important to keep the bait as tight to the mangroves

as possible. Cut bait often makes a better choice than live under the bushes, as redfish are scent feeders and fresh cut bait oozes plenty of stinky aromas. By the end of the month schools of large reds should begin bunching up on the flats for their fall run.

The mangrove snapper bite should continue strong throughout the inshore and nearshore waters. Look for them schooled up around structure with good water movement; this could include any of the Gulf passes, docks and jetties, bridges, piers, and natural or man-made reefs. For bait, live shrimp, pilchards, and small pinfish, plus small cut bait with a small circle hook and 10- to 25-pound fluorocarbon leader is a good choice. Snapper are not only hard fighting for their size, but also one of the absolute best tasting fish in our waters. If you have visitors over the summer, snapper can make a great target and reward you with a fine dinner.

There's opportunity to hook into some big summer trout along with lots of undersized fish. Look for the larger trout widespread over areas of open water where sand bars separate deeper water from three- to six-foot-deep grass



flats. Schools of bait fish are concentrated in these areas and trout, along with Spanish mackerel, bluefish, ladyfish and small sharks are working the bait schools. Grass/sand or mottled bottom inside or near the Gulf passes should also hold trout and other species during the summer rainy months. Also, don't be surprised if a tarpon joins the party, they will become widespread throughout our waters and will inhale small bait just as quickly as a large one. Sharks are also a possibility, from small to large; they will be attracted to any fish feeding activity.

Offshore, most anglers are targeting grouper and snapper, often making a long run of 30 miles or better for the larger fish. Closer to shore, within 10 miles of land, keeper size gags will be holding over limestone and rock ledges. Trolling deep diving lures or fishing live bait are favorite methods. The best bet is to be on the water before sunrise and get back near shore early in the day ahead of afternoon storms.

Tips From South Trail Fire And Rescue

Medical Emergencies. South Trail Fire and Rescue provides a wide range of emergency services, from fighting fires and conducting rescue operations to providing emergency medical services. It is emergency medical

calls that South Trail firefighters respond to more frequently than to any other type of call – 3,058 medical calls in the first six months of 2016. South Trail Fire and Rescue has the trained personnel and the equipment to provide the highest quality emergency medical care; 22 South Trail firefighters are certified as paramedics and 42 firefighters are certified as Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs). If you or a loved one has a medical emergency, following are steps that you can take to ensure that help arrives as quickly as possible.

• **Knox HomeBox.** If you live alone, you may want to consider purchasing and installing a Knox® HomeBoxTM. Many commercial properties in the South Trail Fire District

use a Knox Box to enable firefighters to quickly and easily gain access to their building in case of a fire after business hours. South Trail fire trucks carry a unique proprietary key that opens the Knox Boxes in the South Trail District. The building access key is located inside the Knox Box. Without a Knox Box, the firefighters can make a forcible entry into a building in an emergency, but the tools used will damage the door.

Family members often call the fire department with concerns about a loved one who lives alone and is in poor health. Sometimes the family gives a house key to a neighbor or leaves a key hidden by the front door. A Knox HomeBox provides secure and quick access to the fire department in an emergency, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Only the fire department can access the Knox HomeBox because only the fire department holds the key.

To purchase a Knox HomeBox, call 1-855-438-5669 or go to KnoxHomeBox.com. On the website, select "Fort Myers South Trail" as your fire department. After you have installed the Knox HomeBox, South Trail firefighters will come to your home to put your house key inside and to lock

your Knox HomeBox. If you then have a medical emergency, the dispatcher will advise the firefighters enroute that your home has a Knox HomeBox.

- Visible House Numbers. Make sure that the firefighters can locate your house quickly in an emergency. House numbers should be at least four inches tall, clearly seen at night, and visible from both directions of travel for at least 150 feet. Check that shrubs or trees do not block the numbers.
- Calling 9-1-1. When you call 9-1-1 from a cell phone, you must give your address to the dispatcher. Post your address on the refrigerator or other visible spot along with an up-to-date "File of Life" medical information sheet. In a medical emergency, if possible, unlock the front door, turn on the outside lights, secure your pets inside, and send someone outside to meet the emergency responders. In case of a fire, all occupants should already be outside, in front of the house, and at a prearranged meeting place.

Fraud Alert

Fraudulent Schemes Follow Florida Tragedy

Just hours after the mass shooting at Orlando's Pulse nightclub on June 12, phony social media and crowd-funding accounts were created by heartless thieves trying to take advantage of generous donors wanting to help victims and their families. Although one Twitter account and fraudulent website have already been suspended, it is very likely that scammers will continue these shams for some time to come.

The Lee County sheriff's office and the Better Business Bureau warn you to carefully consider these charity-giving tips before choosing to give:

- Beware of unsolicited emails that appear to come from a known charitable organization with instructions to "click" on a link in order to donate. These links can infect your computer with malware, while attempting to steal your personal information.
- If the site doesn't explain how they intend to use the funds being donated or say when they'll be used, we suggest you stay away.
- Most states require charities to register with a state government agency before soliciting, so be sure you're giving to a registered charity. Check out www.charitynavigator.org.
- Families may set up their own financial assistance accounts by using do-it-yourself fundraising websites. Visit the safety and security pages of these sites for information

on how to safely and securely give.

- When donating, make sure the money is received and administered by a third party (like a bank, CPA or lawyer), as this will help ensure the funds are used appropriately.
- Do not give your credit card or bank account information over the phone to someone you don't know. If you receive a call asking for a donation to help victims in this tragedy, ask the caller to send you information in the mail so you have to time to check out the organization.
- Beware of solicitors, websites, or social media sites requesting payment in Bitcoin, wire transfer, prepaid money cards, etc.

If you believe you have received a fraudulent request for a donation in the name of this horrific event and would like to report it, contact the Fraud Line at 258-3292. You can also file a complaint with www.ic3.gov or www.ftc.gov.

Cooking By Connie

August means that summer is half over and we can look forward to the cooler (ha ha) weather.

What is August known for? Here are some of the things: August is Celery, Fennel and Cactus Month; it is Orange and Papaya Month; and National Catfish Month. It is also Boomers Making A Difference Month, (I relate). International Beer Day is on Aug. 1 and National Oyster Day on Aug. 5.

In my new cookbook, *Soups and Stews...Comfort by the Spoonful*, I have a really great oyster recipe. My new cookbook should be available in September or October. Here is a preview of a wonderful stew.

Oyster Stew - Quick And Easy

1 or 2 cans oysters

Salt and pepper to taste

1/4 cup onion, diced fine

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

6 cups milk

1 tablespoon butter

In a medium soup pot, add the milk, oysters, salt, pepper, onions and Worcestershire sauce. Bring to a slow boil; simmer until onions are tender. Add butter and allow to melt. Serve with oyster crackers. Serves four to five.



Oyster Stew – Richer

2 to 3 green onions, chopped

2 tablespoons butter

12 ounces fresh raw oysters, undrained

4 cups half and half

Salt and pepper to taste

1 tablespoon fresh parsley

1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper Oyster crackers

Sauté onions in soup pot in butter until tender. Add remaining ingredients. Cook over low heat until edges of oysters begin to curl. Serve with sliced green onions and oyster



crackers, garnish. Serves four to five.





When Choosing Outdoor Products, Don't Forget The Pets

If you share your home with a four-legged friend, you've probably questioned the safety of lawn and yard products. The good news is that there are plenty of animal-friendly alternatives to standard outdoor chemicals. Here's a quick guide.

Pondering Pesticides

There are a variety of common household substances that can double as effective insect and weed killers. To help stave off or

eliminate these outdoor nuisances, try using:

• White vinegar. Make a pet-friendly (if pungent) spray with this pantry standby.



• Cavenne, chili pepper or paprika. Spice up your pest control: Add a teaspoon of seasoning to a cup of water, or sprinkle directly around insect entry points.

- Powdered soap. Use dry, or mix with water and vinegar.
- Eucalyptus oil. Sprinkle a few drops where buzzing insects live, or mix with water and spray around the base of your home.
- Boiling water (for weeds).

When your cupboard is bare, turn to the tap. Some super-hot H2O may be all you need.

If you use a standard pesticide: Avoid products that

contain metaldehyde. Found in many slug, snail, ant and mouse baits, this chemical is particularly poisonous to pets. By law, products that contain metaldehyde must include an explicit label about its dangers.

Grow Green ... And Pet Safe

Most professional lawn care companies state that their fertilizers, used in compliance with strict codes, don't pose significant hazards to children or pets. While this may be true, pet owners might consider these other general options:

- Organic fertilizer. If you're looking to go green, what better place to start than your own lawn? Organic fertilizers typically blend manure, kelp and worm castings, which won't harm pets. Remember, the word "organic" isn't automatically a safety guarantee. Your best bet is to look for "pet safe" on
- Compost. An ancient process that's gained modern popularity, composting is making your own fertilizer from biodegradable materials – especially plant-based food scraps. **Note:** If you wouldn't feed it to your pet (think coffee grounds and raw meat), avoid using it for compost. Visit the ASPCA's website: http://www.aspca.org for a list of potentially unsafe

If you use a standard fertilizer: Beware of inert ingredients, those that serve as fillers or binders. Common examples include carbon tetrachloride and chloroform, which

Purple Heart Day, August 7 -

Purple Heart Day is an observance that commemorates the creation of the Purple Heart medal in 1782.

The holiday also encourages people to pay their respects to fallen soldiers, to listen to the stories of soldiers and veterans, and to thank them for their service to the nation.


The Purple Heart was first created on August 7, 1782 by the commander-in-

chief of the Continental Army, Gen. George Washington. Then known as the Badge of Military Merit, it was awarded to three Revolutionary soldiers in 1783.

After the end of the American War of Independence, no medals were awarded until 1932, when the medal was revived on the bicentennial anniversary of George Washington's birth. According to a circular dated February 22, 1932, Purple Heart medals were to be awarded to those wounded or killed while serving in the United States Armed Forces as a result of enemy action on or after April 5, 1917. The United States officially joined the First World War on April 6, 1917.

At current estimates, about 1.8 million Purple Hearts have been awarded since then. Today, in addition to being awarded to those who fight wars overseas, the Purple Heart is also given to military personnel who display bravery and valor as prisoners of war and while fighting certain types of domestic terrorists.

The Purple Heart is a heart-shaped purple medal with a gold border. The front has a profile of George Washington, while the back has the words "for military merit" inscribed on it. The medal is attached to a piece of purple silk with a silver border.

Symbols For The Folds Of The Flag

The source and the date of origin of this flag folding procedure is unknown; however, some sources attribute it to the Gold Star Mothers of America, while others to an Air Force chaplain stationed at the United States Air Force Academy. Others consider it to be an urban legend. It is provided as a patriotic service to all.

The **first** fold of our flag is a symbol of life.

The **second** fold is a symbol of our belief in eternal life.

The **third** fold is made in honor and remembrance of the veteran departing our ranks, and who gave a portion of his or her life for the defense of our country to attain peace throughout the world.

The **fourth** fold represents our weaker nature; as American citizens trusting in God, it is to Him we turn in times of peace, as well as in times of war, for His divine guidance.

The **fifth** fold is a tribute to our country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right, but it is still our country, right or wrong"

The **sixth** fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and "to the republic for which it stands, one nation



under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

The **seventh** fold is a tribute to our armed forces, for it is through the armed forces that we protect our country and our flag against all enemies, whether they be found within or without the boundaries of our republic.

The **eighth** fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day, and to honor our mother, for whom it flies on Mother's Day

The **ninth** fold is a tribute to womanhood, for it has been through their faith, love, loyalty and devotion that the characters of the men and women who have made this country great have been molded.

The **10th** fold is a tribute to father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country since he or she was first born.

The 11th fold, in the eyes of Hebrew citizens, represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies, in their eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

The **12th** fold, in the eyes of a Christian citizen, represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in their eyes, God the Father, the Son and Holy Ghost.

When the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost, reminding us of our national motto, "In God We Trust."

After the flag is completely folded and tucked in, it has the appearance of a cocked hat, ever reminding us of the soldiers who served under Gen. George Washington and the sailors and Marines who served under Capt. John Paul Jones and were followed by their comrades and shipmates in the U.S. Armed Forces, preserving for us the rights, privileges and freedoms we enjoy today.

I'm sure many of you have seen the police cars parked in different locations in our community. Sometimes there is an officer in the car, sometimes not. But you need to remember they are there to let you know that the sheriff's office is watching and checking speeds. We have had several speeders ticketed in the neighborhood this last month. Remember the speed limit in Eagle Ridge is 25 mph. Please follow this rule and don't speed. Keep your eyes open for things that are out of the ordinary. If you see something, call the nonemergency number, (239) 477-1000 and let them know. If you feel it is vital and should have an officer sent out immediately, call 911 and report it. Tell them the time, the location, the license plate number and a description of the car and driver.

Lee County Yard Waste Regulations

- Do not place out for pickup more than 24 hours early
- Yard waste must be containerized (50 pounds or less), or securely tied into bundles not heavier than 50 pounds and no longer than 6 feet in length.
- Up to 50 pounds of unbundled palm fronds may be placed at the curb. Any excess palm fronds must be tied into bundles, each weighing 50 pounds or less.



- When using plastic bags, make sure that the contents can be easily identified by the refuse truck driver (leave a twig or small branch sticking out).
- Call 239-337-0800 for a cost estimate for large-scale yard waste disposal projects when containerizing or bundling is difficult.
