

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

HOW DOES THE LORD'S PROMISE SPEAK TO

For fifty years the Jewish people had been exiled in Baby-



lon. Most of the people gathered around Ezra that day had never worshiped in public. They are hearing God's word proclaimed openly for the first time in their lives. Even the older folks could barely recall what it was like before their exile. Many had certainly wondered if this day would ever come. We may have felt the same way sometimes over the last two years. For

weeks or months, or over a year we did not join in communal worship. We rejoiced when we were able to return. Imagine the tears of joy shed by the faithful people of Judah when they ere able to assemble freely for the first time in decades.

In the longer form of the second reading, Saint Paul builds his analogy of the body, ending by pointing out that "if one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it" (1 Corinthians 12:26). We are all members of the body of Christ, of the "one holy, catholic and apostolic Church." If one of us suffers, the entire Church suffers. Many suffer from chronic illness, or poverty, or racism, or emotional trauma, or physical limitations. Many are not able to reach their full potential. In an even wider sense, since we are all children of God, the human family is united as one as well. And so we are called to care for the least of our brothers and sisters, be they next door or at the other end of the world; we are one family.

Alone among the evangelists, Luke sets this account at the very beginning of Jesus' ministry. He alone also reveals

the scripture passage that Jesus reads in His hometown synagogue (Isaiah 61:1-2), which sets the tone for His ministry. "A year acceptable to Lord" (Luke 4:19) refers to a once every-fiftyduring event, which debts were for-



given, slaves freed, and land reverted to its original owners or heirs. The transformative ministry of Jesus went on to fulfill this ultimate reversal of circumstances.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

In what ways am I poor, oppressed or held captive? How does the Lord's promise speak to me? How can I bring glad tidings to those who are poor and oppressed?

St. Thomas Aquinas | January 28

One of the most famous members of the Dominican Order, St.



Thomas Aquinas (1225 - 1274) is wellknown by many for his theological work, "The Summa Theologiae." Born in Italy, his mother wanted him to become a Benedictine and had high hopes that he would eventually become abbot of Monte Cassino, where he spent much of his youth. To change his vocation, she had him kidnapped by his brothers on his way to Paris at the age of 19. He spent two

years in their captivity. Despite this, nothing could shake him from his vocation to become a Dominican priest and he was eventually released. Once free, he went to Paris and then to Cologne, where he finished his studies with Albert the Great. His greatest contribution to the Catholic Church is his writings. The unity, harmony, and continuity of faith and reason, of

revealed and natural human knowledge, encompasses his writings. The Summa Theologiae, his last and, unfortunately, uncompleted work, deals with the whole of Catholic theology. The patron saint of teachers, theologians and students, St. Thomas

Aguinas died in 1274. His life and the impact he had on the whole Church, however, remains alive today.

Plant Your Works in the Word

One of the things about Scripture is that even the smallest word and shortest phrase can be critical to the overall message. When you take a quiet moment to rest with the Word, you find how quickly the most mundane sentence can reach out and grab you, pulling you into a deeper contemplation of some truth you hadn't even considered until then.

But we often fail to act as the Israelites in the Book of Nehemiah, standing before the Water Gate "listening attentively." Whether it's at Mass during the Liturgy of the Word or at home poring over the Bible, time after time we find ourselves less mindful than we could be. Our ears accept the sounds of the words and our eyes glance over the shape of the letters.

But are we mindful — truly?

The best answer is hopefully at least sometimes. There are always tasks to be completed, problems weighing on our minds that we can't quite give over to God. We lose ourselves in these things instead of in Scripture. We "clock in" with Bible reading instead of "diving in."

We can never forget that the words of the Lord are spirit and life. They are the soil that quickens the seed of all stewardship. There is no mindfulness, no prayer, no graciousness, no gratitude or accountability or sense of commitment unless there is the Word.

So let us pray today for mindfulness, that our every action will be grounded in the law of God — giving it true spirit and life.
